# 4. Describe the proposed work of art and required materials:?

Two artists, Heath Matysek-Snyder and Niki Johnson will be commissioned to create site-specific artworks for the new Central Library. In Jaunary 2012, Madison Public Library and the Foundation hosted "Bookless," a one-day event in which artists exhibited site-specific work in the soon to be deconstructed Central Library. Over 100 artists participated and 5,000 members of the public viewed the work. Heath and Niki were roundly applauded for their work at this showcase and have been selected by the curatorial staff and architectural team for commissioned artworks.

The brillance of the works each artist created for "Bookless" was the reuse of library materials and the way in which the art spoke to the past, present and future of libraries.

From Heath: "I am excited and proud to be asked to make a site-specific piece of art for the new Central Library. The pieces I made for 'Bookless' were stacks of split firewood, stacked into and filling architectural spaces and features. The pieces were called Kominy, which means "stacks" in Czech. I made three different Kominy, one on each floor that incorporated pieces of furniture or other objects from the old library (and from each respective floor) directly into the wood stacks. I had a lot of very positive feedback about the pieces. People really seemed to enjoy them as many people have personal experiences with firewood. The idea was simple but connected to the library on many levels. Shelves of books are called 'stacks.' Books are made from paper and paper comes from trees. Books often connote history or a sense of place and by stacking objects and furniture into the Kominy, I was able to have a similar effect. My goal is to make and install a permanent Kominy in the new library. It will be similar to the Kominy\_Upper (see images). I will incorporate at least one bench (but maybe two) and possibly a desk into the stack. Making my site-specific piece of art into a fully functional "piece of furniture" where people can sit read or lean their heads back on a wall of stacked firewood."

Niki will work with traditional metal bookends to create a site-specific sculpture. From Niki, "I am truly excited about the possibility of creating a site-specific bookend piece for the Central branch. I believe this new work will serve to celebrate the future of the new space by drawing focus to the beautiful colors and designs of previous eras. It will reflect the idea of innovation, much like the new architecture of the building- reconfiguring the beauty of the past into a new design for the future."

# 5. What is the goal of your project?

From the Madison Arts Commission's Public Art Framework and Field Guide "the city's public realm will be a stage for the creative expressions of artists." As a free public venue, Madison Public Library is an ideal "stage." The library also has a responsibility to provide comfortable, safe, accessible, and attractive environment for the over 2 million annual visitors to Madison's libraries. The new Central Library has a special opportunity to undertake a public art venture by incorporating pieces from the existing art collection, the changing gallery and the commissioning of new artwork. The goal of this specific venture is to support the commission of two signature and significant new works from two local artists for the Central Library where they have a broad and significant impact on the projected one million visitors in the first year.

# 6. What is the timeline for your project?

After grant notification, artists will work with Bryan Cooper, City Architect, and Trent Miller, MPL Gallery Director, to finalize project locations, engineering and electrical needs, if any, and design and installation schedules. With major construction completed in spring 2013, the artists will have the opportunity to be on site for installation with plenty of time before the September 2013 opening of the library. Prior to May 2013, artists will provide concepts and final design sketches to the curatorial team. Staff will work with architects and IT staff on details of a public art tour (downloadable or printable web-based tour) and signage in the fall of 2012. The public art program, including these two pieces, will be part of a special grand opening event in September of 2013.

7. Describe the professional experience of the proposed artist OR the process you will use to guaranty a highly qualified artist:

Two artists Health Matysek-Synder and Niki Johnson were both lauded favorites at the "Bookless" event. Many members of the public asked if there was an opportunity to buy or use art from "Bookless" in the new Central Library. This opportunity to commission site-specific works is even more appropriate. Briefly, Heath has a BFA from Virginia Commonwealth University and an MFA from University of Wisconsin-Madison. He has worked as a faculty associate in the Art Department in the wood program, until his recent appointment as Assistant Professor at Virginia Commonwealth University in the Craft /Material Studies department this coming fall. He has exhibited internationally and has work in several museum collections, including Madison Children's Museum. Niki is an interdisciplinary artist known for her material dexterity and attention to detail. Her work engages notions of both public and private identity through the reconfiguration of media-derived imagery and common domestic objects. She has a BFA from University of Memphis and a MFA from UW-Madison. She has had solo shows in California, Tennessee and Wisconsin, and is an adjunct assistant professor at Milwaukee Institute of Art and Design.

8. Describe the proposed site for this project and explain why it is appropriate for the work of art. How the work of art would enhance the location? :

Madison Public Library is a very appropriate venue to present public art that will receive attention and interaction from the community. In 2010, the Central Library saw 500,000 visitors and is projected to see over 1,000,000 patrons in the first year of operation. The new facility will have over 120,000 square feet, 80,000 which are accessible to the public. What a fabulous location for the viewing and appreciation of public art!

It is also important to note how these two commissioned works fit into the framework of the public art program of the Madison Public Library. MPL has six major works of permanent public art that are being conserved and re-installed in the new library. Works inlcude the Aaron Bohrod mural to Heiroglyph by O.V. Shaffer. The permanent works will be included in a map of public art on the MPL website that visitors can download or print out and then use to learn more about the collection. In addition, the permanent collection is enhanced by the changing shows in the library art gallery on the third floor and through programs that bring in local artists to work with patrons on art-making activities.

The two works will enhance the new Central Library by creating a unique sense of place by using iconic and familiar remnants from the old library building. As site-specific works that draw on library references and objects and links the past to the present, the art will be points of conversation that differentiate this library from other locales and gathering places, in Madison and around the country.

9. How will the work of art fit with neighborhood and City goals? :

The downtown urban landscape is rich with public art aimed at enhancing our city center. The neighborhood is excited about the new Central Library, which builds on a legacy of commissioning and exhibiting public art that is over 100 years old. In 1907 "St. George and the Dragon," a ceramic medallion still in the collection today, was gifted to MPL for display in the new Carnegie-funded downtown library. the two new works will continue that tradition.

The commissioning of these works also aligns with city goals by "responding to Madison's on-going process of city building" as noted in the the summary of Public Art Framework and Field Guide, and by "supporting and facilitating the City's engagement of artists to explore opportunities through capital improvement projects, to collaboratively shape capital projects, and to create integral works of art."

10. How long do you anticipate the project lasting (number of years)? The timeline for design and installation is approximatley 18 months. The works are expected to be exhibited in their specific locations for 20 years or more (although note the the logevity of the existing works of permanent art in the collection.)

### 11. How will you know this project is successful? The project is successful if it brings attention to the public art collection via patron interaction with the pieces. The library plans to gauge public response to its public art program, including these commissions, in several ways. We will have the downloadable content on our website and can track interest through hits there. We will have comment opportunities through the library's Twitter and Facebook feeds. With the planned use of QR codes near the works where patrons can pursue more information about the work or the artist, we can also track those that have a deeper interest. In addition, we will incorporate these works into public programs, like curator or artist talks, and can measure audience interest and interaction.

12. How do you plan on contextualizing the artwork for the casual passerby? (for example - downloadable podcast or info on website, artist statement available someplace nearby, etc.) We are exploring using QR codes on certain signage in the building, especially for elements related to the LEED certification, and for the public art collection to provide patrons with more information on the artist and on the artwork.

# 13. What maintenance costs do you anticipate in the course of the work's life and what is your plan to pay for them?

Both commissioned pieces are made of sturdy, low maintenance materials to minimize future upkeep. General upkeep and light cleaning will be the responsibility of maintenance staff and be incorporated into the operating budget of the library. The library and foundation can utilize capital support and endowment distributions for future maintenance needs if required.

### 14. What is your plan for the work's end of life?

The library will work with the artists to make a plan for the end of life of the works. It is possible the works could rotate to other branch libraries or find other homes in the Madison government buildings if they are still in good condition.


