Timeline

Date	Action
Monday, January 27	Office of Management and Budget (OMB) issued memorandum M-25-13, "Temporary Pause of Agency Grant, Loan, and Other Financial Assistance Programs." Pause was set to go into effect on January 28 at 5:00pm Eastern Time
Tuesday, January 28	White House issued a Q&A on the memo, specifying the funding pause would not apply to specific programs, including Medicaid, SNAP, and others that provide direct benefits. Federal judge temporarily blocked the funding pause through February 3.
Wednesday, January 29	OMB issued memorandum M-25-14 to rescind the prior memo pausing federal funds.
Friday, January 31	Second federal judge issued temporary restraining order that blocks the Trump administration's efforts to suspend federal dollars to 22 states (including Wisconsin) and the District of Columbia that were party to the lawsuit.

Understanding the Scope of Federal Funding in the City Budget

- Staff are currently developing an inventory of all programs and projects that rely on federal funding.
- What information is currently available about federal funding?
 - **2025 Capital and Operating Budget**: The budget shows the amount of federal funds appropriated for the current year. However, many grants and capital projects are multi-year initiatives. Grants may have been authorized in a prior year budget or through a resolution and carried forward. As a result, the 2025 budget does not show all of the funding planned for this year.
 - **2023 Single Audit:** A single audit is required from entities that expend \$750,000 or more in aggregate federal financial assistance within a fiscal year. Every year, the Finance Department prepares two Schedules of Expenditures of Federal and State Awards (SEFA) (one for the City and one for Public Health) to comply with Single Audit requirements.

The most recent completed single audit is from 2023. Staff are currently working on the 2024 single audit. Reviewing historic expenditures provides context for scope of federal funding, but will not fully represent all current grants.

Federal Funding Expenditures from the Single Audit

The following table reflects the City's total expenditures from the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards (SEFA), submitted as part of the Single Audit.

- Totals exclude one-time COVID-19 relief funds and FEMA funds from the 2018 flood response
- Totals include formula grants and competitive grants
- City and PHMDC totals shown separately
- 2023 Total is higher than average from 2019 2022 due to U.S. DOT funding for E-W BRT and increased formula funding from U.S. HUD for CDBG, HOME, and Section 8 programs

The 2025 budget does not reflect all funding planned for this year. For example, the total may not include carry forward amount for grants issued in prior years.

For context, federal funds make up a relatively small portion of the City's total budget.

- Federal Grant funds = \$50.0 million
- 2025 all funds budget = \$828.8 million
- Federal grant revenues = 6% of all funds budget

A majority of City agencies do not rely on any federal funding, but it is an important revenue for some departments. The programs/ services that utilize the most federal funding include:

- CDA: Section 8 Housing vouchers
- CDD: CDBG grants
- Metro: Formula grants for operations
- Public Health: WIC and other programs
- Planning: MPO funding

Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) Tax Credits in the Capital Budget

Beginning in 2024, the City budgeted for IRA tax credits in capital programs related to energy efficiency and electric vehicles, and large facility projects with energy efficiency components. The 2024 CIP included over \$12 million in investments planned through 2029.
