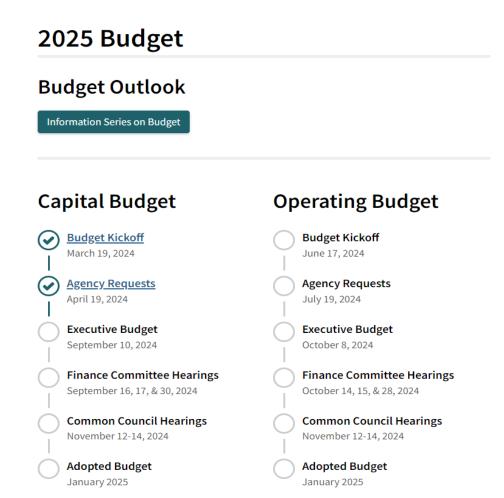

- Transmittal Memo: summary memo from department head
- Capital Proposals: proposal for each program/ project within the capital request

"Short" forms were used for projects/programs with no proposed changes in funding from 2024 adopted CIP

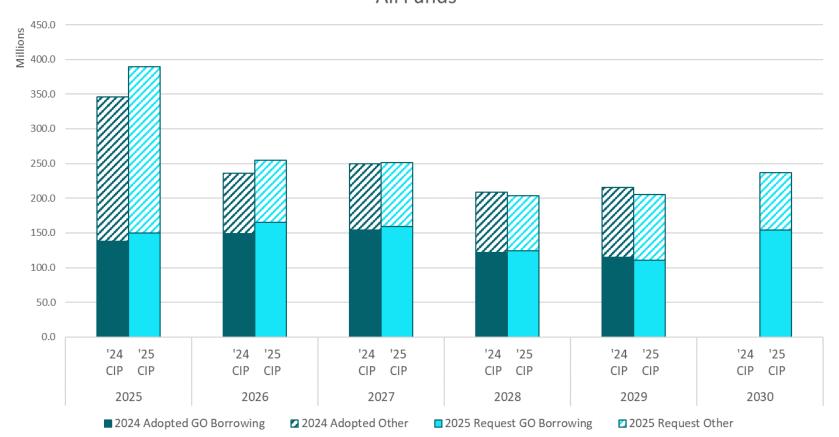
- Following slides compare the 2025 Request to the 2024 Adopted CIP
- When noting budget changes (e.g. increase in funding request), we are comparing the overlapping years of the CIP (2025 – 2029)
- Comments do not include funding requested in 2030 unless explicitly stated

2024 Adopted CIP Compared to 2025 Request All Funds



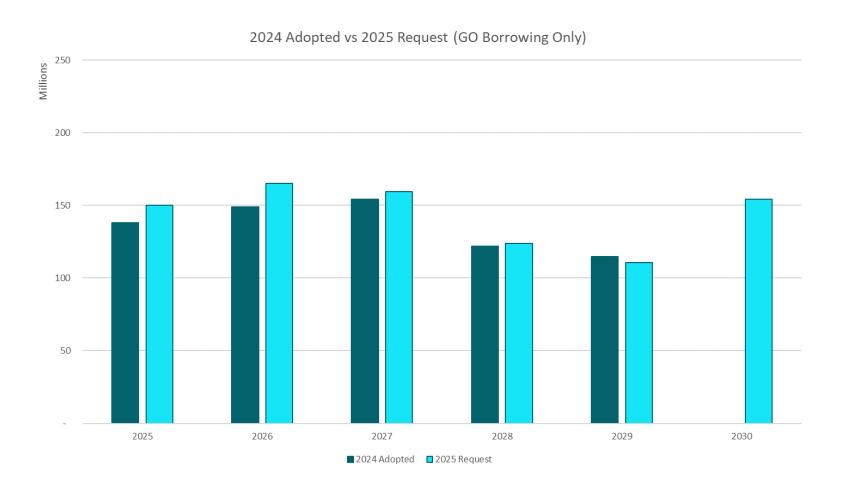
2025 - 2029

- 2025 Request for 2025 2029 = \$1.30 billion
- Adds \$48.0 million compared to the same period in 2024 adopted CIP
- \$30.9 million of additional funding is GO borrowing

2030

Request adds \$236.6
million in 2030, including
\$154.3 million in new
borrowing

2025 Request includes \$30.9m in new GO borrowing



- Budget guidance for agencies set GO borrowing target to remain at 2024 Adopted CIP levels but allowed scenarios for new funding/project requests.
- Request is 4.6% higher than 2024 adopted CIP
- Adds \$154.3 million in 2030

Major GO Borrowing Increases: \$11.7m added to 2025

- Engineering: \$1.3m Sidewalk Program; \$1.2m Troy Drive Railroad Bridge; \$1.1m Pleasant View Rd Phase 2
- **Fire:** \$1.0m moved from 2026 to 2025 for a training structure
- Fleet: \$2.7m moved from 2028 for Fire Apparatus
 & Rescue Vehicle Replacement

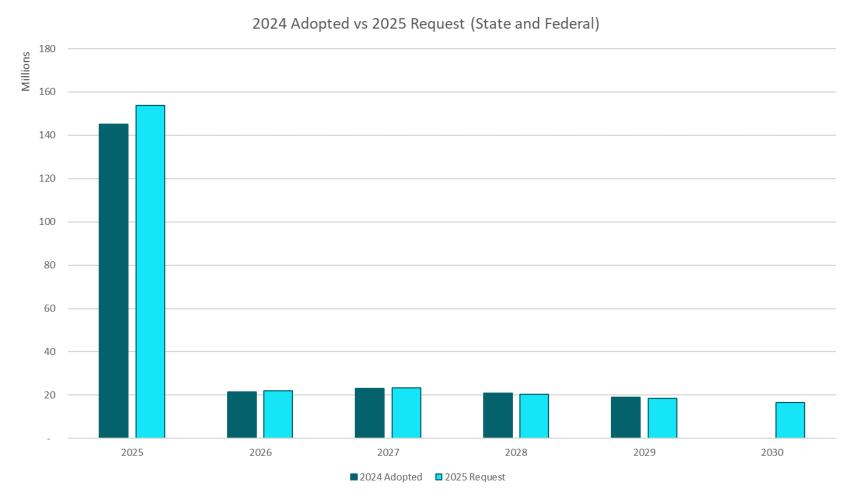
- Transportation: \$6.2m in TIF-supported borrowing added for Park Street reconstruction
- **Stormwater:** \$1.0m Lower Badger Mill Creek Pond

Major GO Borrowing Increases: \$16.1m added to 2026

Proposals with a \$1m+ increase in GO Borrowing compared to 2024 Adopted CIP Includes all sources of GO borrowing, including non-general fund borrowing (e.g. utility and TID supported GO) Amounts below show the increase, not the total project cost

- Engineering: \$1.4m Sidewalk Program; \$3.7m High
 Point/Raymond/Midtown; \$16.0m Regent Street;
- IT: \$1.3m Network Ops & Infrastructure, \$1.9m Enterprise Business Solutions
- **Fleet:** \$2.0m moved from 2029 for Fire Apparatus & Rescue Vehicle Replacement
- **Parks:** \$2.3m Park Facility Improvements

Federal & State Funding Assumptions



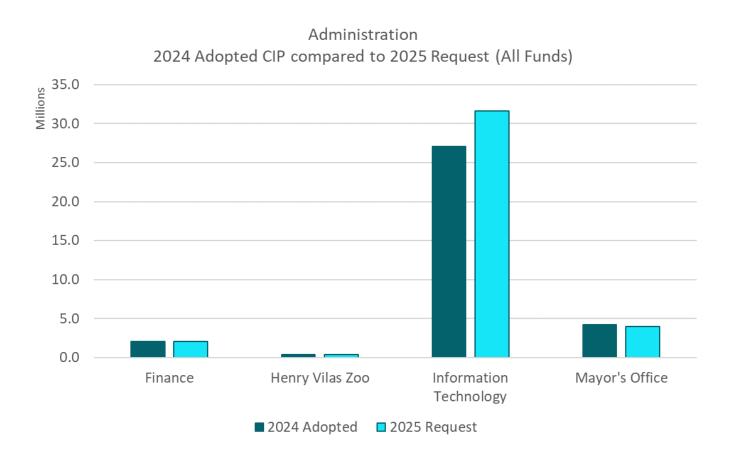
- \$8.6m increase in 2025 primarily driven by federal increases for:
 - \$5.7m CDA Redevelopment

 Triangle Redevelopment
 (GRRP grant submitted;
 response expected late
 summer 2024)
 - \$3.0m- Engineering Bicycle and Pedestrian –Troy Drive Railroad Bridge
- 83% of federal/state funding in 2025 is associated with North-South BRT

Major Facility Requests

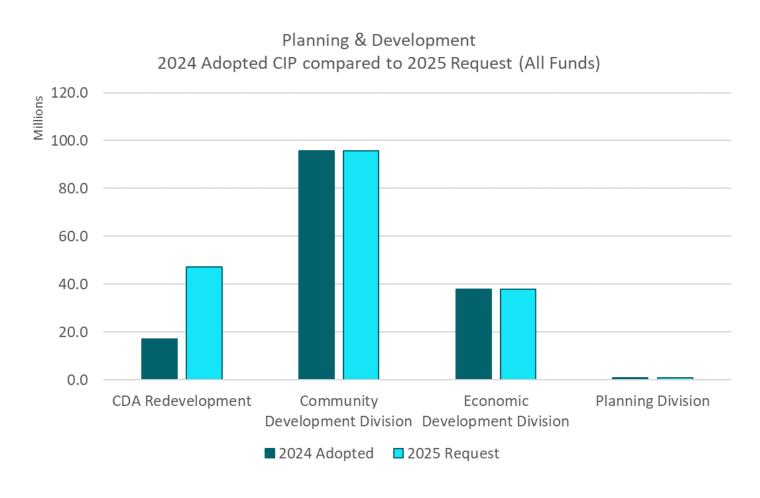
- CDA Redevelopment Triangle Redevelopment: Project budget increased by \$30.2m to fund Phases 2 and 3 of the project.
- Engineering Facilities Management Streets Facility Improvements: \$1.1m increase for fire suppression system repair at Street's East Sycamore location and other anticipated cost increases.
- Fleet B100 Fueling Infrastructure new \$750,000 project to install underground fueling infrastructure that is biodiesel compatible.
- Parks Odana Hills Clubhouse Improvements \$4.0m increase due to advancing project timeline.
- Transportation Traffic Engineering and Parking Operations Center new \$20.0m project to locate Parking Maintenance, Traffic Engineering Field Operations, and Parking Enforcement Officers into Streets Badger Road facility after a portion of Streets personnel relocate to the West facility.

Major Requests by Agency: Administration



- No change to Finance, Zoo
- Mayor's Office
 - Sustainability Improvements GO Borrowing decreased \$305,000 in 2025 -2026
- IT:
 - \$4.5m total increase in GO borrowing across multiple programs 2025-2029
 - Major changes 2025-2029 include: additional \$1.3m for Network Ops & Infrastructure; \$714k for Digital Workplace; \$1.9m for Enterprise Business Solutions; and \$517k for Digital Media Program
 - Combined AV Systems and Camera Lifecycle Mgmt into Digital Media Program; Enterprise Business Solutions absorbed Database Lifecycle Mgmt

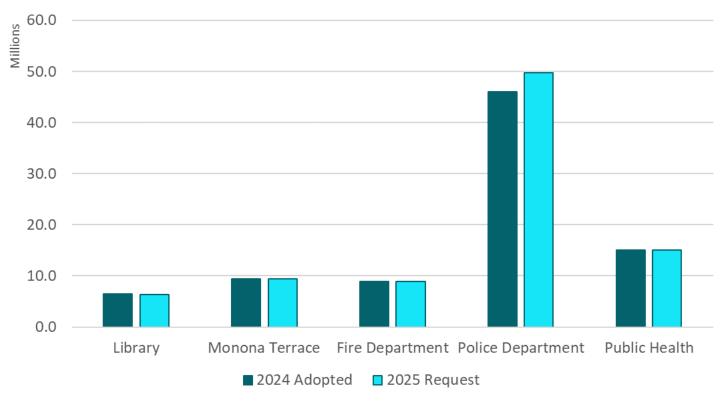

• Library:

 \$152,000 decrease GO Borrowing in 2025 for Technology Upgrades

Monona Terrace

- No major changes in overlapping CIP years.
- \$2.0m added in 2030 for Building Improvements, including \$1m for elevator repairs

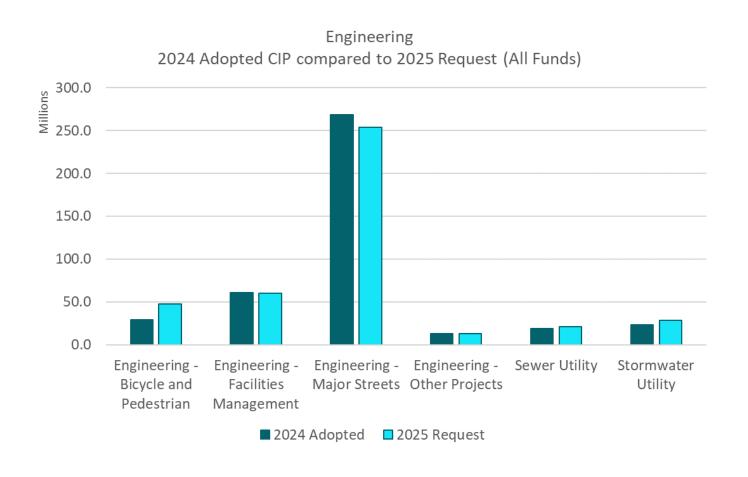
Fire

• \$1m in GO Borrowing advanced from 2026 to 2025 for training structure construction.

Police

• \$5m in GO Borrowing added in 2027 – 2030 for Portable Radios.

Major Requests by Agency: Engineering + Utilities



Bike/ Ped:

- Bikeways increased \$3.1M in GF GO and \$5.5M in Federal Sources 7 minor projects with Federal funds.
- \$7.0m increase in GF GO Borrowing for Sidewalk Program (net neutral w/ Major Streets)

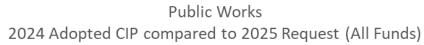
Facilities:

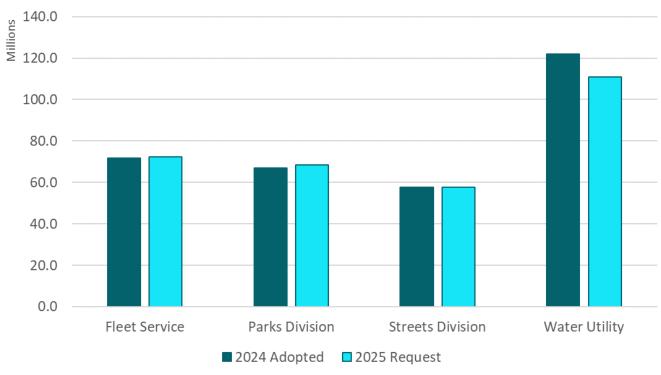
- \$660,000 GF GO increase for Reserve Fund to Maintain Temporary Shelters to continue program beyond 2025.
- Streets Facility Improvements \$1.1m GF GO increase from 2025 to 2029, includes funding for fire suppression system at Streets East Sycamore location.

Major Streets:

- \$4.6m increase for High Point/Raymond/Midtown and timing change.
- \$5.6m increase for Park Street, South for BRT work.
- \$18m for Regent Street in 2025-2026.

Major Requests by Agency: Other Public Works





• Fleet:

- New project: B100 Fueling Infrastructure. Includes \$294,500 in federal funding, \$455,500 in Non-GF GO Borrowing. Project funding scheduled in 2025-26.
- Advances Non-GF GO Borrowing from 2028-29 to 2025-26 (\$4.7m total) based on current order lead times.

Parks:

- \$5.6m increase in Park Land Improvements from 2025-2029.
- Odana Hills golf clubhouse advanced to 2027 from 2029 (\$5.1m total).

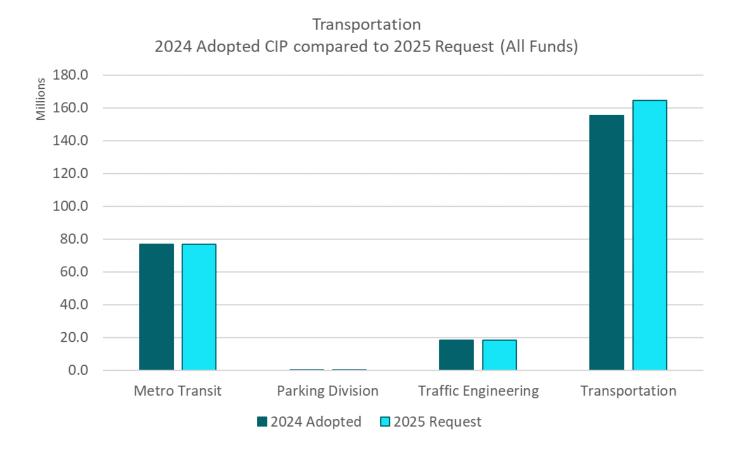
Streets:

 Streets Non-Fleet Equipment Program. \$40,000 in GF GO annually starting in 2026.

Water:

 High Point/Raymond/Midtown project schedule changed with Engineering – Major Streets schedule (\$2.8m total).

Metro:

No major changes

Parking:

 Increased funding (Parking reserves) by \$42,000 for an additional vehicle replacement; amount offset by a reduction in PEO Technology Equipment

• TE:

 Advances \$1.2m of GO borrowing from 2029 to 2027 for the Public Safety Radio System program

• Transportation:

- \$6.2m in TIF borrowing added to North-South BRT for Park Street reconstruction
- New \$20.0m project to move Transportation units into Streets Badger Road facility.

- Some carryforward projects may be pending a policy or operating budget decision

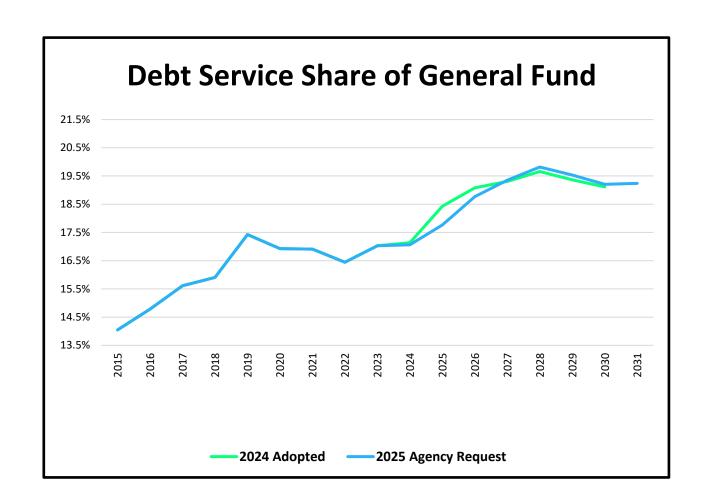

Considerations for the Executive Budget

Citywide Borrowing Targets

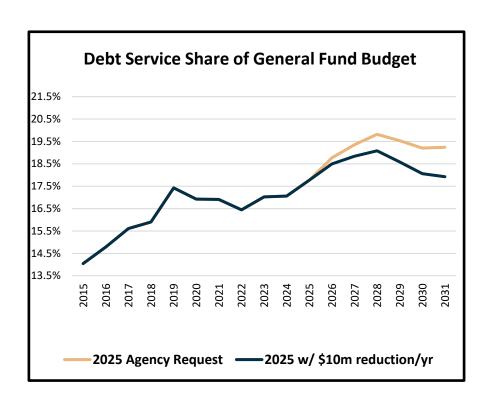
Overall Target: Keep projected debt service at or below current levels(~18%) throughout the CIP time horizon.

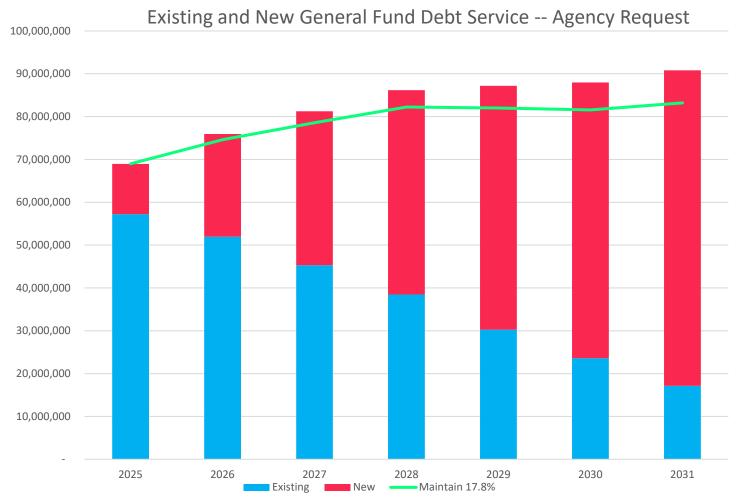
- Agency requests above target
 ~\$10m average annually; Agency
 Request CIP is "front-loaded" –
 more debt in first three years; more
 reductions needed in first three
 years to stay at 18% annually.
- Request adds \$31m in GO borrowing from 2025-2029 (\$12m GF GO; \$19m Non-GF GO)
- Request adds \$154 million in GO borrowing in 2030 (\$112m GF GO; \$42m Non-GF GO)



Citywide Borrowing Targets

 Maintaining share of budget for debt service below 18% = \$60m reduction in GF-supported GO borrowing in 2025-2030





Inputs for Executive Budget Development

- Mayor, deputy mayors, finance staff, and cross-departmental Management Review Team review all proposals
- Agencies present briefings to mayor + management team to discuss proposals
- New projects and projects with significant changes are thoroughly evaluated to:
 - Evaluate fiscal impact and ensure prudent spending priorities
 - Identify equity and sustainability opportunities
 - Determine project readiness and alignment with strategic plans
- Executive budget balances city priorities with financial considerations and target borrowing levels
