Goals:

- Early warning system which would identify trends in social, economic, and physical characteristics.
- Support program and resources allocation decisions.

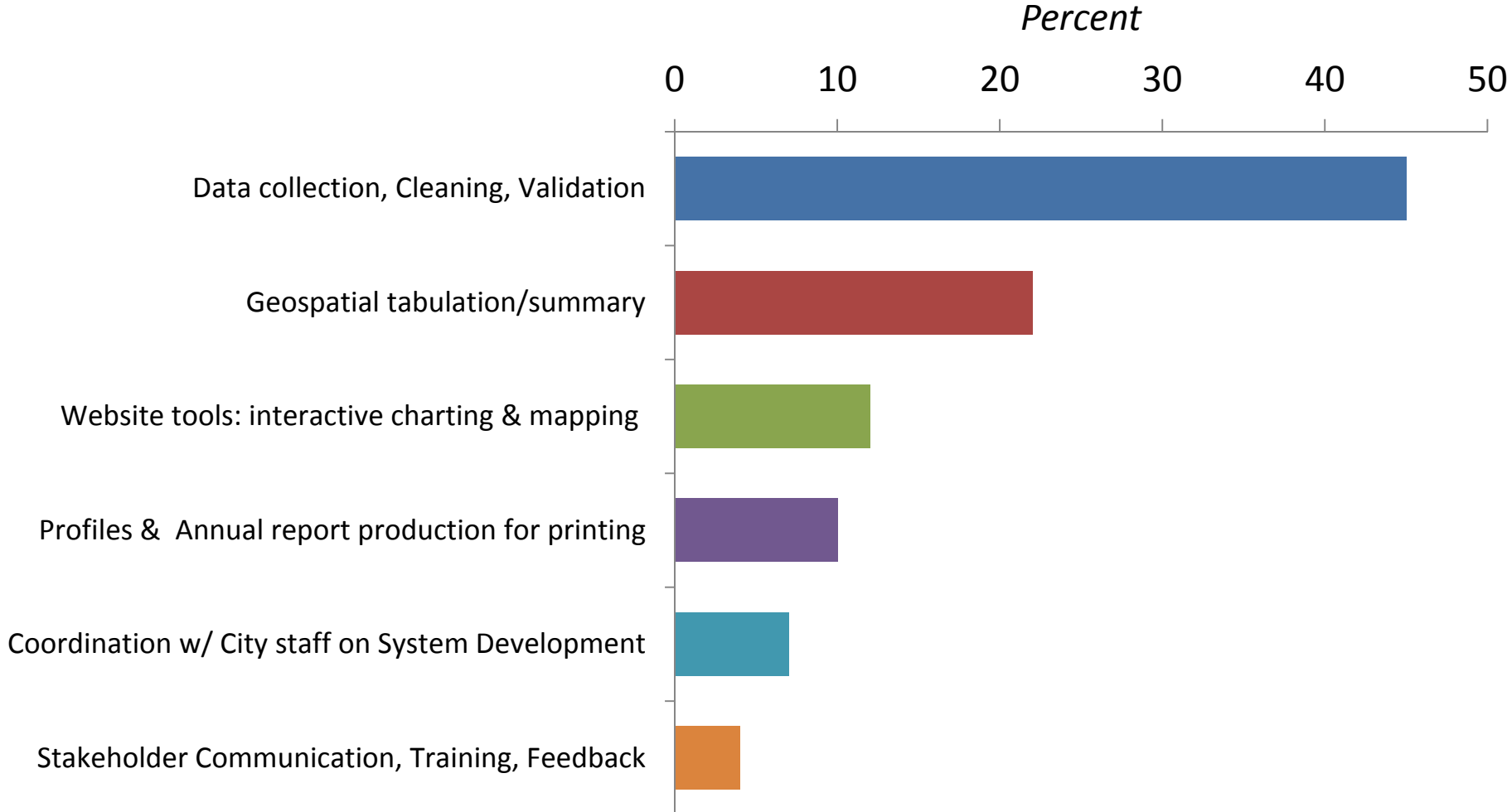
Data:

- ~46 annually updated indicators (2008-12) related to Housing, Economic, Health and Family, Transportation, Public Safety, Community Involvement, Conservation, Demographics (2000 & 2010).
- Input from public, City staff, elected officials.
- Should be relevant, reliable, consistent, geographically detailed, regularly updated, and systematically collected.

The Madison Neighborhood Indicators project seeks to quantify the diverse and changing social conditions in Madison neighborhoods. The project staff has endeavored to provide up to date measures each year, bringing together data from a variety of sources and compiling them into a suite of variables used to generate neighborhood level profile reports.

To provide a demographic context to the year-to-year indicator data, a population profile sourced from U.S. decennial censuses of 2000 and 2010 is shown directly below. The annually updated indicators are shown on page two of the profile. Definitions for Census and 2012 Indicator items can be found on pages three through six.

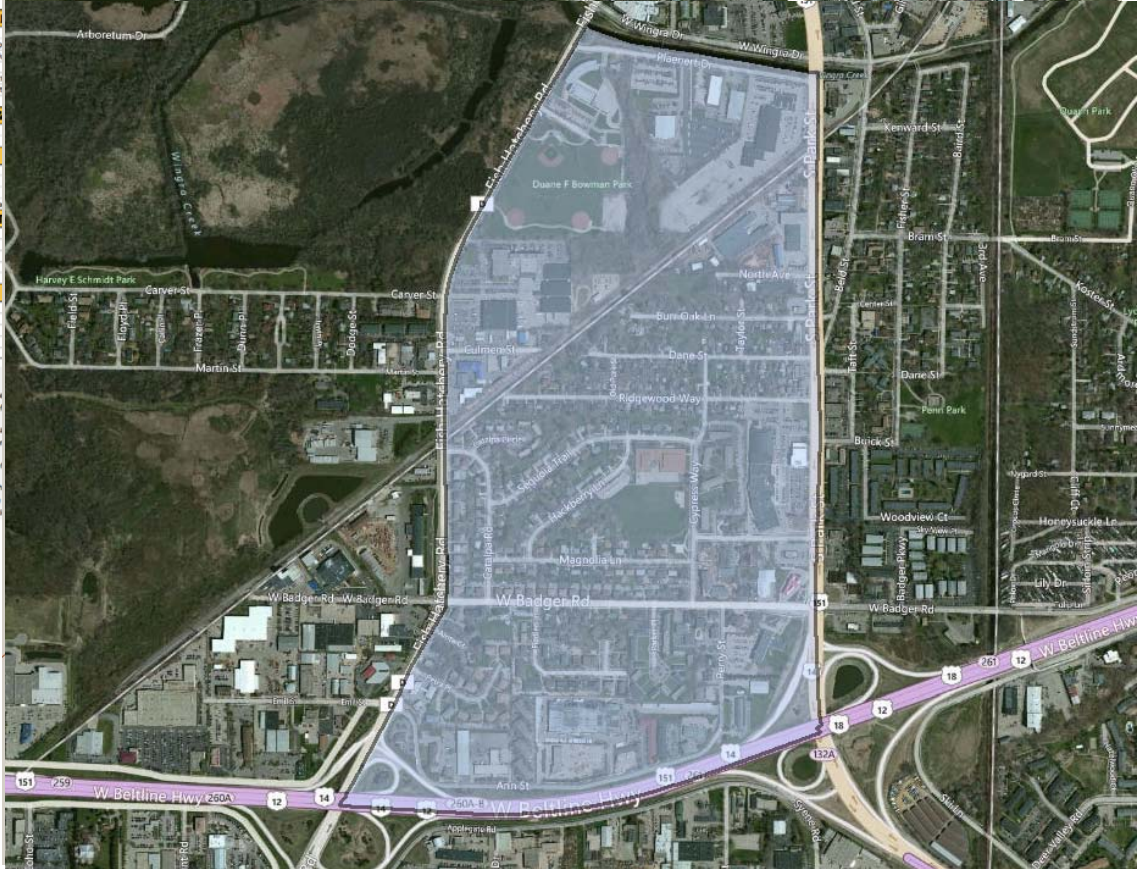

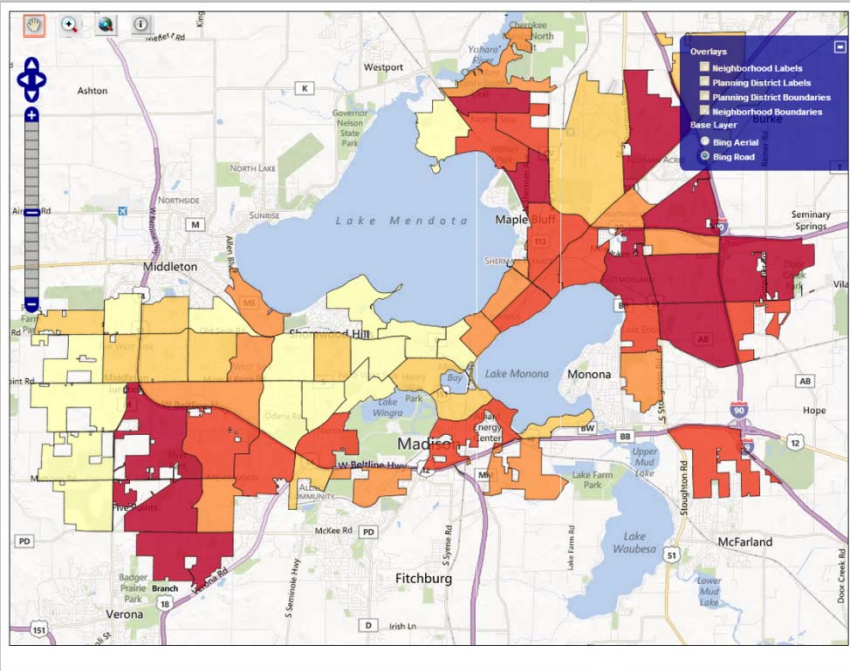

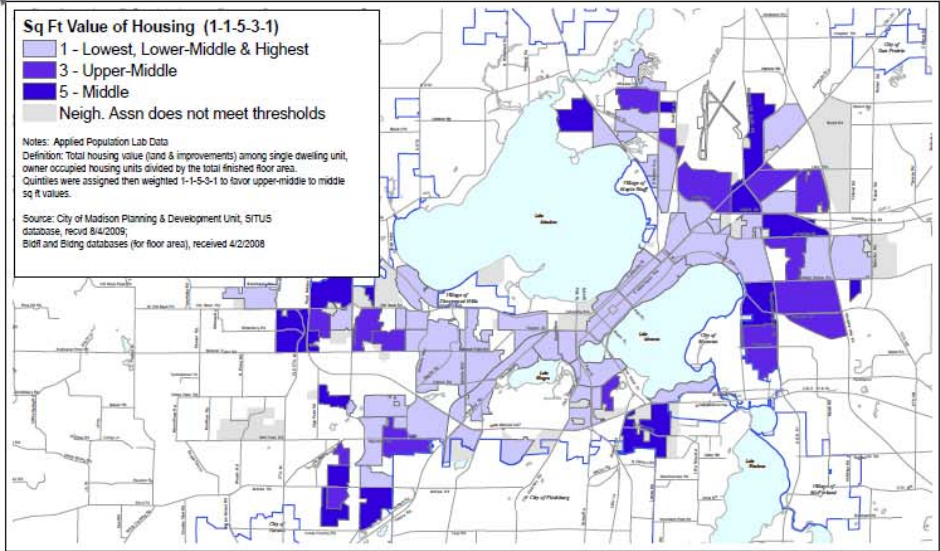

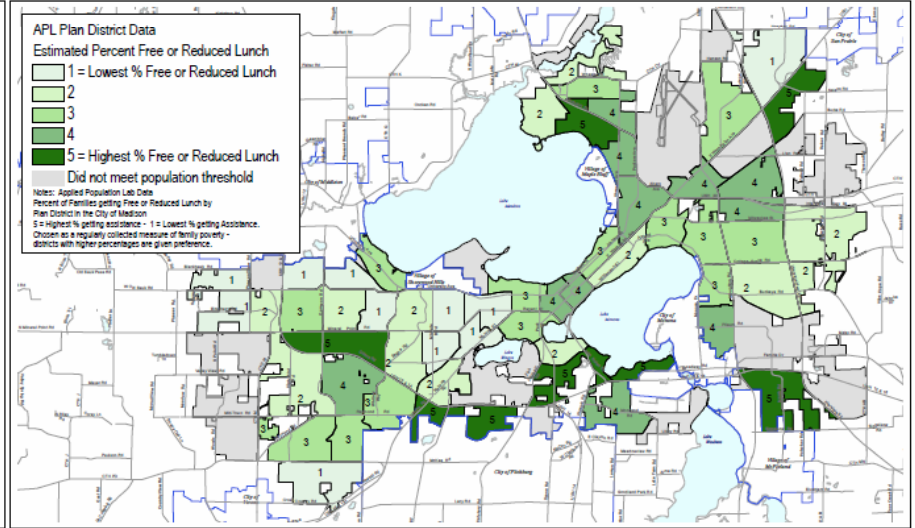
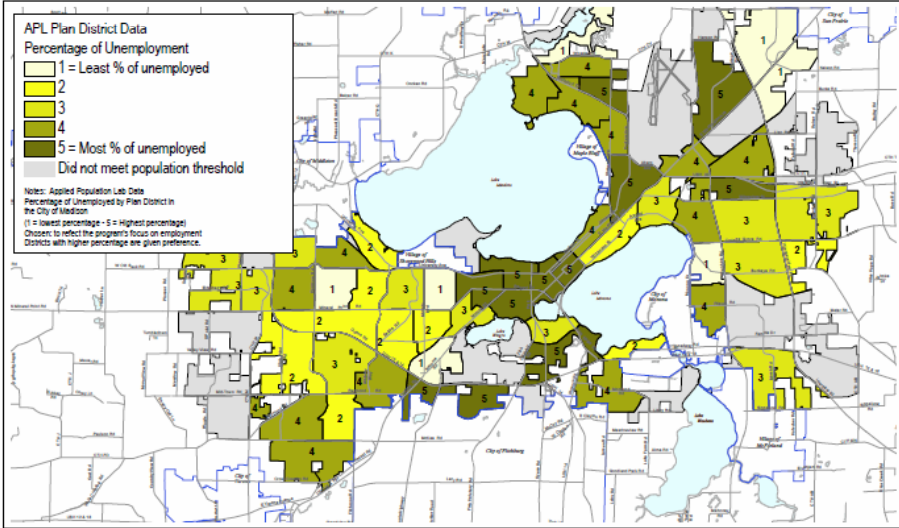
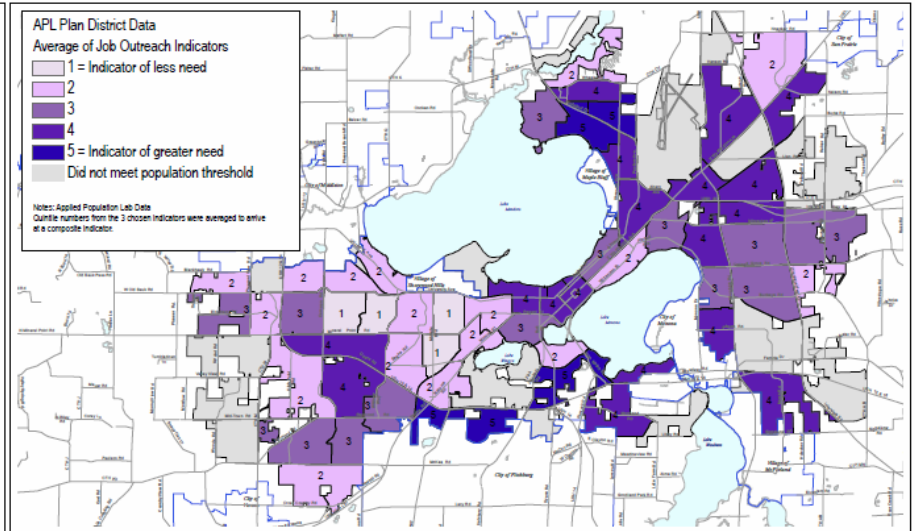
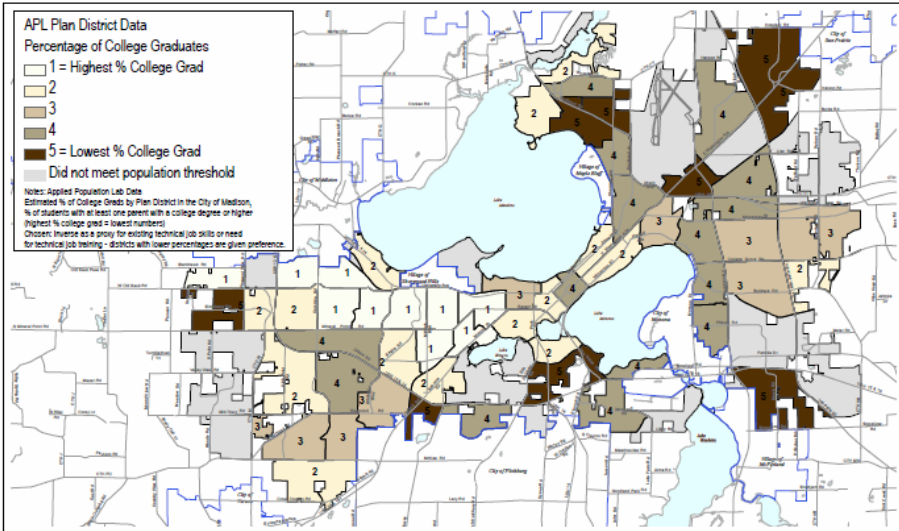


Targeted Outreach for Energy Improvement Loans

Jobs Outreach

*Notes - Applied Population Lab Data

 Only plan districts have either fewer than 100 persons (based on census estimates) or are missing data. This estimate is more likely to be erroneous around the periphery in places where new development has occurred.
 Indicators: Parent education: Percentage of students in households with at least one parent with a college degree or higher. (1 = High % of college educated), 5 = Low % college educated)
 Estimated % of Unemployed: (1 = plan districts with the lowest % of unemployed, 5 = plan districts with the highest % of unemployed)
 Estimated % by plan district of school lunch students qualifying for free or reduced lunch, (1 = lowest % by plan district qualifying, 5 = highest % by plan district qualifying)
 Assigned quintile numbers were added together and averaged to arrive at a composite indicator for possible allocation of job outreach resources.*



Considerations for NI data input revisions

- Provide more detailed categorical breakout for existing data items.
- Include point & line features on the reference map rather than summarizing for neighborhood.
- Investigate potential new items.
- Cull distracting, low value indicators.
