Project Information

A) Brief Project Description

The project focuses on building neighborhood leadership and capacity in the Russett and Balsam areas of the Meadowood Neighborhood. The area is one clearly undergoing a profound transformation. It is at risk of becoming another blighted and severely troubled pocket within the city. This is evidenced by growing numbers of police calls, incidents of violence and attention being paid to the area by the Mayor's office. School data shows sharply rising numbers of low-income families in the area with increasing numbers of children.

We propose to develop a safer, more viable neighborhood by building assets and engaging residents in their Neighborhood Association efforts and their larger community; the community garden is one of these projects and was one that was desired by many residents on the neighborhood surveys done in the winter and fall of 2007. The proposal focuses on building relationships between newcomers (primarily renters) and long-term residents (primarily homeowners) so that all can work together on creating this community garden.

D) Will youth, elderly, non-English speakers, lower income people or people with disabilities be a part of the new garden? The two areas of focus (Balsam, Russett) contain 415 households, 192 are owner-occupied with a total population of 981 persons (2000 census). School data from Orchard Ridge and Toki indicate a steep rise in low-income families. Many of the new families are immigrants and/or persons of color. There is clear interest in having community gardens from the Latino families (who are already growing vegetables near their apartment buildings, with permission from the property owners). In the neighborhood survey completed on the garden, per se, there was interest across age, type of residence, lower-income and non-English speaking residents. There is one person with a disability who is very interested in the project as well.

E) Who owns or controls the land where the new garden will be located? What arrangements have you made to secure the site for a community garden? Please attach copies of written permission to use the land where your garden will be, and be specific about the length of time for which the arrangement is in place.

The land is in the Meadowood Park, owned by the City of Madison. The organizing group met with Si Wilstrand, Madison Parks, on November 27 to talk about using this space. The organizing group will request Park Commission approval at the February, 2008, meeting. There may be water access at the site; Si is checking into this.

Since this is city land, Janet Parker informed us that no soil test for heavy metals is needed. We have submitted a soil sample to the UW Soil Testing Laboratory and expect results back by the end of January, 2008.
