Please REALLOCATE 1% (or more!) of the MPD's budget to the Office of Independent Police Monitoring. The MPD must be held accountable so that our community can heal and, together, set things right.

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Please note the following comments related to excessive use of force in the Madison Police Department, following the harrowing tragedy we saw on Wednesday July 22nd, 2026.

My intention is for these to be read at the related meeting on Sept 22nd, if this agenda item was removed from Aug 4. Thanks:

Our police have rainbows on their vehicles, representing their allyship with the LGBTQIA+ community. That's wonderful. Some cars have puzzle pieces, representing Autism Awareness. MPD, the city of Madison & Mayor Satya Rhodes-Conway have the opportunity to set a precedent in this city.

You had this same chance in 2015 following the murder of Tony Robinson, at the hands of Officer Matthew Kenny whom remains serving on the MPD force to this day. It's not often folks are given second chances, and here is your's. Presented to you so perfectly with a bow tied on top.

Now, I did not know Corey Ruiz or Tony Robinson personally, nor did I know Paulie or Richard, who MPD also killed. I did not know Kevin Price, who Fitchburg PD murdered in 2024 responding to a wellness check of Kevin who was in a mental health crisis. I did not know Rashad, Aaron or Aajayah, whom Monona PD murdered in a high speed chase. None of these people were found guilty of a crime in the instances resulting in their deaths, but they all met their end at the hands of an entity we are told is meant to "protect & serve us all."

The reality of policing is this: Black people are incarcerated at higher rates than their white counterparts, for the same crimes, with harsher sentences or fines. The cash bail system is a scam meant to keep poor people jailed and those who follow the status quo in line. I'm saying we are done with the status quo—we are sick of watching police kill our neighbors. I'm angry Corey Ruiz's little girl has to dodge video footage of her father's execution on social media. I'm absolutely pissed that you keep stealing loved people based off of your anxiety and inability to self regulate.

As a social worker, do better. Not only for my friends, family & neighbors but for the future generations. They already do not have trust in these systems, and you continue to reinforce their distrust.

We the people demand the continued funding and support of the Civilian Police Oversight Board, diverting funds from armed militants such as police to essential social services directly working to solve our homeless/poverty crisis in this city.

Multiple systems failed Corey & many of you sitting up there have never known the struggle of not having a roof over your head, a dollar to your name, a pot to piss in, nor the knowledge of when your next meal will come.

Madison WI is the worst place for Black Americans to live, yet we are a safe haven for trans folks. THEY DO NOT HAVE TO BE MUTUALLY EXCLUSIVE! Show us you value every single one of your citizens and not just the ones that look and talk like you.

Do better, Madison.

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Hello,

Have you considered that now, more than ever, is the time to increase community oversight over the MPD? Whoever shot Corey Ruiz today should not only be fired, but banned from ever being a part of a police force ever again and facing criminal charges in court. But our tiny oversight board here in Madison doesn't have the power to fire individual police officers for their actions. How are they supposed to hold the MPD accountable when something like this happens?

You have to think about this from a safety perspective. If the MPD keeps white people safe in Madison, the PCOB keeps everyone safe. What does that say when they get less than 1% of the funding that MPD gets? In a nation that allows a cop to pull a firearm on a restrained, unarmed man, don't you think police oversight should be getting some more attention?

The community members that are going to be the most active with this board are naturally already those who are most affected by police violence and bias. That's why you simply can't make PCOB into a checkbox that says you've fulfilled some kind of "community oversight" requirement. People will find out. It will not be pretty when they realize that their safety has been taken as some trivial matter. If the city of Madison actually cares about the safety of every resident, this has to change now.

The ask is simple: follow Freedom Inc's recommendation to increase PCOB funding to 5% of the MPD. That's measly compared to what the MPOD has, but this matters right now. And **increase the jurisdiction of the PCOB to allow them the power of hiring/firing individual officers, creating new policies over the MPD, and making the board fully independent from the city.** That's how you empower the community to make meaningful improvements in matters of their own safety.

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Dear Alderpersons,

I am writing to urge you to fully fund Madison's civilian police oversight board.

The recent fatal police shooting over an alleged bicycle theft has deeply shaken my confidence in the Madison Police Department. I believe it is unacceptable that a situation involving suspected property crime ended with the loss of a person's life. To me, this raises serious questions about proportionality, decision-making, and accountability.

An independent, adequately funded civilian oversight board is essential. If the public had confidence that the police department consistently held its officers accountable and prioritized practices that made all members of our community feel safe and protected, there would not be such a strong demand for independent oversight. Unfortunately, that confidence has been eroded for many residents.

I do not believe it is a radical position to expect that the Madison Police Department should do everything possible to avoid killing people and reserve lethal force only for situations where there is truly no other option. That expectation is fundamental to public trust.

I ask that you support and fully fund the civilian oversight board so it has the independence, staffing, and resources necessary to provide meaningful oversight. Madison deserves a system that builds public confidence through transparency, accountability, and a commitment to preserving human life whenever possible.

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Dear Alders,

This is neither the time nor the manner with which to consider changes to the ordinance that created the PCOB and OIM.

The PCOB and OIM did not have an effective first few years. By its own description, the current membership of the PCOB has formed a better functioning Board. The interim IM appears to be performing the job in a far better manner than the initial IM. So although this entity has operated for several years, it is in its current iteration a fairly new body.

The Common Council created this entity and it should exercise oversight and review, but not now and not like this.

I suggest that the Council set a date - let's say July 2028 - and design and publicize a process and criteria that it will use to review the ordinance and function of the PCOB and OIM.

I chaired the City of Madison's Task Force on Government Structure. Although it was created by the Common Council, and spent two years doing the work the Council directed it to do, the Council largely ignored the report we submitted. One common theme we heard when reviewing the structure of Madison's government is that the Council provides little oversight and requires little in the way of accountability for the more than 100 boards, commissions and committees that are part of our city's government. Arguably the PCOB is one of our city's most significant boards. Any modifications to its enabling ordinance should be considered within a framework providing considerable advance notice with stated review criteria. This should not be done in the haphazard manner that has unfolded to date. In the wake of yesterday's gut wrenching, heart breaking killing of a resident by an MPD officer, I strongly urge the Council to take these amendments off of its agenda and not revisit them.

In the last year, especially since the closing of Dairy Drive, police presence in my neighborhood near Breese Steven's Field has grown constant. There are often police parked outside of my house doing nothing. I have encountered police in busy BRT stations, near the bathrooms at McPike Park, and inside Festival and Cargo Coffee Shop. All they seem to be doing is harassing unhoused people — often 3-5 officers standing over one seated person. It has always made me nervous to have so many powerful people wandering my neighborhood with guns that they could pull out at any moment.

Yesterday's murder of Corey Ruiz, as well as the murder of Tony Robinson, Richard Lee Johnson, and too many others by Madison Police, shows how founded that fear was.

As my representative on the common council, I ask that you push for the city to adopt these policies:

1. A fully empowered Independent Police Monitor.
2. No more budget increases for MPD. Funding redirected from police to organizations like Urban Triage, Madison Street Medicine, the Beacon, the Dane County Homeless Justice Initiative, and others that provide homelessness services.
3. A significant reduction in how many officers can carry guns and where those officers are permitted to carry guns.

The Office of the Independent Police Monitor the only office in Wisconsin whose job is to independently investigate what MPD does is operating on \$400,000 a year.

MPD's budget is \$90 million. The OIPM's is \$400,000. That is less than half of one percent of what MPD receives.

MPD has 492 sworn officers and 92 professional staff — 584 people. The OIPM has one part-time data analyst.

584 to 1. That is the staffing ratio between the department and the office meant to hold it accountable.

It has one part-time data analyst. No full-time investigators. No case management system, No case manager for the volume of work this moment demands.

A Black man was killed by an MPD officer on a public street. No body cameras. Witnesses with cell phones. A community demanding answers.

Monitor Glass has the authority to open an independent investigation. She has the experience she ran one of the highest-volume police accountability offices in Maryland. She has the will.

What she does not have is the resources this moment requires!!!

In June, the OIPM submitted a budget request for the 2027 cycle approximately \$900,000 to add staff and build the case management infrastructure this office needs to function at the level our community deserves.

That request has not been approved.

I am calling to authorize emergency supplemental funding for the Office of the Independent Police Monitor immediately. Not in the next budget cycle. Now.

Here is what that funding must cover:

- Full-time investigative staff so Monitor Glass can conduct the independent

My name is Michael Hopwood, and I am a District 16 resident living at 541 Aztalan Drive. I am writing to the entire Common Council today in a state of profound grief and outrage regarding the fatal shooting of a community member by a Madison Police officer this afternoon on Willy Street.

The graphic footage circulating on social media of this struggle and subsequent killing is horrifying. For Black and brown communities in Madison, this is not an isolated incident; it is a painful, repeating reminder of a systemic failure in how our city approaches public safety, de-escalation, and policing in marginalized communities. The use of lethal force in our streets must not be normalized, and we cannot continue to accept the status quo.

As representatives elected to serve and protect all residents of Madison, I am calling on each of you to use your legislative platform on the Common Council to take immediate, unified action:

- **Demand a Full, Transparent Investigation:** Push for a completely independent investigation into the tactics used during this attempted arrest, including why lethal force was used when the victim had already been tasered.

Good evening President Madison and Common Council Members.
Thank you for the opportunity to speak tonight.

I am deeply grieving the killing of Corey Ruiz by a Madison Police Officer. Our entire community is grieving, outraged, and demands transparency, accountability, and consequences for this tragic killing.

My name is Barbie Jackson. I am a 59-year resident of Madison. My personal story may be unusual to hear, but it explains why I am so committed to my advocacy work.

As a young student I arrived at UW in September 1967. Within a month of my arrival, the campus and city were in chaos following Madison police tear gassing and brutality against protesters trying to block recruitment by Dow Chemical, the manufacturer of Agent Orange, which was devastating the people of Viet Nam and the US soldiers drafted and sent to war. The impact of this time period, documented as [The War at Home](#) (see this 2-minute clip), left an indelible mark on my

understanding of power imbalance and on my life personally.

Today I reflect on a transformed life dedicated to the well-being of others and advocacy for a just society. I raised two children in need of protective services and then received a call to volunteer with teens first at the Allied Dunns Marsh Neighborhood center and then at the Boys and Girls Club. This led me to a 30-year relationship with low-income, primarily African American children, youth and young adults, which gave me a deep appreciation for their life challenges and the harms many of them have suffered.

In the summer of 2016 after learning once again about a Black man who was shot by a police officer, I resolved to shift from direct service to advocacy for criminal legal system reform. I learned about organizing and I learned how to focus.

Today another Black man has been killed by a police officer on Madison streets. There must be accountability for this tragedy.

The Office of the Independent Police Monitor and the Police Civilian Oversight Board are a critical component of the change that must occur in Madison.

I am thankful, President Madison, for your July 27th Statement to the Common Council, which effectively removes all existing proposals to amend the ordinances that established the OIPM and the PCOB. I am thankful for your public commitment to Chair Pearson to pursue restorative justice to “begin a meaningful process of rebuilding trust, improving communication and collaboration, and creating a stronger foundation for the important work of police oversight.”

I call on the full Common Council to respect this first step toward assurance that there will be no future efforts to interfere with the independence and authority of the OIPM and the PCOB.

In the wake of the tragic killing of Corey Ruiz, there are many calls to fund body-worn cameras for MPD. I call on you to assure that any such

efforts leave the OIPM and PCOB budget intact, including its intended request for an increase to 1% of the MPD budget.

I spent the last year on the Executive Committee and was involved in the hiring process during the second go around. Let me introduce myself and past relevant information. I started and ran a non-profit and operated for 17 years working with young people who were street involved and without a home. I was responsible for hiring, supervising, and sometimes having to let staff people go. At the end of my tenure, I had 23 full-time staff and several part-time staff and interns. Having said that, I can say the hiring process we were given was flawed and was run by the City's HR and City Attorney Haas.

After the first round, then Alder Knox was on the Board and was causing havoc when he showed up. He wanted to downsize the qualifications for the next round. He suggested they only have a high school diploma; anything so the PCOB could hire someone as there was extreme pressure the city put on us to hire. The PCOB had to form a new group and understand our roles. The City HR had given us questions, how they wanted us to interview and the scoring system. We tried to understand the questions the City HR provided and the interviewees were also confused and talked about things other than what the question was trying to ask. Scoring was difficult based on the answers they were supposed to speak to. But four of us did as we were told. Our first choice turned the position down. Under EXTREME pressure to hire, we chose candidate number two, Robert Copely.

The President of the PCOB directly supervised him and brought back a laundry list of his inability to do the job and had given him every chance to come into compliance with his job description and brought this information to the EC (which I was on then). We were ready to let him go.

Then, he went into the hospital for three months and came back Robin Copley. We were advised not to fire by attorney Haas because she could have a law suit against the city. So, instead of doing what was best for the OIPM which was to let her go and find someone more competent, we kept her on because of the city attorney Haas. All of the problems related to her work caused an uproar and funding to be slashed. All of the problems you may have with her work or lack of work can be blamed on bad interview

questions (city HR) and city attorney Haas for making us keep her while knowing she could not do the job. This is how the city controlled the PCOB and OIM and even had a disruptive alder on the board. This has been city controlled and the city's involvement is what I blame for all these mishaps. This clearly shows the conflict of interest when the City is involved.

Now, the PCOB is fully formed and competent received required trainings, etc. The Interim IPM is doing exactly what we wanted and could not find until now; she is working for the community. Let's keep community at the center of It all. There are many reasons to stick with the original (unless there is an amendment strengthening their independence.)

The first one is transparency. As a community member, I have craved the truth and believe each community member deserves it. Secondly, the community needs to have a trusting relationship with the police. These are only a couple of things that will happen with keeping the OIPM – Independent!

To: President Madison: Your non-support of keeping the original ordinance is glaring and unacceptable. MANY of us see how you are not standing up for community. My mother used to say you can't make sense out of nonsense. So, I will leave it at that. We are watching you.

One last, but very important thing: **DO NOT PUT THIS VOTE OFF FOR ANOTHER DAY! AUGUST 4th – Nothing else is acceptable!** I will be one of many protesting your plan to not address this on August 4th. I will stand on the side of the people. I will use my National, State, and City news contacts.

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The independent civilian police monitor that was established with corresponding local ordinances must be allowed and supported to do its job.

We need an investigation into MPD's own stated policy regarding de-escalation:

"If feasible, under the totality of the circumstances, officers should attempt to slow down or stabilize the situation so that more time, options, and resources are available for the best possible resolution."

It lists specific tactics officers are required to consider:

- Have only one officer communicate with the person at a time
- Request Mental Health Officers or Crisis Negotiation Team members if indicated
- Use distance and time, when feasible because more distance creates more time to consider less lethal options
- Use cover and concealment place environmental barriers between the person and officers
- Take steps to calm the person
- Actively listen to the person's concerns
- Explain the person's options
- Orient the person to reality
- Attempt to be truthful
- Gather additional information about the person

It goes on to say:

"Once the subject and scene have been stabilized, officers should work to resolve the situation using the least restrictive measures to secure the welfare of all those concerned, to connect individuals with mental illness or substance use concerns to needed services, and to divert them from the criminal justice system whenever possible."

It specifically says: "Strong consideration should be given for a medical evaluation, particularly when the source or reason for the behavior cannot be determined or if the source is suspected drug use or a mental health crisis."

Most reasonable people who have considered the video evidence and testimony of witnesses and police officers on the scene could conclude that these policies were not followed.

It doesn't even seem there was a justifiable reason to pursue this person who fled on bicycle! Evidence indicates that he was known to police and could be found in the community, and there was no real, imminent threat nor crime to justify the initial pursuit, much less to push/hit someone off a bicycle and into traffic.

This is horrifying and obscene. The officers escalated and created a dangerous situation.

Further, the use of deadly force was clearly not justified when the perpetrator was being tazed and held down by multiple officers. The knife, whether it was wielded or simply found and tossed away (as it's hard to say from current evidence if the officers were cut in the process of physically apprehending someone with a knife in their pants), did not pose a threat at the time the shots were fired - it was on the ground.

It seems apparent from available evidence that the officer reacted in rage to being cut (if that's what happened), and took someone's life as if it was his RIGHT to be judge, jury and executioner.

1. MPD did not follow THEIR OWN POLICY at multiple points leading up to the shooting.
2. There was no imminent threat when the MPD pursued and physically assaulted the suspected perp.
3. There was no imminent threat to officers by a person who was brought to his knees by a taser, kicked and held down by officers, and a knife that was out of his possession at the time shots were fired.

The officer who fired shots must be held accountable, fired without pay, and prosecuted. The MPD needs to be reined in and forced to follow its own policies. Otherwise, how can any citizen feel safe or able to rely on our police for support and protection? You cross a cop, and they can execute you.

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Hello Alders and Mayor,

I'm emailing to ask the Mayor and Common Council for emergency funding for the OIPM. I have read that many folks want body cameras for the police but this will not protect anyone from harm from police officers or the MPD in general. We need accountability and we need it fast. If there is emergency funding it should not go to the entity that is needing structural change. Throwing cameras in the mix will not change Madison's racial disparity (largest in the nation!!) when it comes to who is targeted, harmed, and imprisoned in this city.

To quote my alder Carmella Glenn:

"The Office of the Independent Police Monitor the only office in Wisconsin whose job is to independently investigate what MPD does is operating on \$400,000 a year.

MPD's budget is \$90 million. The OIPM's is \$400,000.
That is less than half of one percent of what MPD receives.

MPD has 492 sworn officers and 92 professional staff — 584 people.
The OIPM has one part-time data analyst.

584 to 1. That is the staffing ratio between the department and the office meant to hold it accountable.

It has one part-time data analyst. No full-time investigators. No case management system, No case manager for the volume of work this moment demands.

A Black man was killed by an MPD officer on a public street. No body cameras. Witnesses with cell phones. A community demanding answers.

Monitor Glass has the authority to open an independent investigation. She has the experience she ran one of the highest-volume police accountability offices in Maryland. She has the will.

What she does not have is the resources this moment requires!!!

In June, the OIPM submitted a budget request for the 2027 cycle approximately \$900,000 to add staff and build the case management infrastructure this office needs to function at the level our community deserves.

That request has not been approved, yet."

At this moment our community wants real equity and lasting solutions we cannot wait until

2027 we have waited long enough!

Please authorize emergency supplemental funding for the Office of the Independent Police Monitor immediately. Not in the next budget cycle.

Here is what that funding must cover:

- Full-time investigative staff so Monitor Glass can conduct the independent investigation this killing demands without being stretched beyond what a \$400,000 budget can hold

It appears that Madison police are not following Recommendation 109 from the MPD Policy and Procedure Review Committee that was adopted in 2019. Additionally, it is a violation of human rights for an individual to be executed without access to a fair trial first. I prepared the following statement on July 23rd, preparing to speak at the community listening session. I later learned that was postponed to hold vigil for Cory Ruiz and mourners. I would like my statement below still heard as my feelings are just the same today.

Since writing the statement below, I have learned that the Common Council has withdrawn the proposed amendments to the Office of the Independent Monitor and Police Civilian Oversight Board ordinances in favor of mediation and a restorative justice process. While I support good-faith dialogue, I do not believe mediation should replace accountability, transparency, or meaningful reform.

I have also followed up with additional requests below. I expect a follow-up response post haste.

Written July 23, 2026:

1st Id like to extend my condolences and prayers for healing to Cory Ruiz family as well as all the mourners due to police brutality.

My name is Lindi

Im here to speak about my observations of racism, bigotry, bias, and cowardace in this community.

I've lived in this community for roughly 40 years. Prior to that, I mainly grew up in rural Wisconsin. My mother, whom is abt 87.5% white, raised me. The rest of me is home grown, organic, Turtle Islander. I've been given life experience in being able to identify the process of said topics. An up close exposure if you will. I see the underlying racist, bigotted values that have been engrained in our society from humble dwellings to rolling acres. I see the bias towards money and power, and the cowardace masks that are worn before leaving the home.

In my time here, growing up in the juvenile system to everyday present life, I see those masks here in Madison. From city officials, to the court system, medical, mental health srvs, to police officers.

As for MPD, I have witnessed and experienced many counts of racial profiling, dirty investigating, unprofessional and highly juvenile behavior. All while wearing a blue mask.

Then you have city officials, biased towards money and power, wearing their "I care" masks. Allowing these over emotional, trigger happy, fellow mask wearers running around with no true accountability.

City officials as well as the MPD are servants to the people, not the money and the power!

A thorough investigation into long standing corruption in this community needs to happen NOW!

In closing, I'd like to add the way media and such are portraying Mr. Ruiz's rap sheet as just cause for the shooting, let me call out my observation this is just another cowardice mask to point the blame rather than look at the deeper picture.

Present day, these are my additional demands:

1. I ask for a prompt, transparent, and independent investigation into the shooting of Cory Ruiz. Based on the videos I have personally viewed, I believe there was no imminent threat that justified deadly force. If investigators conclude that criminal conduct occurred, I expect the appropriate prosecuting authority to pursue charges.

2. Provide emergency funding to the Office of the Independent Monitor. **THIS IS NOT A BUDGET DEBATE!!!!**

3. I have recently learned about Recommendation 109. I understand it was adopted in 2019 and never implemented. I am holding this Council and City leadership accountable for that failure. I expect a public explanation and a timeline for implementation.

4. Strengthen the Civilian Oversight Board. As discussions move forward through mediation, ensure that the end result is a stronger, more independent Board with meaningful disciplinary authority to the fullest extent allowed by law.

5. MPD and DCI should be in FULL compliance with providing ALL information lawfully requested by the Office of the Independent Monitor.

6. I request renewed transparency regarding the Tony Robinson case, including a public explanation of what additional review or release of information is legally possible.

Mayor Rhodes-Conway, I ask that you publicly support meaningful police accountability, emergency funding for the Office of the Independent Monitor, implementation of Recommendation 109, and meaningful strengthening of civilian oversight as this mediation process moves forward.

Like many Madison residents, I am deeply disturbed by the police shooting that occurred today. This incident unfolded in public, was witnessed by numerous community members, and has already been captured from multiple angles on video. Regardless of what the investigation ultimately concludes, the scale of public exposure means that this event will have lasting impacts on community trust, and our collective trauma.

For that reason, I am asking the City to ensure that this incident receives a truly independent, transparent, and comprehensive investigation.

Specifically, I urge the City to:

- Ensure that the Office of the Independent Monitor is fully engaged within the scope of its authority.
- Preserve and review all available evidence, including any body-worn camera footage, dashboard camera footage, civilian videos, dispatch recordings, and witness statements.
- Communicate regularly with the public about the investigative process while protecting the integrity of the investigation.
- Release all information that can legally be released as quickly as possible once appropriate.

I submit these comments for consideration at tonight's meeting regarding the changes to MGO 5.19 and 5.20 (Legistar [92386](#) and Legistar [94126](#)), which are agenda items 2 and 3.

The mission and goals of the Office of the Independent Monitor remain necessary, and true independence is critically important. The tragic shooting of Corey Ruiz by a Madison police officer yesterday is graphic evidence: when police use deadly force, the public needs independent oversight it can trust.¹

The record since the Council's April 21 referral speaks for itself. The Council voted 16 to 4 to send Legistar 92386 back to the PCOB with a return date of August 4, a 15-week window. Between April 21 and July 22, the PCOB and its subcommittees met five times, and the item appeared on no agenda; four other meetings were canceled.² Tonight's meeting, the first on the referral, was announced at 3:17 p.m. yesterday with no agenda attached, 93 days after the Council's vote and 12 days before the Council acts.³ An agenda was posted online later in the evening. My April 22 email to the chair asking for the board's plan to address this legislation, and its arrangements for legal counsel, has received no response.⁴ Meanwhile, three versions of the legislation are set for the Council's August 4 agenda, and each affects the independence of the OIM and the PCOB: each places the office within the city's administrative structure and its Administrative Procedure Memoranda, each reshapes the office's use of legal counsel, and two condition the mechanics of records access on a negotiated Memorandum of Understanding.⁵

There are two ways to read those 93 days, and neither is good. Either the PCOB did nothing on the Council's referral until now, or work occurred outside noticed public meetings, contrary to Wisconsin's open meetings law, which requires the business of a governmental body, and of its subcommittees, to be conducted in meetings that are publicly noticed and open to the public.⁶ I have

no evidence that a quorum deliberated in private. What the record shows is the absence of agenda items, minutes, a public plan, and an answer to a direct written question about the plan.

Given that record, I will make two recommendations to the Common Council:

1. The Council should appoint a workgroup to update MGO 5.19 and 5.20, modeled on the 2020 Alder Workgroup that created these ordinances, with public meetings, public comment at every meeting, and diverse perspectives at the table. The PCOB has demonstrated it is not up to the task.
2. The Council should retain a consultant to assist that workgroup: a subject-matter expert in police oversight, a mediator, or both.

I also urge the PCOB to take two actions of its own:

1. Consider changes to your leadership to improve the PCOB's effectiveness, transparency, and accountability.
2. Promptly retain independent legal counsel experienced in municipal law to advise the PCOB in areas where the Office of the City Attorney has a conflict of interest, including the revisions to MGO 5.19 and 5.20. The City Attorney's office wrote and has defended these amendments; the PCOB should not rely on their counsel to evaluate them.

Doing this well cannot be done in the two remaining weeks. Addressing the Council's concerns and closing the gaps in MGO 5.19 and 5.20, as revealed by a comparison with other municipalities, is substantial work. Some municipalities, for example, give the monitor the right to participate in interviews of witnesses in officer-involved deaths and in internal police department investigations. That is the kind of improvement a properly supported workgroup can evaluate, and a rushed rewrite cannot.

Whatever the PCOB decides tonight, do this work in noticed public meetings: hear the public, deliberate in open session, and send the Council a recommendation it can weigh on August 4. The ordinance you operate under was built in the open in 2020.⁷ Its revision should be too.

In that time I became more and more convinced that lasting mental health and healing will not happen unless root causes of trauma are effectively addressed. This includes the ongoing trauma that Black and Brown community experience in the form of witnessing and experiencing police violence.

STOP trying to gut the independence of the strongest police oversight mechanism in the country and our community.

The effort to find "experts" who will support the effort to water down the OIM and PCOB.

We need efforts surrounding the OIM and PCOB.

The amendments in Legistar file 92386 threaten the independence of the Office of the Independent Police Monitor (OIM) and Police Civilian Oversight Board (PCOB).

Please discontinue the amendments in Legistar file 92386. These amendments make no sense, they have wasted significant time and tax dollars that should have been spent on fulfilling the OIM and PCOB mandate to investigate harm caused by MPD and to prevent injury.

Alders who wish to address what they feel are problems within the OIM or PCOB or who wish to help strengthen the office have always had these options available to them:

- 1.) Ask the OIM and PCOB members questions and for solutions.
- 2.) Consult with the primary author of the ordinance, Rebecca Kemble, who is uncompromisingly, unquestionably pro-independent oversight and highly educated on the subject.
- 3.) Consult with the National Police Accountability Project, a nonprofit that has extensive experience with civilian police oversight mechanisms.
- 4.) Invite Florance Finkle to a meeting. She is in OIR group (the group that reviewed MPDs policies, procedures and culture) and the President of the National Association of the Civilian Oversight of Law Enforcement.

These individuals and entities are experts or well educated on the subject matter, they are readily available and safe sources as they fully support independent, community-based police oversight.

When alders go to other individuals who have demonstrated they are not pro-independent

community oversight of the police, like Madison's City Attorneys, including Andy Schauer (the former longtime police union attorney), they demonstrate that they are willing to undermine the oversight mechanism for personal or political gain.

The following nonsense excuses/political doublespeak/distractions are those we've heard come from the alders who support these and past harmful amendments. This dishonest behavior harms families like Richard Johnson's.

I am a supporter and would like to maintain community oversight local and with representation of those impacted by these harms to better the system and two way communications.

I am once again urging to let the OIM and PCOB do their important work.

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Dear Alders,

I am writing you today as a heartbroken resident of Madison, and as a member of the First United Methodist Church faith community.

The shocking death of Corey Ruiz at the intersection of Williamson Street and South Baldwin has reopened a spiritual wound that, seemingly, refuses to heal. I thought, perhaps, that our community could indeed heal following the shooting death of Paul Heenan. And, then, Ashley DiPiazza. And, then, Tony Robinson. But, now, with the death of Corey Ruiz, I fear that our city and its people may never, truly, have a chance to heal. And I grieve that lost opportunity, and my own growing loss of hope.

For those reasons and more, a timely, thorough and fully transparent investigation into Corey's death must take place. I am well aware of the fact that modern history does not reveal any instance in Madison when a law enforcement officer has been criminally charged in an on-duty shooting death. Similarly, no law enforcement officer in Wisconsin has ever been convicted at criminal trial for an on-duty shooting death. Candidly, I have no expectation of a different outcome in Corey's investigation and charging decision by the Dane County District Attorney. But, "legal" and "morally right" are two different standards. And we cannot say, as legislators and as citizens of this great city, that everything was "done right" in Corey's death. We cannot simply pronounce that a young black man's death on our streets at the hands of law enforcement personnel is acceptable and normative. As Mayor Satya Rhodes-Conway said in a recent press conference, "It does not matter who you are or what your past is. You should not lose your life as a result of an encounter with law enforcement."

I also want to take this opportunity to praise those alders who decided to withdraw proposals to amend the ordinance creating the Police Civilian Oversight Board and Office of Independent Monitor. Clearly, the PCOB and IM Glass viewed those proposed amendments as harmful to both the independence and the effectiveness of the PCOB/OIM. I urge the Common Council to continue to work with the PCOB/OIM, to find common ground for dialogue, and to work together for the greater good of Madison. That includes appropriate funding of the PCOB/OIM to a minimum of 1% of the Madison Police Department budget. As the only civilian oversight organization monitoring MPD, it is essential that the PCOB/OIM continue their independent work, and that they are supported by appropriate budget dollars to make that work more than perfunctory. I believe that support for the PCOB/OIM is essential in rebuilding the lost trust

between MPD and a significant part of our city's community.

Thank you for reading my plea and listening to my concerns. I encourage you . . . I encourage all of us . . . to find the moral courage to lift up the City of Madison and build the beloved community we all desire.

Hello City of Madison Alders and Mayor Rhodes-Conway:

I am saddened by the recent fatal shooting of another young black man, Corey Ruiz, by an officer of the City of Madison Police Department yesterday, Wednesday, July 22. As news reports have come out about this tragic incident what rises to the top for myself and many others in our community is that this man, regardless of what acts he may have committed that day or in the past, was still someone's son, relative, and friend. And what baffles and frustrates me the most is the lingering question of how can one man on a bicycle, even having brandished a knife, end up dead when he is outnumbered 4:1 by police officers? No suspected perpetrator in such a scenario should end up dead. Period. Mr. Ruiz may have had a long arrest and conviction record, he may have been breaking the law by attempting to enter parked cars, and he may have been resisting arrest, but none of those justify him being killed. He did not deserve to die. Period. In addition, if it turns out he was experiencing some sort of mental health crisis, then that should be recognized and de-escalated so that, again, he did not end up dead.

It is no accident in America that it is young Black men who experience unjust and often fatal treatment at the hands of law enforcement. The historical roots of this phenomenon need to be more thoroughly examined by communities and law enforcement agencies and real change needs to be enacted in many levels. We as a community cannot fix everything but we can start by everyone in positions of authority, such as yourselves, to not only call for but ensure that proper investigation be done of this killing and proper and compassionate care be afforded Corey Ruiz's family.

This is a time when the Police Civilian Oversight Board needs to be allowed to operate independently and fully, and for the public to be informed of developments in this situation. The tightest oversight should be of the police department and its handling of this matter.
