Current City-County Cooperative Purchasing Efforts

- City has worked with county on some bids with limited results (e.g., CAMA property assessment software, uniforms)
- County and city are participating in the new Sustainable Purchasing Consortium
- Purchases of common items like office supplies, ordinary vehicles, paper etc. are often done under state or cooperative purchasing contracts and do not necessitate bids

Supports a wide array of hardware, software, and a large wide-area telecommunications network which is in operation twenty four hours a day/seven days a week, and is connected to other computer networks at the county, state, and federal levels. Supports a wide variety of software from email to document management systems to enterprise databases, facilitates the dissemination of city information to the public via the city website, and provides the ability for the public to conduct business with the city via the Internet. Operates Madison City Channel which provides television and internet streaming coverage of public meetings, in support of public access, open government, and transparency. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Supports computing infrastructure and applications for over 3,000 users, 4,000 hardware devices, and over 400 software programs. Supports 24/7 operations for the following departments: PSC (911), Sheriff (Jail and Records), Medical Examiner, Human Services, Badger Prairie Health Care Center, Juvenile Detention, and others Supports Mobile Devices, Wireless Devices, Workstations, Thin Clients, Printers, Multi-function Devices, Virtual Applications, Physical Applications, Virtual Servers, Physical Servers, Storage Area Networks, Databases, Citrix Terminal Servers, Email, E-discovery, Voice Over IP, Analog Phones, Video Conferencing and a large wide-area telecommunications network which is in operation twenty four hours a day/seven days a week, and is connected to other computer networks at the towns, villages, cities, state, and federal levels. Supports both internally developed and purchased software which is used by County employees and contracted agencies. Software products range from document imaging and tax collection to budgeting/accounting, Payroll, and Human Services billing and client tracking.

Current City-County Cooperative Information Technology Efforts

- City provides access for the Dane County Sheriff Dept. and 17 other municipalities in Dane County to the Police Records system (LERMS) and report dictation system (Dictaphone)
- County provides MPD and the 17 municipality consortium with access to the County's law enforcement records system and the jail management system.
- City hosts a disaster recover site for the County at the Olin Ave data center. This includes network connectivity using city-owned fiber-optic cable between the CCB and the Olin Ave data center
- City and County share a gigabit connection to WiscNet for Internet service and share in the cost.

- City provides City Channel coverage of County Board meetings on a fee for service basis
- City and County share GIS data for streets, centerlines, addresses, parcels through the County Land Information Office
- City hosts the permitting application used by the County Planning & Zoning Department.
- City provides IT support for the City-County Public Health Department as part of the administrative support sharing structure that accompanied the merger.
- County shares cost of in-squad video system used by the Sheriff's department
- County shares cost of Dictaphone (voice recording) system used by the Sheriff department.
- City and County conduct periodic meetings to highlight current an future projects and explore where cooperation might be mutually beneficial to both the City and the County.

- **Discussions in other areas include:**
 - Connecting the City and County wireless networks so that County employees using county-owned conference rooms can access their network wirelessly and vice versa.
 - Share connectivity on the wide area wireless network so wherever a county employee travels *within the city of Madison they would have wireless connectivity to the County Network.*
 - Installing joint fiber-optic laterals to Metropolitans Unified Fiber Network (MUFN) backbone fiber, in order to connect city and county facilities in close proximity to each other.
