- 28th meeting took place from January 24 through January 25
- More than 90 mayors and civic leaders

- Topics:
 - Designing for Extremes: featured the work of cities whose policies have tackled challenges that more directly affect specific populations and have, consequently, improved their community more broadly.
 - How will mayors make it count? Challenges and opportunities for the 2020 Census: an overview of the 2020 census implementation, highlighting best practice census strategies.
 - From Cradle to Preschool: Holistic Approaches to promote future success and collaboration across partners through which cities are protecting and promoting the brain development of infants through young children.

Interesting ideas

- St. Paul is instituting a "pink shovel" initiative where they have pink shovels by cross walks for residents to provide additional shoveling as needed.
- Census Tips:
 - Fill the data void with real information
 - Philadelphia during parent teacher conferences, teachers are trained to give a 30 second pitch to the importance of the census for school funding and direct parents to a computer where they can fill out the form right there.
 - Social workers When social workers do home checks for foster children, reminding the foster parents that the children should be counted as part of that household
 - Hiring people who already work with hard to reach communities
 - Implications of tribal identification for Native Americans need to partner with Tribes
- Cities are conducting equity assessments of fines and fees and how they respond to complaints:
 - St. Paul: Issuing 60% of summary abatements for things like unshoveled snow and long grass to 30% of the people. What do these people need, and do more summary abatements help them? Instead, assembling volunteer crews to go mow the lawn or shovel when they get complaints.
 - Iowa City: if police pull you over for a broken headlight or tail light, they don't give you a ticket. They give you a voucher to get it fixed.

More interesting ideas

- Annual equity report cards
- Somerville MA has a "Children's Cabinet" of Mayor, School Superintendent, health care partners, etc. to focus on early childhood issues
- Rochester NY screens young children for preventable learning delay issues e.g. vision and hearing
- Registering people to vote at free tax prep clinics
- Atlanta's Displacement Free Zones
- Homesharing between seniors and college students
- Assessing accessibility needs via "walk-alongs" with folks that have mobility challenges
