Wright's character and legacy as a dedicated public servant. Ed is a former resident of Madison and has worked in Madison for most of his career.

As a leader and founding member of 100 Black Men of Madison, Ed led youth and adult-based programs through the organization's "Mentoring the 100 Way Across a Lifetime" program, serving thousands of youths and adults of all races and genders across the Greater Madison area. This mentoring program provided crucial services, including face-to-face mentoring, online mentor training, a virtual mentee curriculum that includes health and wellness materials, and post-secondary academic scholarships.

As an active member of Dane County's NAACP, Ed is also steadfast in addressing social and economic injustices faced by Black and brown communities, sometimes being the only person of color in the room. Dedicated to taking action, Ed not only provides tangible solutions to such issues but also carefully instructs others on how to do the same.

"The Ed Murray that I know doesn't understand how to say 'no' to those in need or those who are attempting to help those in need," according to Frances Huntley-Cooper, former mayor of Fitchburg, Wisconsin, and the first African American female mayor in Wisconsin.
