GATE CLOSURES

- Gates on secondary streets closed evenings, weekends, school breaks and holidays
- All 3 schools encourage students, parents, guests, outside organizations to access campus from one main entry off Monroe street

NEIGHBORHOOD HOUSES

- The College will not use houses they own for traditional undergrads nor turn properties into student housing
- Properties will be maintained in manner consistent with requirements imposed by the city

PUBLIC ACCESS TO LAKE WINGRA

- 5. Shore lands accessed with pathways for campus and public use
- Edgewood installs and maintains boardwalks that are used by the campus and the public for educational and recreational purposes

TRANSPORTATION MANAGEMENT PLAN

- Subsidized Madison Metro bus passes for students
- **8.** Incentives for faculty, staff and students to bike or carpool to campus
- Shuttle buses to State Street 4 nights/ week so students don't need to drive

STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

- 10. Central drainage corridors
- 11. Isolated drainage basins
- 12. Catchbasins with sumps
- **13.** Grass swales to infiltrate and filter runoff
- **14.** Rooftop runoff routed to penetrable surfaces
