Hello,

I remain deeply concerned about the issue of the Edgewood stadium. I am convinced that it will be a needless disruption to the neighborhood that has already experienced great disruption as a result of the Monroe Street reconstruction.

Many stadium supporters have asked "What about Friday Night Lights"? Edgewood has a stadium to play in at the present time. There is no need for this new facility. This is especially true given the number of Edgewood students who live in the suburbs - closer to the present stadium than to the actual school grounds. Many area high schools do not have a stadium on their grounds, including West and East High Schools. Having a stadium on the grounds of the school does not deprive students of anything.

Dear Allen,

I am strongly opposed to Edgewood High School's proposed plan for a stadium to host football games. I've read the "Edgewood High School Athletic Complex Agreement" (to which I and several others do not agree) and don't feel it addresses our serious concerns about the proposal, namely:

- Crowd noise from events; Edgewood can in no way control crowd noise, and as we live a block away from the current practice field, we already hear loud crowd noise from track & field and soccer events. It's not always welcome.
- Parking and litter; whatever Edgewood says, we believe we will end up with event attendees parking on our street (West Lawn) and we know from experience, again, that this inevitably leads to litter, from candy wrappers to beer bottles, in our street and on our property.

Spillover of behavior; we're not opposed to kids having fun on Friday night, but we know that rowdy, potentially destructive behavior often spills out of sports stadiums into neighboring areas.

- Commercialization and expanded use of stadium; we're betting that stadium events will not be limited to Friday nights. Eventually, there will be more and more special events over there and the annoyances will happen more often than not.
- Property value: can Edgewood or the City guarantee that this facility and it's resulting noise, traffic congestion, litter, etc. will have no negative effect on our property value? I doubt it.

Note that I did not mention light pollution, which is another concern but less worrisome than those listed above. Edgewood seems to want to focus on high-tech lighting as a way to ameliorate neighborhood concerns, but lighting is only one of several issues, most of which they have no control over.

Finally, I'm disappointed in Edgewood High School because it does not, in fact, seem to be acting as a good neighbor. We attended a meeting at Edgewood HS several months ago and the strong majority of their neighbors who spoke were opposed to the stadium idea. Edgewood is evidently ignoring that sentiment and rolling ahead with its plans. I don't regard that as a decision that a good neighbor would make, in light of what they heard from us all.

Please vote against the proposal. Also, would you mind sending me the date on which the proposal will be considered by the City?

I just wanted to thank you for doing such an amazing job as our alder! We've been really grateful for the flood reports, and I've talked with many neighbors who are really impressed by your dedication and great communication. Thank you so much; everyone appreciates it!

I wanted to submit my feedback on the Edgewood proposal for a stadium with lights and sound. I'm opposed to the stadium for the following reasons:

- -I don't support a private school building a stadium and making money off it, when West High doesn't have a football field or a stadium.
- -This neighborhood simply can't absorb the impact of a stadium. The neighborhood streets can't handle the traffic impact that stadium crowds would bring. There's not enough parking, and residents already compromise by having their streets taken over by Edgewood student parkers all day on the weekdays. The lights, sound, and spectator noise before and after events would be incredibly disruptive to the entire neighborhood, particularly immediately surrounding the stadium.
- -I don't support negatively impacting the surrounding ecological environment with a football stadium. Our natural resources are precious and threatened, and sporting/entertainment events aren't. There are plenty of local places to watch sports and hear music--our own public high schools play their sports off-site in many cases, especially in the case of football. I can't support a private high school building a non-essential structure that will impact the wildlife around the stadium, not to mention people's quiet enjoyment of Vilas Park, Lake Wingra and the trails, bike paths, and woods around it. I'm also not comfortable with the impact of the sound on the zoo animals.

Dear Neighbors,

I hope you will consider those who live directly around the practice field. Unlike the fields at Memorial or Redden or Middleton, there is no buffer whatsoever between the field and the surrounding homes. The stadiums in our community were built with large areas of buffering land before any residences, and the homes around were built contemporaneously with the stadium. Those who purchased those homes did so with full knowledge of their proximity to a stadium. On the other hand there are about \$12 million in homes directly surrounding the field with no intermediary property. Our homes are 90-100 years old and have been owned in many cases for decades. A similar proposal had been rejected some decades ago, so neighbors had no indication there could be such an extreme change to the situation.

This is a typical view from a bedroom surrounding the field. Note that if this field were Camp Randall, properties would be *within* the stadium.



Can you imagine sleeping or putting children to bed with 35+ night events with lights, sound, and over a thousand people? Eating dinner or having a conversation? The crowds would be facing Woodrow homes; there is no way to control the noise of such a crowd.

Also, do not underestimate the traffic impacts for the neighborhood. This listserve lit up with complaints when Edgewood hosted a Girls on the Run event. The event had about 1000 people in attendance, and at the end, the neighborhood was completely blocked by traffic. Cars could not move in either direction on Monroe St. Sidestreets were packed in, and there was essentially no movement for 45 min. People were very concerned that with such events emergency vehicles could not move through or into the neighborhood.

This is an unreasonable proposal that will affect the ability of tax paying property owners to enjoy their property. A revenue generating stadium for Edgewood is not beneficial to our neighborhood.

Hello Alder Arntsen,

Welcome to the neighborhood fights!

I live on Woodrow Street directly across from Edgewood's athletic field. When the leaves are off the trees, I can see the goal posts from my living room and I most certainly can hear all the noise on the field even without amplified sound. Like virtually everyone else on the street, I am opposed to Edgewood's proposal to build a stadium complex. I've attached something I've written up summarizing arguments I have read about and listened to at presentation meetings last year.

What I don't directly say in the attachment is how disturbing it has been and continues to be in regards to the Edgewood campuses rather deceitful presentations over the years. I got my first taste of this, which long time residents warned me about, a few years ago when the college proposed adding to and renovating Machecelli Hall on the Park and Pleasure Drive. They held two neighborhood meetings, the first advertised to get neighborhood input and hear concerns, and the second to supposedly present plans based partly on that input. That was until someone noticed at the second meeting the date on the blueprints. They had been drawn up BEFORE the first meeting. The nun on the Board of Directors present at that meeting was forced to stand and apologize.

In regard to Edgewood High School's stadium proposal, it seems pretty obvious that they omitted it from the 10 year plan because they knew the plan would have difficulty getting neighborhood support if it was included. The neighborhoods were then persuaded to give their blessing to the new field because we were assured it was for practice not nighttime games (after all, we are not opposed to children's play). That's what Mike Elliot said publicly, yet Edgewood was obviously planning otherwise when they installed wiring for sound and lights and who knows what else, concessions perhaps? Edgewood now says that the technology has changed sufficiently in 2 years for them to go ahead. No doubt technology has advanced, but an athletic stadium complex is still awash with light, loud, creates traffic problems and bothers neighbors.

They said at presentations that only 300 people come to games, yet the proposed stadium is for 1,200, and plans include concessions and press boxes. Seems like overkill for 300. They also said at presentations that the complex is for the safety of their students. This is a commuter school...many of them probably live closer to Middleton and Verona than they do to Edgewood. If they were really concerned about safety, they would not have football, and I say this as a person who enjoys watching the sport. Finally, Edgewood does rent out their facilities. They have a first class field and now want a first class complex that will no doubt be in demand by other organizations that would like nighttime events. My guess is that Edgewood sees this stadium as a long term money maker as well as a draw to address their dwindling student population.

So, please, choose the concerns of the majority of your tax paying constituents who will suffer the consequences of this stadium complex over the very loud Edgewood alumni, and those others who support the idea of "Friday Night Lights" but, if they thought seriously about it, would not want to live next to a stadium.

AN EDGEWOOD HIGH SCHOOL STADIUM IS DETRIMENTAL TO SURROUNDING NEIGHBORHOODS

THE PROPOSAL: taken from Edgewood High School's (EHS) marketing brochure) and information conveyed to neighborhood committees.

- * build a stadium with seating for 1,300, locker rooms, restrooms, concessions, storage, press box, lighting and a sound system
- * 35 EHS games from Aug.-Nov. and April-June, with up to 27 lighted until 9:45 pm for football and 9:00 for other sports. Practices could also be lighted.
- *the facility will be rented out. EHS will notify neighborhood leaders if those events exceed 1,200 and will discuss additional nighttime events.

CONTEXT: Edgewood campus is surrounded on 3 sides by dense residential housing and on the 4th by a natural buffer area and the undeveloped shores of Lake Wingra. While EHS is in the neighborhood, it is NOT a neighborhood school. It is a private, tuition supported commuter school that pays no city, county or state taxes. Edgewood's website describes their student population this way: "Edgewood High School currently serves 487 students in grades 9 through 12, drawing from more than 40 middle schools from throughout the Madison metropolitan area, communities up to 50 miles distant, and from overseas." Madison's neighborhood schools in residential areas, East and West, do not have grandstands or lighted fields. The newer LaFollet and Memorial, in predominately commercial areas, have much more land and stadiums. Madison high schools have thousands of students.

HISTORY: EHS has never had a lighted stadium, and people have moved to the area with an expectation of quiet neighborhoods. As a result, the neighborhoods have fought for a couple decades to keep out a lighted stadium. When EHS was able to build a new track and field in 2015 with grants from private foundations (primarily Goodman's), the neighborhoods supported the plan because they were told that the facilities would be primarily for practice. Mike Elliot, the President of EHS, was quoted in a 2017 Wisconsin State Journal article: "We're between two neighborhood associations. They have been vehemently opposed to us having lights or playing games here... We're really building this to be able to give our athletes the practice facilities that provide the best surfaces possible and to expand the amount of outdoor practice we can hold especially in the spring. That is our focal point." EHS went on to say that home games would continue to be

played in Middleton and Verona. In addition, the 10 Year Master Plan negotiated, and approved by the Madison Common Council in 2015, only two years earlier, contained nothing about this proposed stadium. However, when the new field was built, wiring for lights and a sound system was apparently installed.

THE OBVIOUS PROBLEMS: lights, noise, traffic and parking, property values

*Lighting: In order to illuminate an area approximately 200 x 100 yards (track and field area), the lights have to be high and very bright. Edgewood claims they will be downward facing but still they have to be bright enough to illuminate the field and players. They did not mention in last year's community meetings that there are also upward facing "punter" lights to illuminate the goal posts. Visualize the glow from stadiums, then imagine the glare into the adjacent streets and the unobstructed view from Monroe Street of a huge lighted rectangle.

*Noise: Likewise, a PA system must be powerful to reach the large area over crowd noise. Edgewood says the sound would be directed at the stands, away from Woodrow Street in the Vilas direction. They admitted that nothing could be done about crowd noise. In certain atmospheric and wind conditions, sound can carry city blocks beyond adjacent streets. And imagine excited fans returning to their cars for the drive home after the games. Boisterous and bantering teenagers, loud cell phone calls, cars cruising side streets.

*Traffic and parking: During the daytime, it is already difficult for neighbors and visitors to find street parking near Edgewood despite serious efforts by the campuses increase their parking capacity and restrict on site use of cars. The stadium will carry that problem into the night. The 2018 Monroe Street reconstruction will not alleviate traffic congestion as the urban nature of the neighborhoods precluded street expansion. Even more traffic congestion will come with a stadium.

*Property values: When Bishop O'Connell High School in Arlington, VA wanted to increase their stadium capacity and add lights, local real estate agents were surveyed about the effect on property values. 80% of the 46 agents who responded said property values of adjacent houses would decline an estimated 11%, 65% believed homes within a block would decline in value 9%, and 35% predicted homes values would decline within a 3 block radius. The lights were not added.

(http://noadverseimpact.blogspot.com/2010/12/realtors-expect-decline-in-home-values.html). At a community meeting last year, a stadium

supporter claimed the property values near some stadium (Middleton?) had not declined. An opponent said that while that was true, the value of homes on streets further from the stadium had risen more than those adjacent to the field. The truth of either of these statements has not been verified.

LESS OBVIOUS PROBLEMS: effects on local businesses, effects on home use, impacts on wildlife, impacts on other recreational use of the Park and Pleasure Drive and Lake Wingra, teenage drug and alcohol abuse

*Business: EHS is marketing it's stadium as a boon for business. However, the local businesses near Edgewood already have difficulty providing parking for their customers. And, as EHS is proposing a concession stand on site, the stadium may not help local restaurants.

*Effects on home use: The neighborhoods are filled with families with small children, working folks and senior citizens. We all need our sleep, the lack of which has been linked to health problems. And, outdoor enjoyment of our homes, the opening of our windows, quiet dinners with family and friends will be very effected by the noise and parking issues that will come with night games.

*Impacts on wildlife: Light pollution has been shown to adversely affect migrating birds. The huge lighted square will be a problem for the many night migrating birds that use Lake Wingra and the Arboretum in the spring and fall, prime time for stadium use. There are also many critters who live in the semi-wild areas along Lake Wingra that may be impacted.

*Impacts on other recreational use: The Park and Pleasure Drive and undeveloped Lake Wingra are quiet jewels in the city. These areas are heavily used by walkers, runners, bikers, swimmers, fishermen, kayakers and other boaters from all over Madison. Kayakers especially appreciate the evening and night use of the lake. The local lake association is attempting to get the area protected as an undeveloped Madison "viewscape" in the proposed Heritage Plan. The glow and noise and traffic from a stadium are inconsistent with the area's current use and future protection.

*Teen drug and alcohol use: There has already been a problem of teens using the natural Arboretum area adjacent to Monroe Street for drugs and alcohol. The natural area on the Park and Pleasure Drive behind Edgewood provides a perfect destination on game nights for teen experimentation. Some may remember the litter and beer cans that use to be found along the Drive before it was closed to car traffic.

FINAL CONSIDERATIONS: The historic Dudgeon Monroe and Vilas neighborhoods are comprised of a mix of large and small homes with a mix of family types, hardly the "elitist" neighborhoods some supporters of the stadium have suggested. Most of the homes fronting the Edgewood campus are very modest, with their value lying in location, not the structures themselves. We residents enjoy our walkable, charming and quiet streets. The light pollution, noise and congestion that a constant influx of sport fans would bring will change the character of the neighborhoods we love, as well as diminish the retail value of a number of homes.

This fight over Edgewood High School's proposed stadium is pitting money alumni and those who think all kids deserve Friday night football at their high school against people who have lived in the neighborhood for years and can envision how a multiuse stadium (27 nights a year or more!) will impact their lives and property values.

Edgewood High School is currently applying to the Madison Plan Commission to change the 10-year plan to accommodate their stadium. 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

Dear Alder Arntsen:

I haven't met you yet, but I hope to sometime this fall.

Since 2001, I was a member of the Edgewood-Neighborhood Liaison Team, representing and reporting to the Dudgeon-Monroe Neighborhood Association as proposals by the Edgewood campus came along. I was part of the collaborative give-and-take process for design and implementation of two Master Plans, the Krantz Center, the Sonderegger Science Center, Mazzuchelli Hall, Predolin Humanities Center, the renovation to De Ricci Hall, the new construction of Stevie Regis, Regina and Dominican dorms, and The Stream fine arts facility on campus. Each of these proposed projects required neighborhood acknowledgment and input, and for each of them, support was earned, and construction of these buildings accomplished. I'm proud I could help with that.

But this new request from the high school to have a stadium is the first project to come along on the Edgewood campus that I could not shepherd through. I left the liaison committee spring 2018 because I did not think a stadium of any magnitude fits smack-dab in an established residential neighborhood where the sidelines are only a stone's throw from peoples' kitchens.

I love sports and the sound of referee whistles. I value sports curriculum for youth. Both of my kids played soccer, basketball, volleyball and softball from ages six through high school, and I sent them to basketball camps at Edgewood in the summers.

But I recognize that a stadium at this location is a bad idea, as the Dudgeon-Monroe neighborhood is many things to many people. It's a lively commercial district; it's Badger Saturdays when fans stream campus-bound in red; it's a placid lake for yoga poses on paddle boards; a birdwatcher's haven on the Park & Pleasure Drive; a bicyclist's commute on a stellar bike path. It's a place to raise your family with many pleasant features that make this home.

The thing is, if this stadium goes in, there will be a PA system activated loud enough to be heard over hundreds of screaming teenagers. When you are in your backyard cooking barbecue for in-laws or going for an after-dinner stroll on the P & PD, or trying to fall asleep on your screened-in porch, what you will hear is canned music, a pep band, ref whistles and on top of all that, a sportscaster's narration.

There will be no getting away from it.

Originally, the liaison team was told back in 2016 that there would be 5 night games a year just for their football team. Recently in October we were informed that number has burgeoned to 40. That's because they added in soccer, la crosse, and track for girls and boys both spring and fall. Yes, football games may run as late as 10:00 PM, they said....and how long till, "BTW, so will this + this"?

What family with young children will want to buy a home or stay in the one they have on Woodrow, Terry Place, Monroe, West Lawn, Keyes or Fox? Will college students or short-term rentals be the only folks willing to live here? Every track meet, every pep rally, booster, contest, tournament, and performance will permeate our lives from late March into November.

Edgewood is a good neighbor, and they offer a lot to the Dane County community. While on the liaison committee, I appreciated their willingness to listen to the neighbors and cooperate with us in finding solutions. I wish now for their sake that there was an adequate greenspace buffer between their athletic field and residential homes. But there's not.

I am registering my opinion after reading much of the neighborhood chat about the Edgewood stadium matter and information on the DM website. Thank you for encouraging neighbors to express their concerns and opinions and for your work on behalf of DM and District 13. Unfortunately I cannot attend the information meeting on Wednesday but I am certainly willing to learn more and be judicious about this. So far, however, the reports of the way Edgewood has handled this do not encourage me. It's particularly bad timing to propose this expanded version as the neighborhood continues to endure road construction. The way that Edgewood has apparently gone about this in relation to previous discussions and understandings also does not encourage me.

I am concerned primarily about safety of increased traffic/road use, the unnecessary perpetuation of sound pollution and the building of a stadium of that scale as counter to creating a livable, workable and peaceable urban community and sustaining the natural environmental assets of the area. I really hope this proposal does not go through. I live on the edge of DM so I don't think the sound will affect me directly in my home but it would probably mean that I won't enjoy being outside with neighbors or taking "healthy" walks in my neighborhood as often because I find stadium noise very disturbing and stress-producing (and research on noise pollution indicates I'm certainly not alone). I can avoid Monroe ST. I have tried to patronize its stores and restaurants during the construction because it's a temporary inconvenience and a necessity in a neighborhood that I want to be involved with long-term. Having coffee in a cafe with neighbors while a large machine pounds outside isn't exactly pleasant, but it's for a good cause! But if a stadium goes in, I and others will simply get used to avoiding Monroe, just as I avoid Regent ST and the area around Camp Randall now. Given the impossibility of keeping up with when the predicted number of events would take place at Edgewood, it would just be easier to avoid the area altogether and stop thinking of it as a neighborhood in any real sense. Seriously, none of the proposed changes adds to the quality of life in adjoining neighborhoods, and there are other venues for some of the activities they say they "should" host.

My two top concerns are: 1. Two stadiums with sound systems and lights and night games and music within a short distance of each other in residential neighborhood struggling to maintain their identity as more than a transportation or entertainment corridor. I remain deeply concerned about the issue of the Edgewood stadium. I am convinced that it will be a needless disruption to the neighborhood that has already experienced great disruption as a result of the Monroe Street reconstruction.

Many stadium supporters have asked "What about Friday Night Lights"? Edgewood has a stadium to play in at the present time. There is no need for this new facility. Deal Allen Arntsen,

I am attaching my letter **opposing** Edgewood High School's proposal to build a stadium on their current practice field. Thank you for acting on this and on supporting our neighborhood.

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Why should Edgewood's private school football students be entitled to a football stadium just out the front door of their school which will degrade the neighborhood and which is unlike any other central city public high school football venue? I oppose this proposal because:

1) The proposal would add to disproportionate effects in education on differing populations in Madison. Edgewood High School's demographic is more white and more affluent than other central city high schools. Edgewood High School is a private school which serves 546 students each paying \$11,000 a year for tuition. Edgewood High School is comprised of 14.6% U.S. students of color and 5.4% international students of color. Edgewood pays no taxes on it's property.

Madison has two public high schools in the central city. West High School, in close proximity to Edgewood (1.4 miles distant) serves 2,400 students, 40% students of color and 34% low income students.* West has a practice field at it's Regent Street facility and plays it's games on the fields at Memorial High School. The Memorial fields are outside the central city corridor and can provide parking without unduly impinging on it's neighbors. The field outside of West is a practice field and in no way is as up to date as Edgewood's current (updated in 2015) field. East High School, the other central city public high school also does not have an onsite playing field, instead using a dedicated field for their events. (Often this is the public facility of Breese Stevens).

2) There is no public benefit to the proposed stadium.
Edgewood's private high school football games do not benefit "the public" or even, necessarily those students playing the game. (See studies on head injuries and their lifetime negative impact on students playing the game). Most of the public will never attend an Edgewood High School football game.

Edgewood proposes to use this stadium for 27 night games (lasting until 9:45 pm) per season. This does **not** include the evenings for which they would <u>charge</u> other schools to hold events at this venue. (Note, there is no neighborhood benefit to this profit making by Edgewood. This private institution pays no taxes.) At a minimum this means that an additional **7.5** % of neighborhood evenings would be unnecessarily interrupted with lights, a sound system, crowd noise, traffic, parking and partying.

3) There are already stressors on the neighborhood. The Monroe Street area provides a traffic corridor into the city and houses two large public venues for the UW. The neighborhood hosts a myriad of events that do benefit the public. The need for parking is problematic in this high traffic area and is a major issue for neighbors and local businesses. The property abuts a Park and Pleasure Drive and other park areas which are already stressed by public use. A stadium and it's activities does not comport with the needs of the natural setting.

The central city (where East, West and Edgewood are located) is not appropriate for development of a stadium/ large public venue.

- 4) There is an excellent, well thought out & planned for alternative. Edgewood should *continue* to play it's games in Middleton and support Middleton's efforts in raising the \$600,000 needed to bring Middleton's field up to date. It could use it's newly modernized practice field for practice. Just like other central city high school students, Edgewood students would play games on fields that are not in the central city and do not detract from the livability of central city neighborhoods.
- 5) Edgewood is manipulating and circumventing regular channels for neighborhood planning.

In 2014 Edgewood gained support for it's Ten Year Plan which upgraded it's practice field. No mention was made regarding this present proposal which surfaced last year (2017) to build a **1,200 seat stadium** with locker rooms, press box, concessions, sound and light systems. The current proposal alters the current use from a practice field to a stadium. (At a minimum, it was disingenuous of Edgewood not to have included this giant ask in the 2014 plan. Adding argument to this as a purposeful deceit is that the fact that the infrastructure required to support the current proposal was built into the current "practice field" facility).

For the good of all, Edgewood should work with their current partners to continue to hold football games outside the central city. There is no crisis that overrides the current accepted Ten Year Plan which, by it's nature took a wider view of neighborhood needs. If Edgewood continues to feel the need for this, we might take another look at this proposal in the next ten year plan, in 2024.

Please note my emphatic "No" to this proposal.

* The numbers cited here are from last year when this proposal first arose.

Hi Allen,

Thanks for representing us. We will be out of town for the meeting this week but this is an issue we feel strongly about. You know Madison, and if the majority of the neighborhood wanted a stadium like this, we would have had it long ago.

We have lived on Woodrow Street for 22 years. In our experience, the Edgewood <u>COLLEGE</u> campus has been a great neighbor. Negotiating with the neighborhood and taking environmental impacts (including flooding and light pollution) into account brought their master plan to fruition. Neighbors can use the college library and enjoy the exhibits and lectures there. Maybe the high school should take its lead from the college and note that the community has been a good neighbor to Edgewood High School too. Several families right here on Woodrow Street send their children to Edgewood schools--we considered sending our daughter there-- and we can count 8 new buildings, including the practice field, on the campus across the street.

Edgewood High School made an agreement with their neighbors it seems they never intended to keep. We take issue with the pretense that this stadium is **for** the community. It's for the Edgewood community. Plain and simple.

Edgewood does not belong to the community. It is IN it. We feel the same way about Wingra School. They are great options for people who choose private education for their children. They are not neighborhood schools. They are private and have different rules than our public schools. Edgewood does NOT belong to everyone. They are not required to accept all students. Its campus is private property. It is privately run, privately endowed and that is their first priority. We are not being critical. It is a fact. Endowment and tuition funds have to be their first priority in order to exist. Edgewood is a lovely campus in an urban area and should have to abide by the same laws as its business and residential neighbors. We do not begrudge anyone their sporting events. They are part of the fabric of our culture. However, sparsely attended high-school events do not boost the Monroe Street economy. Whether they devalue the homes adjacent to the stadium remains to be seen. Light, sound and physical pollution, increased traffic and lack of parking solutions are all serious potential problems. And benefits? What is certain is that the addition of light and sound ONLY benefit a private institution.

The stadium was part of a 10-year "master plan" that WAS approved by the neighborhood, the City of Madison and more importantly, Edgewood High School! Edgewood agreed to a practice field with these restrictions. That's why they need an amendment to change it. They built it. Now they have changed their minds. High school president Michael Elliot is quoted as saying "We're not planning to do any concerts. We're not planning to rent it out." If Elliot changes his mind again, are the neighbors big, whiny babies for objecting? Really? Why should we believe or trust him?

Edgewood is a school in the enviable position of having more money than they know what to with and it is our understanding that Elliot is a relatively new president of this private institution. He is clearly eager to make his mark on the campus and donors. But hopefully he will embrace the Sinsinawa Dominican values of Truth, Compassion, Justice, Partnership, and Community that are Edgewood's campus mission and respect the agreements that preceded his tenure

Just in case you have not yet be copied on the data Ethan Brodsky collected Re: the Edgewood's proposal's noise levels, I found this interesting and it shifted my 'vote' from support to 'no'. These were posted on TheGreen's listserv:

Marie Trest wrote:

.....I asked for more information about the recent (Edgewood) JV football noise levels:

Ehan Brodsky replied:

"I measured 69 dB from a city bus passing at ~6 feet while taking noise measurements on Monroe Street, so I agree that the noise levels ~750 feet from the field are comparable to the levels you would hear standing on the sidewalk next to a passing bus. The levels at the distances from the stadium to the nearest residences are far higher than that."

To me (Marie), a major takeaway point is that, at 750 ft, a crowd of 55 people with no sound system exceeds Edgewood's proposed 60 dB levels at their sidewalk. The information their contractor is giving them is not possible, and I am very grateful to Ethan for taking the time to obtain data about the situation rather than believing a company that has something to sell.

The noise levels with 50 times as many people and a sound system that must broadcast above the crowd noise level will be substantially higher and be heard throughout the neighborhood and Lake Wingra. This is not just for 4 football games, but for 40 proposed Edgewood games, and who knows how often or to whom the facility would be rented beyond that.

The compromise should not be harming a 100 year old neighborhood and sensitive environmental corridor with a stadium, but for Edgewood to find an appropriate location for a stadium that has buffers between residential properties and can handle the traffic. Marie

Sharing, with permission. (Ethan's report to the neighbors on recorded noise levels at Waunakee's stadium which is somewhat similar to Edgewood's proposed stadium)

Neighbors -

I understand that many of you are concerned with Edgewood High School renewed effort to build a football stadium in our neighborhood, and are worried that the lights, amplified audio, crowds, and traffic associated with it may have a severe impact on the enjoyment and value of our homes. I live on Woodrow Street and I am very concerned myself.

Edgewood has made a number of unrealistic claims regarding their ability to control how much light and sound would spill from their proposed stadium, claiming that it will have minimal impact on neighboring properties. As they have repeatedly pointed to the Waunakee High School football stadium as an example of the advanced technology that they intend to use, I went out to the Waunakee stadium last Friday to watch a game and see what it would really be like.

To be scientific about this, I brought a camera to record video and professional light (Extech 403125) and sound (Extech 407736) meters to collect quantitative data. To choose the positions I sampled from, I overlaid a map of our neighborhood, with the current location of Edgewood's practice field, onto a map of Waunakee's stadium, so I could observe the event from points that correspond to known points in our neighborhood, picking points that were on the sidewalk in front of the driveways at particular addresses on Woodrow Street. For each point, I matched the horizontal distance from the sideline and position along the field to what they would be in our neighborhood.

https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=gF9PkgrFiR8 Be sure to watch (or at least skim - I'm impatient when it comes to online videos, too!) all the way to the end of these videos.

The stands were not anywhere near full, but from locations that would be in our front yards on Woodrow Street, I was measuring sound levels substantially higher than the 60 dB levels that Edgewood is telling us about. I measured sound levels of 81.2 dB from the PA system, 82 dB from the band, 80.9 dB from the crowd, and 68.4 dB from the cheerleading squad (A-weighted, fast

response). The highest sound level I measured was 87.3 dB, just after a "pick six" by Waunakee. These levels are far far louder than what Edgewood is claiming we will experience.

I took a third video, from a parking lot roughly 750 feet from the sideline. Many homes on the 2200 and 2300 blocks of Monroe and West Lawn, portions of Keyes and Leonard Street, and most of the homes on Terry and Woodrow Street are within this distance of Edgewood's field. This is what the game looks and sounds like from that distance:

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Even at this point, measured sound levels were 67 dB from the PA system and 64 dB from the band, far higher than the 60 dB claimed by Edgewood.

I also stopped in a quiet parking lot that is 3,000 feet from the field, with no direct line-of-sight path to the field, and could still hear the crowd noise, music, and PA from there. Drawing a circle that distance out from Edgewood's proposed stadium includes everything out almost to Regent Street, Monroe from Wingra School to the public library, the Vilas Neighborhood out past Grant Street, much of Lake Wingra, and portions of the arboretum.

As for light pollution, at a location corresponding to the driveway between 812 and 820 Woodrow Street, I measured vertical illuminance of 3.34 lux and horizontal illuminance of 0.98 lux. Note that Edgewood is claiming that they will use lighting fixtures with only 60% the light level that Waunakee uses, so these figures should be adjusted accordingly, but even with that, they are comparable to what you would experience at civil twilight (20-30 minutes after sunset) rather than at night-time, and are many times brighter than a full moon. Note that these are illuminance, a measure of the the total light falling onto a point, not luminance, which would more directly correspond to the perceived brightness when looking at the stadium lights themselves from a point where they are directly visible. I performed the same measurements on Woodrow Street on a dark night last spring and measured levels of 0.00-0.06 lux everywhere except in immediate proximity to streetlights. This will be a enormous change in the night sky over a large area on game nights.

Obviously there are many potential differences between Waunakee's existing stadium and Edgewood's proposed stadium, and the environmental conditions and attendance will vary on any particular night - some of these factors may reduce the impact that the proposed Edgewood Stadium would have on surrounding areas, while others may increase them. I am sure that Edgewood stadium proponents will be eager to point out the differences and explain why these measurements are thus not relevant (but fail to provide evidence as to what we should expect instead), but you really can't escape the fact that, no matter what, a football stadium looks and sounds like a football stadium, and that the light and sound associated with playing football for a crowd of spectators has an unavoidable impact on a large area around the stadium.

Feel free to pass this on to anyone you believe might be interested, and please speak up to share your opinions about the proposed stadium with your alder, your neighborhood association, and at any neighborhood or city planning meetings. Please be sure to identify where you live, as it seems that many of the voices supporting this stadium are from people who would not be living in immediate proximity to it and have to deal with its negative impact on their neighborhood.

Follow up on Oct 11:

Regarding the Junior Varsity football game played at Edgewood this evening (mentioned in the other thread), I took noise measurements during the game. Using a Extech 407736 digital sound meter (dBA weighting, fast response), I measured the sound level at three locations.

From the sidewalk at the 812/820 Woodrow driveway, I measured 64.4 dB from the referees' whistles. From the sidewalk in front of 2314 Monroe Street, I measured 64.3 dB from the referees' whistles and 61.7 dB from the crowd. From the front stoop of 2310 Monroe Street, I measured 68.6 dB from the crowd, 63.7 dB from a team chant after the game (in the far end zone!), and 61.6 dB from disorganized yelling on the field after the game.

For all cases, I was careful to ensure that there was no nearby vehicle traffic or gusts of wind to interfere with the measurements. Ambient sound levels ranged from 42-43 dB on Woodrow Street and 45-68 dB on Monroe Street.

Note that all of these measurements are in excess of the "60 dB" that Edgewood has claimed that neighbors will experience once the stadium has built, and this is with no PA system, no sirens from the scoreboard, and a minuscule crowd - based on photos I took of the bleachers, I would estimate that there were approximately 55 spectators in attendance. Can you imagine what it would sound like with crowds 20x larger?

I've received permission to share Ethan Brodsky's email, data, and video's with you, and for you to share it with city staff and Edgewood's consultants. I hope you share it with all the Alders as well. There are hundreds of emails about this topic on various listservs (Nextdoor; thegreen, regentneighbors) so interest is very high in many neighborhoods. I am also including (below) an email explaining the decibel scale which helped me understand why Ethan says a 64 decibel finding is quite a bit louder than the Edgewood proposal claims their sound system would be at 60dB.

from Mike Borkenhagen to Regent Neighbors

I'd like to make sure everyone understands the sound data that's being used. The decibel scale is logarithmic, so an increase of +10dB is twice as loud. A bus passing at 69dB is about twice as loud as something measured at 60dB..

It's also important to note that noise frequency plays a large role in perceived loudness. The human ear is more sensitive to higher frequencies, so a 64dB referee whistle will be perceived as much more loud than a 64dB tuba.

Thanks, hope a solution is found that works for everyone.

Dear Alder Arntsen and DMNA President David Hoffert,

I am a long term resident of the Dudgeon Monroe neighborhood having raised a family and lived on Woodrow Street for the past 33 years. For decades prior to that my great aunt and uncle raised their family and lived on Woodrow Street. As someone with a long presence here I greatly value this unique neighborhood, our neighbors and the three Edgewood institutions - the Campus School, High School and College. Over the years I and many others in the neighborhood have worked with the Edgewood institutions and City representatives on proposed building plans, site development plans and two master plans to find solutions to their growth needs that are compatible with the neighborhood. The central campus entrance at Leonard Street, internal campus access, parking, site layout and 12 campus buildings all reflect these successful joint efforts.

Breaking with this tradition and in contrast to this history, the proposed High School stadium does not represent a joint planning effort supported by the neighborhood. During the 2015 joint master planning process, the High School stated in neighborhood meetings and press interviews that the athletic field would remain a practice field which the neighborhood supported. After the joint master planning process was completed, in 2016 they announced plans to turn the athletic field into a stadium with a building, expanded seating, lighting and sound system for up to 5 night games. Now in 2018 they announced new plans which include hosting up to 40 games in the proposed stadium, which is far more than the "Friday Night Games" currently being represented to the media. On top of this, we are told there is a movement by alumni to promote future field rental as a means of generating income. The High School expressed an interest in this in the past and is retaining it as a future option.

High mount night lighting, an amplified sound system broadcasting prerecorded pep rally music and sports announcers at a sound level necessary to be heard over uncontrollable crowd noise and the crowd noise itself are simply not compatible with the residential district that is immediately next door without the benefit of any buffer zone, distance or effective barrier to these disruptive high intensity activities scheduled for both day and night times.

Measurements taken at a recent Waunakee High School football game with a small rainy day game crowd clearly demonstrate the disruption and negative impact this stadium poses to the neighborhood: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=zZeodcKUTiQ

Alder Arntsen, you've stated you're open to a compromise position citing Edgewood High School's proposed "technology" solutions as acceptable with conditions. That is not a compromise, it's simply choosing Edgewood High School's interests over the greater neighborhood's welfare leaving this neighborhood much less viable now and for generations to come. In terms of conditions, they would be meaningless in that any that may be applied now will no doubt be rescinded through future lobbying efforts by Edgewood High School when more sympathetic ears are in positions of power in much the same way as they have changed

their planned use of the Athletic Field after the master planning process. Furthermore, conditions would put the burden of proof for exceedances and enforcement on the neighbors, which simply is not reasonable or acceptable.

This neighborhood has many constituents beyond those that live here including a multitude of outdoor enthusiasts that use the lake, the adjacent parks, walk/run/bike on the Park and Pleasure drive, birdwatch in the woods and value the nature experience available here. These would all be negatively affected by an amplified stadium sound system. The High School has existed for 91 years successfully making arrangements for their night time games, clearly are able to continue to do so and if they valued the neighborhood and their neighbors would do so. I urge you to support the interests of the greater neighborhood as well as those of the multitude of people from outside the neighborhood that use and value this area by not accepting Edgewood High School's stadium proposal and thereby preserving neighborhood values for generations to come.

I oppose this proposal for the following reasons:

1) Simple equity issues suggest this is a shortsighted proposal.

It would add to disproportionate effects in education on differing populations in Madison. Edgewood High School's private school demographic is more white and more affluent than that of other central city high schools. Edgewood High School serves 546 private school students each paying \$11,000 a year for tuition. It's population is comprised of 14.6% U.S. students of color and 5.4% international students of color. Edgewood pays no taxes on it's property.

Madison has two public high schools in the central city. West High School, in closest proximity to Edgewood (1.4 miles distant) serves 2,400 students, 40% students of color and 34% low income students.*

The two central city public high schools don't have playing fields adjacent to their buildings. West has a practice field at it's Regent Street facility and plays it's games on the fields at Memorial High School. (The Memorial fields are outside the central city corridor and can provide parking, lighting, loud speakers without unduly impinging on it's neighbors. The current neighbors moved in to the neighborhood with the fields in place.) The field outside of West is a practice field and is in no way is as up to date as Edgewood's current (updated in 2015) field. (Perhaps as a gesture of support, Edgewood could offer it's new fields to West for some practice times?)

East High School, the other central city public high school also does not have an onsite playing field, instead using a dedicated field for their events. Often this is the public facility of Breese Stevens.

Edgewood is asking for something neither of these public high schools have. The public high schools are not asking for a lighted, 1,200 seat central city stadium because, quite frankly, these schools have more salient issues to deal with. They want to support their students who are homeless. They want to support their students whose families receive free and reduced lunch. They need to shore up leaky roofs and provide seats for their students. These public schools are not focused on a stadium in their front yard. Nor should we, the public be even asked to contend with this non-educational issue.

2) There is no public benefit to the proposed stadium.

Edgewood's private high school football games do not benefit "the public" or even, necessarily those students playing the game. (See studies on head injuries and their lifetime negative impact on students playing the game). Most of the public and most of Edgewood's neighbors will never attend an Edgewood High School

football game. There is no proposal to in any way share these facilities, only to profit from them.

There is, however public inconvenience and harm. Edgewood proposes to use this stadium for a minimum of 27 night games (lasting until 9:45 pm) per season. This does **not** include the evenings for which they would <u>charge</u> other schools to hold events at this venue. At a minimum this means that an additional 7.5 % of neighborhood evenings would be unnecessarily interrupted with lights, a sound system, crowd noise, traffic, parking and partying.

3) The central city (where East, West and Edgewood are located) is not appropriate for development of a stadium/ large public venue. There are already stressors on the neighborhood. The Monroe Street area provides a traffic corridor into the city and houses two large public venues for the UW. The neighborhood hosts a myriad of events that do benefit the public. The need for parking is problematic in this high traffic area and is a major issue for neighbors and local businesses.

The property abuts a Park and Pleasure Drive and other park areas which are already stressed by public use. A stadium and it's activities does not comport with the needs of the natural setting.

4) There is an alternative.

Edgewood should *continue* to play it's games in Middleton and support Middleton's efforts in raising the \$600,000 needed to bring Middleton's field up to date. It could use it's newly modernized practice field for practice. Just like other central city high school students, Edgewood students would play games on fields that are not in the central city and do not detract from the livability of central city neighborhoods.

Edgewood is manipulating and circumventing regular channels for neighborhood planning.

In 2014 Edgewood gained support for it's Ten Year Plan which upgraded it's practice field. No mention was made regarding this present proposal (which surfaced in 2016) to build a 1,200 seat stadium with locker rooms, press box, concessions, sound and light systems. This Edgewood proposal alters the current use from a practice field to a stadium. (At a minimum, it was disingenuous of Edgewood not to have included this giant ask in the 2014 plan. Adding argument to this as an intentional deceit is that the fact that the infrastructure required to support the current proposal was built into the current "practice field" facility).

For the good of all, Edgewood should work with their current partners to continue to hold football games outside the central city. There is no crisis that overrides the current accepted Ten Year Plan which, by it's nature took a wider view of

neighborhood needs. If Edgewood continues to seek this luxury, we might take another look at a proposal in the next ten year plan, in 2024. Let's hope, by then, that the proposal does not also ask for a golf course.

Please note my emphatic "No" to this proposal.

Dear Josh,

My name is Meghan Ross. We met a couple of weeks ago at the Dudgeon Monroe Neighborhood Association meeting. I want to start by thanking you for the time and effort that you are putting into collecting feedback from the neighborhood regarding the Edgewood stadium proposal. I can imagine that it is not an easy task. I would very much like to be involved in future conversations regarding DMNA's official position on the stadium, so as I mentioned the other night, please keep me in the loop.

I am also cc-ing Alder Arnsten as I think it is important for him to be aware of the subset of neighbors who are in support of the stadium expansion as I know the voices of support have not been as vocal as the opposition over the past year. Thank you to you both for taking the time to listen to all voices in our neighborhood. I realize this is quite a lengthy email, so I did try to break down my main reasons for supporting the cause into categories towards the bottom.

I am aware that some of our neighbors have raised concerns and are staunchly opposed to the new stadium. While I can sympathize with the growing pains that come along with any change to the neighborhood, I fully support Edgewood's proposal and would like to share my feedback to ensure that supportive voices are taken into consideration as we begin to craft DMNA's official stance on the matter.

I want to begin by acknowledging my relationship to Edgewood. I am an alumnus of both Edgewood High School and Edgewood College, a former educator at Edgewood Campus School, a former assistant softball coach at Edgewood High School, and I currently teach part-time as a fitness instructor for Edgewood College. While this certainly can be interpreted as a bias, I like to think it gives me insight into that community. In addition to being a part of Edgewood, I am also an active member of the DMNA and a long-time resident of Monroe Street. I am lucky to have had the opportunity to explore this matter from various lenses, but my involvement in both communities is not rare. I am one of many residents from the Dudgeon-Monroe neighborhood who have benefited from both Edgewood's campus and the surrounding neighborhood and I truly hope that this is taken into consideration by both the city and the association.

From the perspective of a former educator, I am appalled, embarrassed, and disappointed at the amount of pushback that our neighborhood is giving an educational institution. Whether our children attend Edgewood, West, or any of the high schools in the area should not matter. Lifting up the next generation is an integral part of who we say we are as a neighborhood. It is echoed in the signs that many of our neighbors proudly place in their lawns indicating that "all are welcome." Unfortunately, we have fallen into a "not in our backyard" mentality when it comes to putting those wonderful slogans into action. To purposefully throttle the growth of any educational institution seems like a step backwards for us as a community. Further, to deny the expansion of a facility that would improve the high school experience of students who are learning and growing in our neighborhood is shameful, especially in light of the extraordinary efforts that the school has made to minimize the impact that the facility would have on the neighborhood around it. And to put stock into the lamentations such as "other schools don't have stadiums, why should Edgewood?" is quite a slippery slope and echoes attitudes that, once again, fundamentally go against who we claim to be as a neighborhood. Such an argument could be used to back pulling funding from innovative programs in education just because they weren't around when we were in school. It's a dangerous and disgraceful mindset, especially coming from a neighborhood that claims to be progressive. One of the reasons that I have chosen to make

my home in this neighborhood is our values. Not putting those values into action is more destructive to the moral landscape of our community than any stadium could be to the physical landscape.

Emotional reaction aside, below are some points to consider in making our final decisions. I've categorized them into the following groups: 1) responses to issues raised by neighbors, 2) the undue burden that opposing the expansion would continue to place on the Edgewood community, and 3) the positive impact that the expanded stadium could have on the neighborhood.

Responses to concerns about lights and noise raised by neighbors:

Concerns about excessive noise:

I feel that Edgewood has gone above and beyond the expectation of a courteous neighbor in ensuring that noise is directed towards campus rather than out into the neighborhood and beyond. The concerns raised by some neighbors have often been misguided, citing examples like already being able to hear the sounds systems from Camp Randall and the Edgewood College PA. Neither system is comparable to the one being proposed by Edgewood High School, therefore making those arguments null and void.

Concerns about the lights:

Edgewood has done significant research to back their claims that the lights they have chosen will remain solely on the campus. They are also willing to agree upon a lights out curfew time and include it in the Master Plan amendment that can and will be enforced and policed by the city. With all of these details being addressed in the Master Plan itself, it is more than just a good faith effort. It is an actual contract between Edgewood and the neighborhood and the city of Madison.

The undue burden opposition to the proposal has on the Edgewood Community (also our neighbor):

Effect on the student experience: I think everyone can agree that a larger sports arena would have a positive impact on extra-curricular participation on Edgewood's campus, allowing them to have a local, centralized facility in which to call home rather than being scattered across Madison and the surrounding communities. Research supports the importance of sports and extra-curricular activities in the development of children and young adults. Right now Edgewood teams travel as far as Verona to practice and play, often times having to schedule JV and freshman teams at different times and/or different facilities than their Varsity teammates, effectively making it less appealing to both students and parents to join and/or continue to participate in the affected sports. This currently has a negative impact on the student experience as a whole. We have an opportunity to intervene, and as adults who claim to value education, we have a responsibility to do so.

Effect on the student athletes and the sports programs: Getting to learn from and being supported by teammates of all levels further promotes a better understanding of the sport and a better development of the skillset required to master it, encourages positive self-worth, and provides an enriching environment for healthy interpersonal relationships to flourish. It also ensures the health and longevity of the program itself. That comradery is very difficult to build and sustain with teams scattered across the city.

Effect on the incredibly passionate, hard-working coaching staff: Also worth mentioning is the burden placed on the coaching staff. Scattering the teams across fields all over the community adds unnecessary coordination to their already extensively long list of responsibilities, not to mention making it much more difficult to build inter-level comradery within a program. These men and women, who give up a sizable amount of their time to coach, are incredibly passionate about what they do. They are not coaching for the monetary gain but rather because they have an interest in the betterment of younger generations. Allowing them to have one, centralized place for their teams to gather, learn, and grow together gives them an opportunity to put that passion into coaching rather than schedule coordination.

Effect on Edgewood Parents: Having scattered games and practices puts an undue burden on parents who have several children in a sports program, making them choose between which child to support and often forcing them to drive all over town for drop-off and pick-up duties. I am not a parent myself, however I do know it is one of the most difficult jobs in the world. Adding more complexity to the endeavor when there is a viable solution that we, as a community, can be a part of, is a very difficult concept to swallow.

Effect on visiting teams: Having multiple fields puts an undue burden on visiting teams, families, and fans who also have to keep track of where their kids are playing as it is quite often in a different place each time. They face the same issues faced by Edgewood parents, having to choose which of multiple children to support and having to drive across town, sometimes multiple times a night, to drop off an pick up their kids.

Positive impact on the neighborhood:

Improved traffic flow from 4-6pm: If appealing to our desire to actually be the neighborhood that we claim to be isn't enough, then I fear any other arguments may fall on deaf years. That being said, I would like to share the positive impact that the stadium could have on traffic flow and area businesses. Right now, as we are all aware, the hours of 4 – 6pm bring standstill traffic to Monroe Street. If we allow Edgewood to install proper lights, this would surely decrease the amount of traffic flowing in and out of the school at this time, as games would be allowed to start later, allowing for more practices to be able to take place in the meantime on campus rather than at other facilities. Less traffic at peak hours is surely something we can all get behind.

Increased revenue for area businesses: And lastly, I foresee an uptick in business for Monroe Street merchants if we allow Edgewood to invite teams and fans to play on campus. Monroe Street has a wealth of restaurants and businesses that all too often remain unknown to people who do not live in our neighborhood. Exposing new clientele to these community gems would help to bolster them and ensure that they keep their doors open. After a year's worth of decreased revenue due to construction, I think any effort that we can make to support our neighborly businesses is worthwhile.

In conclusion, I challenge our neighborhood to live up to the values of inclusivity and cooperation that we claim as our own and welcome Edgewood's opportunity for growth as we would for any of our other neighbors. At this point in negotiations, our pushback as an association and a neighborhood seems petty and feels like the lingering remnants of a sort of rivalry that has formed between Edgewood and the neighborhood over the years. We are better than that and the students affected by our actions deserve better than that. Edgewood has predated most of the homes and all of the current residents in the area, so for them to put in so much effort to appease our demands is not only admirable but should be rewarded with compromise and gratitude rather than continued conflict. It is time for our association to work with Edgewood rather than against it. Let's be bridge builders like all of the signs we proudly display in our windows and lawns say we are.

Comments on Edgewood Football Stadium Proposal

Mr. Arntsen -

My name is Ethan Brodsky and I live at 866 Woodrow Street and am writing in regard to the Edgewood football stadium proposal. This is going to be an extremely long letter and I'm sure you've got a lot on your plate right now, so if you read nothing else at this point, I ask that you please at least read the next paragraph, which is the only time-sensitive request in the letter.

I have been told that you will be moderating the Edgewood neighborhood meeting this coming Wednesday. If this is the case, or if you have any control of how the meeting is conducted, I am requesting that you require each speaker to begin their comment with their address (or at least what street or "neighborhood" they live in, or the distance from their home to the proposed stadium) and their past and current affiliations with Edgewood (i.e. alumni, parent of student, employee, etc...). When we went through this process two years ago, Edgewood encouraged large numbers of alumni and other boosters to attend and their comments drew the meeting out to last so long that many immediate neighbors of the proposed stadium had to leave before it was over and were unable to speak. I understand that anyone who would like to speak must be allowed to do so, but it's also important that, at a "neighborhood meeting" that is intended to get the "neighborhood's opinion" on this proposal, Edgewood's neighbors are afforded an opportunity to speak.

That said, the rest of my comments are in regard to the proposal in general and not the conduct of the meeting this week and are thus less time sensitive.

I'm going to leave my personal opinions on the stadium proposal out of this letter and focus solely on the objective scientific measurements and analysis that I have made to study it.

Edgewood's current stadium proposal, as detailed in their Liason Committee meeting presentation on 8 Oct of this year and in the "Goodman Athletic Complex" page on their website:

Edgewood has been long aware of community opposition to this stadium. In a

15 June 2015 article in the Wisconsin State Journal about improvements to Edgewood's "athletic practice facility", Edgewood President Michael Ellliot acknowledges that "the project has received the support of area neighborhood groups that have balked in the past at the idea of turning the facility into a competition site for Edgewood's many athletic programs":

He is then quoted as saying: "We're between two neighborhood associations. They have been vehemently opposed to us having lights or playing games here. We're really building this to be able to give our athletes the practice facilities that provide the best

surfaces possible and to expand the amount of outdoor practices we can hold especially in the spring. That is our focal point." The article details how the football team will continue playing their games at Breitenbach Stadium.

It is clear that Edgewood understands that neighborhood opposition to this project is extremely strong, and I would argue that is a very good reason for the city to proceed with caution here and not allow the proposal to be fast-tracked without adequate study. Because of the nature of the zoning code and construction itself, the harm that would be created by mistakenly allowing the construction to proceed would be far higher than the harm associated with delaying it until it could be more carefully considered.

Currently there has been little evidence provided by Edgewood to support their claim that the stadium will have minimum impact on neighboring properties - many of the claims they have made are directly from marketing materials provided by their suppliers and dubious at best. Notably, in the presentation at their Oct 8 meeting, they made two patently false claims regarding noise ("noise on surrounding properties will be < 60 dB") and light spill ("falls to zero outside the blue line") that were obviously untrue to any listener with any familiarity with those topics.

During the 2017 process, Edgewood repeatedly pointed to Waunakee as a model for the advanced lighting technology they were proposing to use. On the city's "District 13 Development" page (next to your picture!):

https://www.cityofmadison.com/council/district13/development/ there is a quoted request from Edgewood president Mike Elliott:

Effective for the 2017 fall sports season, Waunakee High School is using the same style of lighting that Edgewood is proposing to use in their upgrades. If you are interested in and/or concerned about the Edgewood proposal, I highly encourage you to attend all or part of one of the Waunakee sporting events listed below so that you can decide for yourself how disruptive or not having lights like these in our neighborhood would be. No matter what your current or future opinion on the potential Edgewood upgrades may be, we will all benefit from being informed when it comes to the specifics of what is being proposed. Edgewood has specifically asked that we consider the following assertions (quoting from Edgewood High School's president, Mike Elliott):

- Observe how these lights minimize light glow, spill and reflection.
- Stand outside the stadium and observe how the light ends at the edge of the track.
- Stand behind the shrubs outside the stadium at the west end of the field and see how little light escapes. This would be similar to our tree cover on Woodrow Street.
- Observe how the entire sky is not illuminated above and around the stadium.

(Note that at the 8 Oct 2018 meeting, Mr. Elliott was instead suggesting Mansfield Stadium at Memorial High School for comparison. I inquired at that meeting why he had switched from suggesting Waunakee to Mansfield and he said that it was just "because Mansfield was more convenient to get to" and that "Waunakee also has the same lights as Mansfield and that we intend to use")

I took his suggestion and did exactly what he said, observing the Waunakee stadium on numerous occasions, but coming to exactly the opposite conclusion. I'm a private pilot and fly out of the airport adjacent to the Waunakee stadium regularly, so I am in the area regularly, and observed a number of games there, took photos and videos on 15 Sep 2017 and 6 Oct 2018, and collected rigorous data on the most recent date.

These videos were taken from carefully-selected positions that were chosen to be representative of specific locations on Woodrow Street, specifically the center of the sidewalk at the center of the driveway for 830 Woodrow Street, and the same point for the shared driveway for 812/820 Woodrow Street. If you were to take two steps backwards from locations that these videos were filmed, you would be standing on these landowners' property, approximately 15-20 feet from their homes.

The sampling locations were chosen by overlaying a map of our neighborhood, with the current location of Edgewood's practice field, onto a map of Waunakee's stadium, and matching the horizontal distance from the sideline and position along the field for each sampling point to what they would be in our neighborhood. I did this in Google Earth and can share maps showing the corresponding sampling points, if that would be helpful. I then identified the points on the ground using a handheld GPS.

At each of these locations, I collected quantitative data on sound and light using professional digital instruments. All light measurements were collected with an Extech 403125 digital illuminance meter. It reads out in 0.01 lux increments and is accurate to +-5% of reading + 10 digits in its low range.

Measurements were taken of horizontal illuminance (typically used for measuring sky glow) and vertical illuminance (typically used for measuring light trespass). Noise measurements were collected with an Extech 407736 sound level meter using the Aweighting range and "fast" (125 ms) response filter, which is the conventional practice for measuring noise of this type. The instrument is rated to +-1.5 dB from 35-90 dB. The noise measurements were collected with the meter either handheld at chest to eye level or on a tripod at the same height.

From a sound standpoint, at the locations corresponding to the driveways of homes on Woodrow Street, I was measuring sound levels substantially higher than the "60 dB" levels that Edgewood has claimed. I measured sound levels of 81.2 dB from the PA system, 82 dB from the band, 80.9 dB from the crowd, and 68.4 dB from the cheerleading squad. The highest sound level I measured was 87.3 dB, just after a "pick six" by Waunakee. The stands were not anywhere near full.

I also recorded a third video, from a parking lot roughly 750 feet from the sideline. Many homes on the 2200 and 2300 blocks of Monroe and West Lawn, portions of Keyes and Leonard Street, and most of the homes on Terry and Woodrow Street are within this distance of Edgewood's field. This is what the game looks and sounds like from that distance:

Even at this point, measured sound levels were 67 dB from the PA system and 64 dB from the band, far higher than the 60 dB claimed by Edgewood.

I also stopped in a quiet parking lot (off Division Street) that is approximately 3,000 feet from the Waunakee stadium, with no direct line-of-sight path to the field, and could *still* hear the crowd noise, music, and PA from there. Drawing a circle that distance out from Edgewood's proposed stadium includes everything out almost to Speedway and Regent Street, Monroe from Wingra School to the Monroe Street public library, the Vilas Neighborhood out past Grant Street, Vilas Park out of the Zoo, much of Lake Wingra, and portions of the arboretum. Crowd and PA noise from Edgewood's proposed stadium would be audible over much or all of this area.

Because these types of noise are so different from other kinds of noise, it is difficult to come up with comparisons to these sound level numbers that are meaningful to everyone. As someone who has studied snowmobile noise (I used to advise a UW project to build clean and quiet snowmobiles), it is helpful for me to think that these numbers in the low 80s are substantially louder than the (since 1975) legal limit of 78 dB for a snowmobile doing a full-throttle pass-by at 50 feet, but, obviously, a snowmobile pass-by only lasts a few seconds. The 87.3 dB measurement is comparable to the level you'd hear standing 50 feet from an interstate highway as a semi-truck drove past you. Other comparisons in that range would be a chainsaw at 50 feet (~85 dB) or a car horn at 50 feet (~86 dB).

Those are all "mechanical" sounds though, and very different in nature from crowd noise, which is a mixture of the constant "murmur" of conversations and the "surges" as everyone cheers at once. In a paper by Hayne et al. published in the Proceedings of Acoustics 2006:

the authors observe:

"In complaints about crowd noise, complaintants are not necessarily consistent in the way they describe the intrusiveness of the noise. In some instances, the complaint is with the constant unescapable babble, but in other cases, the disturbance is caused by frequent loud intrusive noises. Clearly crowd noise can be both of these."

To better understand the impact of this, I look at a paper called "Community Annoyance with Sports Crowd Noise: A case study of the facts in a jury decision", written by Jack Evans from Engineered Vibration Acoustics and Noise Solutions and published in the Proceedings of NoiseCon 1990:

It studies a case in Texas regarding a sports complex built immediately adjacent to a residential neighborhood, and details testimony from expert witnesses explaning that "broadband noise approximately 10 dB over ambient becomes objectionable, but narrow-band or tonal noise much closer or even below ambient can be perceptible annoying" (not only would Edgewood's proposed stadium exceed this, but their current use already does). It also states that "speech interference and distraction may occur with ambient sound levels between 60 and 70 dBA when the speaker and listener are separated by 15-20 feet, as would be very likely in the backyard", and that

"75-80 dB will interfere with speech at five feet". It also notes that "continuous exposure to a varying and intermittent intrusive noise of 60 to

70 dBA, while not endangering health, can be annoying and cause stress", that it is not viable to use music or other background noise to "mask"

sounds of these levels, and that "crowd voice noise, with nearly instantaneous increase and decrease in volume, has an almost startling effect unlike the gradual rise and fall of volume of intermittent source such as aircraft flyover or railroad traffic" (and is thus more disturbing than non-intermittent noise of a same level). Edgewood's proposed stadium would exceed all of these thresholds.

Of course the environment around Edgewood is different from that around Waunakee, so to get a basis for comparison, I observed a Junior Varsity Football game at Edgewood on 11 Oct 2018. Based on a photo I took of the bleachers, there were approximately 50 spectactors in attendance. I recorded the following sound levels (dBA, fast weighting), being careful not to take measurements when there was any traffic on Monroe Street.

From the sidewalk in front of the 812/8200 Woodrow driveway:

Whistle:

64.4

Ambient:

42-43

From the sidewalk in front of 2314 Monroe Street:

Whistle:

64.3, 64.2

Crowd:

61.7

Ambient:

45-47

From the front stoop of 2310 Monroe Street: (i.e. at the home's front door)

Crowd:

68.4, 61.7, 68.6

Team chant: 63.7 (organized, far end zone), 63.7 (disorganized, mid-field)

After-game yelling:

61.6

Ambient: 46-48

All of these measurements are *already* in excess of the "60 dB" that Edgewood is claiming neighbors will experience with crowds twenty times larger. Notably, they already involve both broadband (cheering) and tonal

(whistle) sounds that are both 20 dB over ambient, whereas the Texas case found that "broadband noise approximately 10 dB over ambient becomes objectionable" and "narrow-band or tonal noise much closer or even below ambient can be perceptible annoying". Indeed, neighbors have already found these sound levels to be objectionable, and Edgewood's current use of the facility is already generating noise complaints.

To try to estimate what it would be like with a larger crowd, I did a bit of research into how to scale noise levels with crowd size. A simple model based on physical principles would suggest that every 10x increase in crowd size corresponds to a 10 dB increase in noise. The paper "Prediction of Noise from Small to Medium Sized Crowds" (Hayne et al., Proceedings of ACOUSTICS 2011): https://urldefense.proofpoint.com/v2/url?u=https-3A www.acoustics.asn.au_conference-

finds that an increase is 11 dB in the "transient" component of noise and

15 dB in the "steady-state babble" (presumably because individual speakers within the crowd raise their voice levels in response to the louder background levels, resulting in higher levels than just purely combining a bunch of equal voices).

If the cheers from a 50-person crowd are 69 dB at a particular listening point, then a 500-person crowd would be 80 dB at that same point (11 dB more), and a 1,200-person crowd would be 84 dB from that point (69 + 11 * log10(1200/50)). These measurements are very much in line with the 87 dB I measured at Waunakee, considering the differences in measurement distance, measurement position (behind the end zone instead of across from the stands), and crowd size.

All evidence suggests that homes on Woodrow and Monroe Street will experience sound levels that are at least in the 80-90 dB range, that homes out 750 ft from the stadium will experience sound levels in the 60-70 dB range (also objectionable), and that homes out to 3000 ft will be able to hear the noise from the stadium.

As for light pollution, at a location next to the Waunakee stadium corresponding to the driveway between 812 and 820 Woodrow Street, I measured vertical illuminance of 3.34 lux and horizontal illuminance of 0.98 lux. Note that Edgewood is now claiming that they will use lighting fixtures with only 60% the light level that Waunakee uses, so these figures should be adjusted accordingly, but after doing so, that yields levels comparable to what you would experience at civil twilight (20-30 minutes after sunset) rather than at night time, and are many times brighter than a full moon.

I performed the same measurements on Woodrow Street on a dark night last spring and measured levels of 0.00-0.06 lux (basically the low end of the meter's sensitivity range) everywhere except in immediate proximity to streetlights. This will be a enormous change in the night sky over a large area on game nights.

Note that all these figures are measures of illuminance, which is basically a measure of the total light falling onto a surface from all directions, not luminance, which would more directly correspond to the perceived brightness or "glare" when looking at the stadium lights themselves from a point where they are directly visible. The instrument to measure "perceived glare" cost thousands of dollars and I couldn't justify buying one for this, but it is clear from the videos of Waunakee that glare will be an issue.

The videos I linked to earlier from the Waunakee stadium show an intense glare from the lights and sky glow over the field, directly contradicting the claims from Mr. Elliot and his suppliers. It would be preposterous to believe that light spill from the facility can be limited - even if the luminaires can perfectly control the pattern of emitted light, the entire point of installing the lighting is is to light the field surface to ~300 lux (SI equivalent of 30 foot-candles) in an area where ambient nighttime light levels is well below 1 lux.

Even with hypothetical perfectly designed luminaires that spill no light to the sides, the light will shine on the 5300 m^2 field itself and then be reflected back into the air (one study I found quotes an albedo of 0.08 for artificial turf), causing a subtantial increase in ambient light levels, likely to be many times brighter than current levels. This will be even worse during humid or dusty conditions, when the light is further scattered in all directions by the atmosphere. This glow will extend over a large area of the city and be visible from much of Lake Wingra and the arboretum. This is exactly what I observed at Waunakee and would be an enormous detriment to our neighborhood. It is well-understood that it is impossible to eliminate this glow. Reading the "Artificial Sports Lighting Design Guidance" from Sport England (a major sports promotion organization in the UK):

"Sky 'aura', meaning the glow which appears above a lit pitch when it is viewed from a distance at night, results from a combination of the reflectance of the pitch surface and light scattering by dust or moisture in the air above the pitch. As such, it is a consequence of factors other than the lighting itself and is largely unavoidable."

Regarding the question of "glare" (a form of light pollution in which direct-path light from a source is so bright as to cause annoyance or visual discomfort when looking in its general direction), Edgewood has claimed that these new lighting fixtures will "prevent" glare, but my experiences from the Waunakee stadium show that glare will be objectionable when viewed from locations corresponding to homes on Woodrow and Monroe Street. It is especially notable that when I, as Mr. Elliott suggests, "stand behind the shrubs outside the [Waunakee] stadium at the west end of the field and see how little light escapes. This would be similar to our tree cover on Woodrow Street", I observe exactly the opposite - that a huge amount of light escapes and is visible.

I have begun putting together a 3D model showing the actual position of the stadium lights to that this can be better understood. It suggest that the lights will be directly visible from many homes on Woodrow and Monroe, sometimes with a direct view of the light towers out of bedroom windows.

This degree of light trespass will be absolutely unacceptable to many homeowners.

Finally, one should note that the new energy-efficient LED-based luminanires that Edgewood proposes to use emit a broadband light spectrum that, as noted in a Oct 2010 publication by SPIE (The International Society of Optics and Photonics), "closer to sunlight than traditional bulbs and therefore more distruptive to many species", and that "many of these light sources have a large amount of blue light in their spectrum... [which] disproportionately brightens the sky" and "will have a profoundly negative effect on light scatter and sky glow" and "has the portential to interfere with circadian rhythms and cause sleep disorders":

It is also similarly impossible to control the spread of noise pollution, both from the amplified public address system and natural sounds associated with a football game (crowd noise, whistles, marching band, etc...). Even with the claimed "directional" PA systems, they will have to adjust the volume up so that announcements can be heard over the crowd noise, and much of the sound will reflect off of the bleachers and other fixed objects and spread out over the surrounding neighborhood in an uncontrolled manner.

I'd also like to point that, during the 2015 approval process for Edgewood's Campus/Institional Master Plan, the neighborhood acquiesced (with some

limitations) to Edgewood College's intent to develop a surface parking lot (designated "Site One" in their current master plan) into an 80,000 square foot athletic facility that includes a gymnasium with a seating capacity of 1,000-1,600 persons. This site is *immediately adjacent* to Edgewood High School's proposed football stadium.

The "Site One" development was mutually agreed to by the neighborhood in

2014 in the context of the current and proposed use of the surrounding portions of the Edgewood campus as documented in the currently approved master plan, and would likely *not* have been agreed to as proposed had the high school's intention to construct a football stadium immediately adjacent to it been known.

The potential impact to the neighborhood of a 1,600-seat basketball area immediately adjacent to a 1,200-seat football stadium is substantial and it is impossible to consider these projects in isolation, since the Site One development has already been agreed

to in the existing master plan. The existence of a "solid wall" of sports facilities along my street will have a severe impact on our neighborhood. The combination of these developments would turn Woodrow Street into a miniature version of Breese Terrace, with a mini-Camp Randall and a mini-Field House across the street from a row of residential homes. You'll note that there are very few owner-occupied homes remaining on Breese Terrace.

Even without the stadium, "Edgewood crowds" already create major problems for our neighborhood, as their severe lack of oncampus parking for their campus users causes enormous spill-over of parking onto Woodrow Street (one of the only in the area that does not require residential parking permits).

Edgewood College dormitory residents frequently leave their vehicles parked on Woodrow long in excess of 48 hours, and there a constant stream of commuter vehicles coming and going, waiting for parking, and causing damage to other vehicles while parallel parking. I know that there's nothing more NIMBY than complaining about parking and that the Monroe Street residents have a bad reputation in that regard, but there's a major difference in scale between the impact of mixed-used developments that attract a few dozen vehicles per night and a football stadium that attracts hundreds.

Edgewood's efforts to build a stadium in this residential neighborhood will damage the use, value, and enjoyment of neighboring properties, hurting the investment of homeowners, and reducing the quality of life of for those living on adjacent streets. Does the city want to create another area of deteriorating rental housing with student renters turning over every year, at the same time as they are putting so much time and money into converting the Greenbush neighborhood back into owner-occupied housing?

I was horrified to hear that Edgewood High School is pushing forward with their proposal to build a 1,200 seat stadium with 80 foot high lights and a sound system. I live a block and a half away, and am deeply opposed to this plan. I have lived on West Lawn Avenue for over 30 years. We chose this neighborhood and this house because it was peaceful and green, because it had grocery stores within walking distance, and is close to the UW. I love the DMNA neighborhood. There have been issues over the years with Edgewood High School students on our street, which is very close to the Edgewood main entrance, particularly their disrespectful driving and parking habits, but our block is now 2 hour parking only which has helped a lot. I thought our problems had been solved, but this is much, much worse.

I'm opposed to any stadium plan for three reasons:

- (1) My quality of life would undoubtedly diminish because of the inevitable noise and disruption, the increased traffic and parking 26-40 evenings a year, according to the report in the Wisconsin State Journal.
- (2) there would be an environmental impact to wildlife from the construction, bright lights, a sound system, and increased traffic. I value the fact that we are so close to Lake Wingra and that so far, we've managed to preserve some oases of green space nearby. Those would be degraded by these changes.
- (3) and last but not at all least, economic impact. I would *never* choose to live in a house close to a stadium. I can't believe this will not drive down property values and downgrade the neighborhood so that it eventually becomes more run-down rental properties than homeowners with families. This will no longer be such a desirable area to live in. Home-owners' property values will drop. We pay high property taxes, and so far the benefits have made that worth while, but I honestly don't know if I would want to continue living here if this stadium is built. It makes me terribly sad to think of losing our beloved home, edged out by greed and profiteering on the part of Edgewood High School.

As the Alder for District 13, please, please, please defend our right to say no to this stadium and keep the Edgewood master plan as is. I do not believe it is in the best interests of the district, and it would be a great loss to me personally as a homeowner.

I would like to voice my concerns regarding Edgewood High School's proposal to install lighting, sound, and additional seating to their practice field. This proposal has many facets that are important to the overall issue and deserve specific comments. I apologize in advance for the length of my statement and not attending the public meetings in person as I am currently serving in Afghanistan.

I am a resident of Monroe Street at the intersection with Edgewood College Drive. I moved into the neighborhood over eight years ago fully understanding that Edgewood is a neighbor. The Dudgeon-Monroe Neighborhood has a distinct character and enjoyment about it that my family loves, and we intend to spend many years here. The Edgewood Campus is part of that character and enjoyment, and I understand that as a neighbor and a business it has its own priorities and vision for the future. However, just like any other individual neighbor, Edgewood does not have the right to unilaterally alter the character of the neighborhood to the detriment of even a minority of others. The proposal constitutes such an alteration of character and directly impacts my ability to enjoy my property.

The Lighting proposed will be placed on towers approximately 80 ft in height. Those in themselves are a significant change to a predominantly single family home neighborhood. The talk by the Musco representatives in March of last year was very interesting, and their product seems very high tech and leagues beyond what was available only a decade ago. I did notice that the Musco representatives made clear use of the word "should" when describing the abilities of their product to reduce glare and minimize the impact on surrounding properties in this project. It must be taken into consideration that they are sales representatives, and it is their job to market their product in the best light possible, no pun intended. I did look through their website which has extensive positive examples of their product. A broader internet search shows that not all of their installations were as warmly received and athletic field lighting in general has caused controversy and ill will amongst neighbors across the country.

The same is true for the description of the sound system technology that (since the audio contractor was not present) Mr. Elliott discussed. It was presented in a hypothetical, best case assumption of conditions that again was predicated on information provided by a sales representative. He also pointed out that the design of the system was preliminary. The sound system control is not the only consideration regarding increased noise. Mr. Elliott admits that he does not have the ability to control the human voice. 100, 500, up to 1,300 people can be in attendance at these events.

The traffic and parking solutions proposed by Mr. Elliott are the best effort that can be expected from Edgewood. But again, he does not have control over the actions of his students, their fans, or that of opposing teams or outside facility users. I do appreciate that he is cognizant of the difficulties that events at Edgewood bring to the neighborhood, but his best efforts do not take away the reality that even with provided parking, those events place a stress on the residential streets and the community.

I am also concerned with the frequency of use for this facility. It is true that Monroe Street is already a corridor for UW events (Camp Randall, Kohl Center, etc.). Edgewood will have to coordinate their events to not coincide with these, which means that their events will be in addition to an already stressed corridor. To be clear, I do not hold ill will towards Edgewood HS

or its students. The location of the campus and available access makes expanded use proposals such as this unreasonable.

Several community members have spoken in favor of the facility. I can appreciate that community members see value in the prospect of attending a game there. Or two. Maybe more, if they wish. Or not if they don't. The residents adjacent to the field will not have that option.



This is the view from my living room. My yard is 95 ft from the track, 180 ft from the End zone. If the goal post were Camp Randall's, my yard would still be in the stands.

I will have seats to every lacrosse, soccer, track & field, and football game and every other event they decide to host. Every. Single. One. Whether I want to or not. Whether I am at my window, on my couch, eating dinner, reading a book, or trying to sleep. The games will practically be in my house. 35 or more times a year. I will not have the luxury of saying "not today" that my neighbors a few blocks away do. Everyone in the neighborhood has a voice that should be heard. But to this end I must say that those most affected have a significantly higher stake in the issue and should be given appropriate consideration.

As a homeowner I am concerned not only with the enjoyment of my property, but also its value. No one can reasonably argue that such a project will not have a negative effect. For similar projects, like the Bishop O'Connell HS referenced above, realtors expect a decrease of 9 – 11% for the properties adjacent to the stadium. Properties within two to three blocks are also expected to be negatively impacted. For me this translates into approximately \$40,000 in value. The properties adjacent to the practice field alone have a combined assessed value of around

\$14 million. That is a significant tax base to impact for providing a venue that Edgewood High School has successfully managed decades without. The City of Madison stands to lose annual tax revenue from reduced home values in the neighborhood in addition to added maintenance expense from increased traffic on the surrounding streets. The added infrastructure to Edgewood HS adds \$0 to assessment and \$0 tax revenue as it is tax exempt.

Opposition to this project does not deny students the opportunity to participate in athletic events. The practice field exists. Edgewood also owns property 15 minutes away that is arguably better suited for this kind of project. Edgewood HS student base predominantly commutes from outside the Dudgeon-Monroe neighborhood. I do not state this negatively. It is a fact and there is nothing wrong with that. But it does mean that Home games will involve travel regardless if they are played on the Monroe Street campus or at another Edgewood property. Edgewood is not asking for the ability to host home games out of necessity. Their students are not denied opportunity for lack of facilities as generations of alum can attest (numerous persons in my family included). I cannot understand how having a "home field" here vs there is worth alienating a good portion of the community as well as altering the neighborhood attributes they are so proud of "being a part of" and figure so prominently in their outreach.

Should this plan move forward it cannot be undone (at least not without significant expense). Assurances by Edgewood High School administration, Musco Lighting, and the sound system contractor that points of concern are addressed and mitigated sound reasonable but are not a guarantee of success. Who determines what constitutes acceptable levels of noise, light spill, light glare, and traffic brought by these changes? Once it is built, is it reasonable to believe Edgewood would cease late night or the frequency of events if light, noise, and traffic mitigation "don't work out"? Will residents have to go through a rigorous complaint process with the city to find reprieve from violations of stipulations in a revised ten year plan (or any other agreement with the neighbors) as Mr. Elliot suggests? In the few interactions regarding complaints with people on school property I have had, their answer was "call the Police". Their unwillingness to address concerns directly and cordially neighbor to neighbor, as you and your neighbor surely would if you had a disagreement or complaint, does not set a very promising precedent.

A neighbor has procured audio testing equipment and made noise measurements. Although not a disinterested professional, he has shown that even without the proposed improvements the noise levels based on his findings are already at or above the levels the Edgewood proposal suggests the field will generate. I believe this is reasonable cause for an official noise study to be conducted prior to any approvals or permits. If Edgewood is that confident in its assessments there should be no objection.

You are probably aware that many neighbors feel Edgewood High School has not been honest in stating their ultimate goals in their dealings with the community. I agree with that sentiment and it is exhausting and not fair for them to constantly ask the neighborhood to revisit proposals year after year. I also hear some neighbors (mostly from people living outside the neighborhood) suggesting that it is not a new but an existing athletic field that is part of the neighborhood and people should not be surprised when improvements and modernizations are made over time, therefore a compromise should be found. It IS a new field built in 2015. Edgewood wanted a PRACTICE FIELD so students have to travel for practices every day. Edgewood received that compromise from the neighborhood. No lights, no sound, no competitive games, no outside users. In my opinion it shows bad faith that the electrical infrastructure for lighting was installed into the PRACTICE FIELD despite assurances that it was

not Edgewood's intentions to ever have lighting. Now Edgewood is asking for exactly what they said they were not going to ask for, and if the past is any indicator, Edgewood will continue to ask for more compromises in a continuous stream of future requests until in the end it has achieved exactly what was intended to begin with. For the record, Edgewood immediately began hosting actual games contrary to their PRACTICE FIELD agreement which further puts their good faith intentions in question as far as I am concerned.

Lastly the timeframe of the current proposal is concerning. Considering that the proposal does not involve safety or critical infrastructure concerns, there is no pressing reason for this process to be fast tracked. I feel the opposition last year and resistance to the existing PRACTICE FIELD shows that an expedited approval process would only serve to delegitimize the city's role as a steward of I am urging you to insist they abide by the current ten-year plan that the neighborhood agreed to in good faith.

Josh and David -

Sara and I are traveling and will miss next week's informational meeting. But we wanted to share our opposition to the Edgewood stadium expansion.

I have pasted below the email I sent to Sara Eskrich on this topic on February 2, 2017. I stand by our assessment.

I'd also note that we are not opposed to development in the neighborhood (indeed, I wrote to Sara Eskrich in support of the building going up in the former Associated Bank space). Neighborhood change and growth are positive, when they serve the neighborhood (and also help draw others).

Here, the problem is that Edgewood primarily serves non-neighborhood families; those of us who live nearby would be incurring substantial negative externalities that will diminish the quality of life in the neighborhood, without equal benefits for the neighborhood. It does not compute, especially when (a) West HS, which serves most of the neighborhood kids, does not have a home stadium in the neighborhood and (b) this is a deviation from the master plan negotiated between the neighborhood and Edgewood only a couple of years ago.

We are both a neighborhood and part of the larger community. Sometimes the larger community's needs take precedence. An example is how the City could not accommodate some requests from the neighborhood in planning to rebuild Monroe St. We simply had to ensure that Monroe St not only remained the thriving heart of our neighborhood

but also that it continued to serve as a working thoroughfare for many seeking access to UW and downtown. I understood and approved of the City's insistence that our neighborhood's preferences had to yield.

But in regards to Edgewood, there is no clear cut larger good that should trump neighborhood interests. Edgewood is a private school, not a public institution that serves all. Just as the character and interests of the neighborhood limit Hotel Red, the bbq restaurant, or any other private actor—allowing them to join our community and function within it, but subjecting them to reasonable constraints that preserve neighborhood character, health, and safety—so too should similar constraints bind Edgewood. The school, and the stadium, have been accommodated within limits. But this proposal seeks to eliminate this limits and eviscerate any balance between competing interests.

I recognize that there is a diversity of opinion on this matter. I hope DMNA will continue to take seriously the concerns many residents have and represent those concerns to the City.

Hi Sara. I was unfortunately traveling on Monday and missed the community meeting about the Edgewood stadium proposal. I am writing to express my opposition to the proposed addition of lights and a sound system to the field.

We appreciate Edgewood and all that it brings to the neighborhood. In particular, we are regular attendees at the farmer's market, and we frequently walk the boardwalks behind the school along Lake Wingra's shoreline.

But we also treasure our neighborhood's careful balance between quiet, leafy, family-friendly, residential character, on the one hand, and thriving, urban, commercial center on the other. The push and pull between these two facets of the neighborhood make it a fun, dynamic community that meets residents' needs and attracts visitors.

The addition of lights and a sound system to the Edgewood stadium, however, threatens to disrupt this balance. The proposal would project the bustle of the commercial Monroe St corridor deep into the quieter, more residential streets that make the neighborhood work for the residents. And it would do so at at times--in the evening hours, when families reconvene and recharge at the end of the day, when children go to bed, and when adults savor quiet relaxation--that are sancrosanct to many residents.

At my own home, near the corner of Edgewood and West Lawn, I have little doubt we'd regularly hear crowd and game noise, not to mention additional traffic and crowd spillover after events. Such impact--especially on the number of nights Edgewood proposes using the facility itself and renting it out for use by others--would signuficantly change our enjoyment of our street and how we are able to use our house. For example, I expect it would reduce the number of nights each year that our young children, who go to bed well before Edgewood proposes ending evening events, would be able to sleep with their windows open or that we would pass time sitting on our front porch and chatting with neighbors.

The simple truth is that Edgewood's stadium, if it had already been expanded as now proposed, would likely have had a material impact on our decision to buy our home a year ago. Indeed, when we first began looking in the neighborhood, Edgewood was in the process of replacing the field. We asked about it and we're repeatedly assured that the 10-year plan provided that the facility was for daytime practices only. It is disheartening to see Edgewood so quickly reverse course and seek to modify that agreement.

I hope to live in the neighborhood for many years. And I hope Edgewood will remain a key part of our thriving community. But not to the detriment of its residential neighbors and the neighborhood around it.

We live very close to Edgewood, but on the other side of the campus, and, for that reason, will be less affected than our neighbors in the Dudgeon Monroe neighborhood who live on the highly-impacted side. However, we feel that Edgewood should honor the agreement and Master Plan established fairly recently.

If Edgewood has no place else to play, we will reconsider our opposition; however it is our understanding that it had an agreement with Middleton High School to use Breitenbach field as its home field, too. Furthermore, both East and West High Schools, with populations 3-4 times greater than Edgewood, have to make do with not having a home field on their physical campus so we don't get why Edgewood can't, too, especially because, unlike East and West, a majority of its students likely do not live near Edgewood.
