6. Product/Service Description:

Tellurian and Porchlight employ a total of 2.8 FTEs who work with homeless individuals in the State Street/downtown area with goals of reducing disruptive behaviors, making connections to services and helping homeless people obtain housing. The ReachOut Program staff is funded with federal PATH funds through a contract with Tellurian UCAN, which subcontracts for a some services with Porchlight. The City provides funds to pay for application fees, first months rent, security deposits and short-term rent subsidies to assist moving homeless individuals from the street into housing.

7. Anticipated Accomplishments (Numbers/Type/Outcome):

- 50% of 120 individuals will move from the streets into housing such as transitional, permanent or residential treatment (60 individuals).
- 50% of 120 individuals will be attached to supportive services such as mental health or AODA treatment programs (60 individuals)

Total Cost/Total Beneficiaries Equals: \$147,268 / 120 = \$1,227

CD Office Funds/CD-Eligible Beneficiaries Equals: \$12,268 / 15 = 818

CD Office Funds as Percentage of Total Budget: 9%

8. Staff Review (content, strengths/weaknesses, issues):

The addition of financial assistance increases the number of individuals who can be moved into housing and compliments the outreach work done by the ReachOut staff. In 2007, 30 individuals received financial assistance in the form of first months rent and security deposits. 97% of those assisted maintained housing at the 6 month mark.
