My first choice:

I like Ray Chi's proposed artwork the best of the three.

I feel he put a lot of creative thought into what the neighborhood told him about our priorities, culture, message the art would convey, etc. The pieces both alone and together as a "set" are very thought provoking and inspirational in our sometimes selfish world.

Note: I feel any potential physical issues (eg possibility of kids climbing the pieces) could be handled and fairly well overcome. Example: some landscaping below each of the two "words" planted with low maintenance, ground-covering shrubs. Many neighbors have wanted some kind of gardens or plantings in the park and that could perhaps be part of the landscaping using hardy annuals planted and cared for by neighborhood volunteers (myself included).

My second choice:

Actual Size Artwork team also put thought into customizing their proposed artwork and while I do like it and appreciate their creativity, I do prefer the Ray Chi proposed art pieces.

My last choice is Suikang Zhao's proposed piece. It's obvious the budget did not go far enough for him to come up with a proposed piece of art that would reflect what the neighborhood conveyed regarding what we would like it to represent, etc.

<u>Suikang Zhao</u>- I appreciate the inspiration, but the art needs to stand out more than this piece will in this space. No thank you.

<u>Ray Chi</u>- Second choice. Have landscaping/hedges at base to prevent kids from climbing. Appear to grow. Would work well in a different park. Not the right angles for people going by.

<u>Actual Size Artworks</u>- Favorite! Can be seen from all different angles. Reflective paint, love! Good size for cars and bikes to enjoy. Great when walking too.

<u>Suikang Zhao</u>- Do not like. It is not the right scale for this park. Majority of views will be from cars and then bikes.

Ray Chi- I like the layers/depth of this proposal, but less enthusiastic about word-based art- what about non-English speakers? Also seems like more of a graffiti magnet. This would be my second choice. Actual Size Artworks- I appreciated info about artistic process, also energy of sculpture, bright colors, attention to experience of place in different seasons, lighting, etc. Really like the idea! Also feel that this team did the best job of responding to neighborhood requests and hopes. I think it offers the most defining/establishing neighborhood identity and offers the most at different scales/speeds- pedestrians, bicyclists, and drivers. This one is my favorite.

<u>Suikang Zhao</u>- The sundial idea of the split column is interesting, but at a distance (people driving on E Johnson), I don't think this piece would translate well- might just look like a random column. This piece also doesn't feel very integrated with or responsive to neighborhood requests and hopes. Plus, it's very phallic, which I am not a fan of.

Ray Chi- #2 Interesting and attractive. I'm concerned about kids climbing- maybe low plants around the base?

<u>Actual Size Artworks</u>- #1 Very nice- a good fit for the space. Like the height and the colorful touches. Playful and attractive. My first choice.

<u>Suikang Zhao</u>- #3 Love the material- it will age well. Concept is interesting, but too unassuming and plain for the space.

Ray Chi- I do not like the design pictures- don't like the focus on words- want something more abstract and natural-looking.

<u>Actual Size Artworks</u>- I like the photo the best of the three. The only one I like. It is playful and abstract, visible from a distance or up close. If a similar design could be done with less silver metal, more natural color, would be preferable. Would also be nice if balls had detail on them if you looked at it up close. Thoughtful of neighborhood needs, maintenance needs.

<u>Suikang Zhao- I don't like the photo.</u> From a distance, as many/majority will see it- it is just a pole. What's the point?

<u>Ray Chi</u>- Beautiful concept and emotion. I believe it captures the neighborhood's desires in its ideation. The actual installation feels a little underwhelming to me when compared against the Actual Size Artworks concept.

<u>Actual Size Artworks</u>- Lovely piece. I'm not sure how I feel about the reflective paint on the orbs because living next to it means it would always be the brightest thing in my backyard, but I liked the artists' proposal to not use reflective paint on the residential side.

<u>Suikang Zhao</u>- I feel this is the most pedestrian-friendly, but also understated for the space and its primarily automotive audience. While I think it is beautiful, I'm not sure this is the right space for it.

Here are my comments on the artists' presentations:

Actual Size Artworks - I appreciated the insight with which they described our neighborhood and their comments on how the neighborhood's character guided their design. This is the design I liked best at first glance. The colorful sculpture would be striking from a distance for passing traffic or up close for bikes and pedestrians. I also like that the reflective paint increases its visibility. Words/phrases in my notes from the presentation that I think suit the character of our neighborhood: positive, welcoming, playful, bringing together past/present/future.

Ray Chi - I like the distinctiveness of this piece and the message of welcome, inclusivity, sustainability, and interconnectedness. I think the sentiment suits our neighborhood well, particularly in proximity to the tiny homes & future public market. If installed as proposed, part of the sculpture would be directly behind our back yard. I'll be interested to hear the committee's thoughts on the anticipated longevity of the structure & any other practical concerns about maintenance, durability, and safety.

Suikang Zhao - I think this design would be better suited for a different location.
