Comments for Testimony

In my five minutes, rather than tackling the entire capital budget, I will focus on one aspect that has many ramifications—transportation. Society in general has grossly subsidized automobile traffic while undercutting alternatives such as bicycling, walking, or riding the bus. Despite his supposed credentials as an environmentalist concerned about low income people, the budget and policies of this Mayor follow the course of encouraging car use even as he wants to blame the State and Federal governments for what he is doing. Let's show some imagination here. For instance, if he wanted, he could show that Madison is committed to a different set of priorities, that a Fit City puts its money where its mouth is by better funding the bus and making car use less preferred than other transportation modes. After all, our air quality as well as other things depends on it, ultimately with serious health and economic ramifications. My main focus here is on the amount that is required to keep the bus service at the inadequate level it is at presently, a gap of perhaps a million and a half dollars. Keep that amount in perspective as various allocations are discussed.

Perhaps the most obvious one is the mid State St. Parking structure. My limited exposure to behind-thescenes City work leads me to believe that the citizen group dealing with the issue rejected the notion of a structure. The Mayor decided to have one anyway, and is now budgeting one in against other people's wishes, and **supposedly** "responsibly" putting us in debt to do so. We have a price tag of \$11.5 million.

Then there is something called Capitol Square Bus Shelter Replacement to the tune of \$300,000, which is related to the fact that parking was put on the square to the detriment of bicycles and buses. Now, we are supposed to prefer, and I quote, "the replacement of the seven existing bus shelters around the Capitol Concourse with four new shelters. Three of the existing shelters will be replaced with benches, planters and other amenities." at the expense of cutting bus service because of insufficient funds. Also, most bus riders would prefer shelters from wind, rain and snow, to benches, planters and other amenities.

Whenever I've asked for a shelter at my stop, I am of course told that there are no funds for that. Yet, have you noticed that with the redesign of State St. perfectly good bus shelters were torn down and replaced by fancy new and expensive ones? Whose priorities are setting how money is being spent? Certainly not bus riders. But of course, this is **supposedly** responsible budgeting.

The most egregious spending that is too opaque for me to make a stab at specifics although that is unnecessary, is that of engineering and street projects. We are talking millions of dollars here folks, and hundreds of thousands get tossed around with relative ease. I can say that it felt surreal to sit in a recent Ped/Bike/Motor Vehicle Commission meeting in which the City Engineer was outlining major road projects with astronomical costs even as the bus system was desperately asking the Transit and Parking Commission to raise user fees to cover perhaps half a million dollars. And we'll be hearing more about funding for buses in the Operating Budget.

Lastly a comment about the astronomical cost of fuel. I wanted to attend one of the Mayor's budget forums that dealt with that issue among other things. But guess what? I use the bus while the meetings were set up for car drivers on the outskirts of town. Maybe that's the loudest statement the Mayor could make about his real transportation priorities and concern about fuel.
