To create excitement, the materials for this piece will be gathered by engaging the community in the process. The call will go out for donations of Tetra Pak, and the artist will create a video to help market the materials collection process. See sample video here...http://vimeo.com/70883632

The artist will host workshops in the space to get the community involved in design and preparing materials for the new work. One of the unique things about this process/piece is that the community members are not just spectators of the final result, but rather, involved participants in each stage of the process.

The sculpture will be hung in the ceiling space of the walkway in front of the new library. See attached photo. As the packages are turned inside out, the silver linings create a luminescent and reflective quality and the boxes three-dimentional nature provides lots of visual interest. The space has both natural and artificial light to create a great variety of reflective effects.

The artist has worked successully with communities in Mexico, Peru and now the United States to create highly recognized pieces out of recycled materials. The artist does not use the term reclycled, but feels materials have multiple uses and lives. He has also worked with diverse populations, which will inform this project in the underserved Meadowood neighborhood.

Artist Statement "For the last ten years, the focus of my work has been community-generated social sculpture projects, many of them large-scale. Community engagement and teamwork are crucial to each of my projects, as the people I collaborate with gather, process, and transform materials, building a sculpture piece by piece, while also making decisions about the final result. Each member of the community chooses her/his own level involvement in my projects.

Having lived and worked in Madison, WI since July of 2012, I have been continually impressed by the strong sense of community I've encountered here, and I believe that Madison is an ideal venue for the community-based projects I've detailed above. This is why I would like to propose a new project here, at the Madison Public Library's new Meadowridge location. Specifically, I'd like to construct an abstract 3D mural (relief) made from Tetra Pack, which will cover the four walls and the ceiling of the entrance hall of the new Library. This piece will be designed with the community, and the processes of gathering and transforming materials will take place there. Contact and exchange between community members will be a core element of this creative process, and each participant will discover new forms of communication and interaction.

With the support of the Madison Arts Commission, I would actualize this project and showcase the powers of communal and creative engagement."

5. What is the goal of your project?

The goal is create a site specific permanent artwork for the Meadowridge Library that invites community engagement in the artistic process.

6. What is the timeline for your project?

Materials workshops and collection will begin in fall 2013 with installation in Spring/ summer 2014.

7. Describe the professional experience of the proposed artist OR the process you will use to guaranty a highly qualified artist:

Victor Castro is a nationally recognized artist born in Monterrey, Mexico and is now living in Madison, WI. He has been a working artist since 1997, creating "social sculptures" from collected materials in exhibits all over the western hemisphere. He is establishing his career here in Madison, WI, and is working with the library on this and several other community/ library projects. 8. Describe the proposed site for this project and explain why it is appropriate for the work of art. How the work of art would enhance the location:

Like many local/ branch libraries, the Meadowridge Library sits in a strip mall at 5740 Raymond Road. While the interior of the library will have a thoughtful and exciting architectural design in the new location, the exterior presence will continue to have the feel of the existing strip mall. This publicly accessible piece enhancing the walkway entrance outside the library's doors will create a magnetic and interactive entry point of the library.

9. How will the work of art fit with neighborhood and City goals?

The neighborhood is exceptionally supportive of the renovation of the library and neighborhood center. Four neighborhood associations are represented on the volunteer steering committee designated to raise funds fo the new Meadowridge Library. The City of Madison and the mayor's office have specifically focused on improving neighborhood resources for Meadowood since the closure of Ace Hardware was announced last year. Investing in educational and health resources is critical to the vitality of the surrounding community. This project in particular meets the framework of public art goals by using a local artists to work with patrons on art-making activities. In addition, the new work by Victor Castro will contribute to the city's goal of place-making, designating the new library creative centerpiece and gathering place for community.

10. How long do you anticipate the project lasting (number of years)?

The work will be exhibited for a minimum of 10 years, which is the lease arrangement for the new space.

11. How will you know this project is successful?

Success will be measured by:

Community participation in the artistic process:

Long-term engagement between the community and the artist;

Public interaction and reaction with the new work.

12. How do you plan on contextualizing the artwork for the casual passerby? (for example - downloadable podcast or info on website, artist statement available someplace nearby, etc.)


The casual passerby is the intended audience for this piece. We want library visitors and non-visitors alike to enjoy the artwork. Information on the artists, the process and the artwork will be available by video on the library website, and in written form inside the library.

What maintenance costs do you anticipate in the course of the work's life and what is your plan to pay for 13. them?

Maintenance of the library owned artworks is budgeted through the annual operting budget. We plan to engage the artist in maintenance.

14. What is your plan for the work's end of life?

We will keep the piece at the library site for the life of the new library location - 10 years or more. We will keep a photographic and video record for documentation. The components can be recycled at the pieces' end of life.
