
Significant Incidents- Shots Fired

- 28 shots fired incidents
 - -42% decrease compared to 2022
 - -39% decrease compared to 3 year average






Significant Incidents- Heroin Overdoses

- MPD responded to 78 known heroin overdoses
 - 90% increase compared to 2022
 - 55% increase compared to 3 year average
- 10 suspected overdose deaths
 - 67% increase compared to 2022
 - 50% increase compared to 3 year average

Robbery Wisconsin Statute 943.32










Significant Incidents- Robberies and Burglaries

- 32 Robberies reported in Q1 2023
 - 7% increase compared to 2022
 - -16% decrease compared to 3 year average

- 140 Burglaries reported in Q1 2023
 - 1% increase compared to 2022
 - -23% decrease compared to 3 year average


Significant Incidents- Thefts Involving Automobiles

 - -32% decrease compared to 2022
 - -40% decrease compared to 3 year average

- 120 Thefts from Autos reported in Q1 2023
 - -1% decrease compared to 2022
 - -34% decrease compared to 3 year average



Theft from Auto - Citywide (1st Qtr)






Arrest data- Charges 2022-2023

Arrest data by Sex, 2022 and 2023 Year to Date






- MPD responded to 33,173 Calls For Service (CFS)
 - 74 contacts resulted in the use of recordable force
 - Recordable Force was used in 0.22% of encounters (1 call in 448)
 - All uses of force listed here were reviewed for compliance with MPD SOPs and training.

For statistical purposes, recordable force includes takedowns, active countermeasures, OC spray, impact weapons, hobble restraints (any level), less lethal projectiles, Taser deployments, K9 apprehensions, and use of deadly force (including dispatching animals).

In the first quarter of 2023, MPD's Training Team was productive in all areas under our purview. Highlights of the quarter include:
