

## Elementary Access Workgroup Charge Status Update October 14, 2016

Goal: To improve access and increase participation among elementary age youth in quality out-of-school time programs.

- 1. Objective: Identify barriers that families experience when accessing elementary programs.
  - ✓ Assess current situation through focus groups, provider surveys, etc.
  - ✓ Report findings.
  - ✓ Prioritize issues and challenges.
- 2. Objective: Strategize solutions regarding MOST's work with increasing access to elementary programs.
- 3. Objective: Address barriers families experience and/or suggest policy as it relates to Madison families accessing elementary OST programs.

Family survey via MMSD online  Presentation to Elementary Access Workgroup 9/9/16	Administered to 14,000 households with elementary-age child(ren) enrolled in MMSD, available in English, Hmong and Spanish; responses were based on youngest child. 1,463 (10%) of elementary parents responded; AA 8%, Asian 7%, Hispanic 12%, Multiracial 9%, White 65%, 16% ELL, Students with Disabilities 6%, Low income 22%		
Key findings shared with Coalition 10/14/16	<ol> <li>When asked to choose the program type in which their children are enrolled, the most common response among parents overall was "I'm not sure." The next most common program types, in order, were Recreation/Physical Activity, followed by Arts/Cultural Enrichment.</li> <li>Parents overall cited Location, Hours of Operation, Content of Program and Cost, in order, as the four most important things in an after-school program.</li> <li>Among parents who didn't have a child enrolled in an after school program, the top two reasons for not enrolling their child(ren) in a program were: Other Reason(s), 63% and the Programs are Too Expensive, 20%.</li> </ol>
