Dear Alder Arntsen,

I thought you did a great job as Acting Alder. Until your handling of the Edgewood stadium proposal (which in your latest update you bury at the bottom and phrase as "athletic field alterations").

In particular, it is so wrong to balance off Dudgeon neighborhood with Vilas as though their relation to Dudgeon-Monroe (where I live) as equal. In exposure, and relation to Edgewood they are not at all equal.

Now that I learn that there is a powerful economic motivation that has not been acknowledged (an income stream from field rental to OTHER organizations) I'm really angry. In fact, if I'm correct about this latter point, I'm disgusted.

I know that you had them promise to limit usage for the first five years. Let's see: are you going to enforce that? And, once the facilities are built, at considerable expense, are you really telling me they are not going to expand usage? Especially if their enrollments and tuition income is down?

I'm sure the reality is that it's a done deal, and that I, nor any of us, can do a thing about it.

But, futile as it may be, I really would ask you to recuse yourself, as a temporary Alder, and have the Plan and Council decisions postponed until there is an elected Alder who can consult properly with constituents, get all the stakeholders concerned into meaningful and friendly dialogue, and facilitate a decision which will be better in the long run for all concerned (including Edgewood). That is the way we've handled

many other issues in the past and it has worked well.

If the deal is slammed through by an unelected, short-term Acting Alder, it will lack legitimacy.

I'll be grateful if you will forward this to the full Council and the Mayor.

Hello Mr Parks,

I am writing to provide my opinions regarding the Edgewood proposed amendments to their master plan as part of the public hearing process.

I do not believe that the proposal should be accepted unless Edgewood is willing to recognize certain limiting provisions as a compromise with the strong neighborhood opposition to the stadium, lighting and amplified sound system. I would support the proposal if Edgewood was willing to specifically limit the use of nighttime lighting to a fixed number of sports events, such as 10 sports games, and limit the use of an amplified sound PA system to only sports events with attendance over 200 spectators.

Edgewood and their public relations consultants appear to be quite duplicitous in publishing misleading public information regarding their proposal. Three primary items lead one to doubt Edgewood's veracity:

- 1.) Edgewood claims that the stadium may create average sound in the area that that would measure in the 60 decibel range. Their statement to that effect is incredibly misleading. An "average" sound level is meaningless. If you were to stand at the Dane County Airport and measure sound for an hour you would find a similar "average" sound level in the 60 decibels range, but for that 45 seconds when a military fighter jet takes off from the runway the "peak" sound level would reach a disturbing 90 decibel range. It is that peak sound that affects humans, not an "average".
- 2.) The number of events described by Edgewood at the large Fall public neighborhood information meeting varied between 8 and 24 at different times, but I understand Edgewood is requesting an amendment allowing as many as 40 events. Clearly Edgewood gave the participants at the meeting false information. Since Edgewood is already in violation of their previous master plan that included improvements to the sports facility for "a practice field" that is now being used for competitive sports events, can the City trust Edgewood to limit the number of future events?
- 3.) Though Edgewood held a large public neighborhood information meeting this Fall at which the majority of neighborhood speakers opposed various aspects of their proposal, Edgewood appears to have ignored those comments and refused any compromise. The publicity items Edgewood has been sending out regarding the stadium provide the impression that Edgewood always works with the neighborhood in their decisions.

As a U.W. engineering faculty member I have measured sound levels, been involved in research regarding the impacts of sound, have published research results, and have acted as an engineering consultant on the impact of construction sound on the U.W. Hospital and research facilities. From that work I am very familiar with the impact of sound on humans as well as primates and rodents. Citing average sound levels, rather than peaks, is a completely unprofessional and misleading conduct in Edgewood's description of the stadium's impact.

The stadium will sit in the middle of an attractive and lively city neighborhood. The neighborhood residential taxpayers and Monroe Street business property owners contribute financial support for Madison's government, city infrastructure, and public education. Their opinions on neighborhood events should be closely considered. Will Edgewood's proposed stadium and systems provide its share of financial support to the city if the amendment to their master plan is approved?

I purchased my home in 1982 on Keyes Avenue, a few blocks from The Edgewood campus. Part of the reason for choosing this house was that the neighborhood was quiet, with good public schools, and bordering Lake Wingra and Vilas Park.

I strongly oppose Edgewood's proposed amendment to their Master Plan. It is my understanding that our Interim Alderman Allen Arntsen (who does not live in the neighborhood) believes that noise is "part of living in a city." I disagree. There is a reason for Madison's noise regulations. Edgewood needs to recognize that the need for quiet is "part of being situated in a residential neighborhood." It appears that Alderman Arntsen prioritizes Edgewood's needs for bleachers, lights and sounds in their athletic program over the desires and needs of the neighborhood.

Alderman Arntsen states that "Edgewood's amendment sets forth technical information as to its proposed light and sound system that will limit the impact on neighbors and surrounding natural areas." However, the Concerned Engineers in the Edgewood's Neighborhood make a compelling case that Edgewood has misrepresented the impact that the proposed stadium will have on the neighborhood. The Concerned Engineers group have outlined facts on noise levels and lights based on actual measurements that contradict Edgewood's claims. Is this something that can be ignored and only rely on Edgewood's claims? I think not.

Edgewood's argument that their proposed athletic complex will serve as a community-wide asset for greater Madison. That is questionable. Only a fraction of the school's enrollment comes from the neighborhood and nearly half of the student population is from outside Madison city limits. Neither West nor East High Schools have attached stadiums, they have a City of Madison large student population, and the students are from the neighborhood. My daughter went to West. The lack of a stadium didn't affected her high school experience. Nor should it for Edgewood.

I understand that Edgewood has already violated the noise levels which has had a negative impact on the neighborhood. My understanding is that on November 20, 2018 the city's building inspection division issued a letter informing Edgewood that they would be receiving a formal notice of violation for this non-conforming activity unless their master plan was amended. There is a lack of trust in Edgewood.

In a 2015 Wisconsin State Journal article, Edgewood High School President Mike Elliot was quoted as saying that the neighborhood has been "vehemently opposed to us having lights or playing games here" and that what was being built then was for outdoor practices. That was the intent of the Master Plan and it should remain as a practice only field with no lights or a sound system.

Mr. Parks:

We are writing to express our opposition to the proposed amendment to the Master Plan to allow Edgewood High School to construct a stadium with lights, amplified sound and expanded seating.

We have lived on Edgewood Ave (across from the Edgewood academic campus) for 14 years. We feel lucky to be part of a vibrant urban community. Although there are many drawbacks to living on Monroe Street (houses very close to each other, limited street parking, increased traffic, noise), we have always thought of these as part of the price for living here. In the time we have lived here, the density of the area has increased. A number of buildings have been torn down and replaced with mixed-use buildings each including several apartments. We have seen an increase in traffic and parking issues as a result. We are concerned that expanding Edgewood's stadium to host up to 40 events of up to 1000 spectators will add increased traffic in an area that is already congested. Although Edgewood has argued that they have ample parking for spectators and there will be no additional traffic, this defies simple logic. Currently, cars from the Edgewood campus routinely park in front of our house – this is before the increased spectators that would come from a new stadium.

Although we understand Alder Arntsen's effort in negotiating a compromise (only five evening football games and no increased daytime use), Edgewood has proved in the past that they are not honorable in keeping their promises. When the fields were originally upgraded, Edgewood was clear that the fields would only be used for practice and that they understood the neighborhood's opposition to lighting and sound amplification. Now, four years later they are asking to add lighting and sound. In fact, they currently aren't following the agreement they made in the Master Plan and are hosting games as well as renting it to outside customers. Although Edgewood has couched their request in terms of being able to have their football teams play on a home field, this is not completely honest. Hosting up to 40 events makes the stadium a revenue generating venue with little to no benefits to the neighborhood or city. No tax revenue will be generated, and a majority of students come from outside the city of Madison.

As residents of the Monroe Street neighborhood, we reap the benefits of living in an urban area. We also understand that living in densely populated area requires us to make accommodations so as to be good neighbors. Edgewood needs to understand this as well. The construction of this stadium is in clear violation to this.

Dear Members of the City Plan Commission:

I write to register my strong opposition to the proposed Edgewood Stadium and to Interim Alder Allen Arntsen's "compromise" proposal. While I appreciate the desire for compromise, if this stadium is built, there is no guarantee that Edgewood won't soon be pushing for more games at night, and there will be no recourse if the surrounding neighborhood finds that the noise, the lights, or the traffic are problematic; the city has no ordinances for the noise and light pollution stadiums generate. Edgewood assured us a few years ago that they would not ask for a stadium. They did not remain true to their word. We have no reason therefore to trust that they won't be demanding more games soon.

As for the proposal itself, it serves the interest of Edgewood High School, but not the interests of the neighborhood or the city of Madison. Edgewood High School has fewer than 500 students, of which only slightly over a quarter live in the 53711 zip code (a zip code that extends into Fitchburg). Even fewer play football—a sport coming under increasing scrutiny because of the danger posed by concussions. The bottom line here is that Edgewood High School does not function as a neighborhood school.

Our neighborhood high school, West High, that genuinely serves this area has more than four times as many students enrolled (2,111 students) and yet they, like most urban high schools, manage without a local stadium. This is entirely appropriate, given the density of housing closely surrounding the school.

Edgewood is particularly close to its residential neighbors, so that a stadium will have significant impact. I myself live in the 2000 block of Jefferson, only 2 blocks from the campus, and I am distraught thinking of the noise that will disturb my gardening, my evenings in the back yard with friends or by myself. The noise, the traffic, the trash, the drunken people wandering into my yard from games at Camp Randall are plenty for me to deal with already; we don't need more (and much more intense) noise and traffic and trash for the sake of a few very privileged high school students. I have lived in this historic neighborhood for thirty years, and it's a treasure for Madison: beautiful, serene, filled with

birds because of its proximity to the UW Arboretum and Vilas Park. With the zoo on one side, and lively Monroe Street on the other, this desirable neighborhood is one of those that makes Madison an attractive city for people to move to and invest in. Its serenity would be destroyed by this stadium and the quality of life here significantly diminished. My house is my nest egg, and I fear that property values will be negatively affected. (If so, the city would begin to lose tax revenue—this neighborhood has stunningly high taxes.) Let Edgewood use the money they have available to build a stadium do so in a significantly less densely settled place in the suburbs, combining forces with a suburban school.

Although it has been reported that the Vilas Neighborhood Association supports this development, I want it to be very clear to all involved in this decision that support for building a stadium is anything but unanimous in this neighborhood. I was unable to attend the Vilas Neighborhood Association meeting at which the vote was taken on the stadium, but my understanding is that even though the significant majority of those attending spoke against the stadium, those on the board who voted nonetheless did so unanimously in favor of the stadium. The board should represent their constituents, yet they failed to do so. (In consequence, a large number of residents showed up at the next meeting and voted out the president of the board, among others.) In the single block of Jefferson Street where I live, I know of at least ten residents of voting age who are opposed to having the stadium built. Please do not believe that the vote of the VNA board is a vote of the neighborhood, where there is in fact strong opposition.

Once a stadium like this is built, it can't be unbuilt and its impact can't be undone. Its construction is not in the interests of the residents of the neighborhood, of those who use Wingra Park or enjoy the recreational resources of Lake Wingra, or of the many city residents who regularly stroll along the Park and Pleasure Drive behind Edgewood. This is a very weighty decision. I urge you not to allow the interests of one small private high school to outweigh the interests of the residents of the neighborhood and of the city of Madison.



Edgewood High School has gone to great lengths to mislead the community Don't be fooled! If this stadium is built, there is no going back!

Edgewood High School claims "technological improvements" mean their stadium won't impact neighborhood. Don't fall for it!

Claim: "Sound levels [would be] around 60 dB at adjoining streets"
Fact: Noise levels of 69 dBA have already been measured at the front door of a neighboring home during a JV game on the practice field with only around 50 fans in attendance and no PA or band. Therefore, simple physics predicts noise levels of about 80 dBA for a crowd of 500. Sound measurements taken during a game at Waunakee with a sub-1000 crowd showed noise levels of 87 decibels. Noise levels will exceed 80 decibels inside people's homes on Woodrow, Monroe, Terry, and West Lawn.

The conditions in Edgewood's formal proposal to the city set **no** limit on noise levels that they may create. If approved, this proposal would revise Edgewood's zoning to give them *carte blanche* to generate any level of noise that they please, with no recourse from neighbors or the city.

Claim: "Sound levels will meet or exceed all applicable city standards"

Fact: The city's noise regulation prohibits the generation of noise that causes levels in excess of 65 dBA in neighboring residentially-zoned properties. Edgewood is already violating this and neighbors have complained repeatedly about excessive noise. Edgewood talks about "complying", while they are really asking to be exempted from the city's noise ordinance — if they were to get this, then "The provisions of [the city's noise ordinance] shall not apply to... events for which a permit or license is required and obtained". This would both make their current violations legal and allow them to further increase their noise levels.

Claim: "Our new lighting technology prevents sky glow"

Fact: There have been no major recent advances in lighting technology that reduce sky glow, and it is widely recognized that sky glow is impossible to eliminate. The City of Madison has had a dark-sky ordinance since 1993, and any stadium lighting installed since then has complied with it – you can look at any lighted stadium in the area and see what it would be like. The sky glow from Breitenbach Stadium at Middleton High School can be seen from 1.5 miles away – at that distance the glow appears brighter than nearby streetlights. Is that what we want over Lake Wingra and the arboretum?

Claim: "[Our lighting] meets/exceeds City lighting requirements"

Fact: The city only has specific design requirements for lighting in "parking facilities and outdoor merchandising areas", with only two "General Requirements" that apply to other outdoor lighting. One sets standards for outdoor lighting fixtures with output over 1,000 lumens, which is "equivalent to a single 70-Watt incandescent bulb", and is completely inadequate for regulating the 4.5 million lumens of stadium light that Edgewood is proposing to install – this would be "equivalent to 315,000 Watts of incandescent light bulbs". The other sets a limit for "light trespass" that is thousands of times brighter than natural nighttime light levels. Even if they were to comply with that limit, they would be destroying the darkness of the night sky for a large radius around their property.

Claim: "Edgewood is committed to adhering to [limits on use] and all of the agreed-upon restrictions will be fully enforceable by the City of Madison"

Fact: Edgewood has been routinely violating the legal zoning of their property since immediately after their Campus/Institutional Master Plan was approved. They have been using an area that is formally zoned for "team practices" and "physical education classes" to conduct varsity games as well as renting it to outside customers. The zoning language was not an oversight — it was an agreement negotiated between Edgewood, surrounding neighborhoods, and the city, and has the force of law. Edgewood is aware that their current use is nonconforming, but it has been an on-going issue that has had a negative impact on the neighborhood, subjecting neighbors to noise levels in violation of city regulations. On

November 20, the city's building inspection division issued a letter informing Edgewood that they would be receiving a formal notice of violation for this non-conforming activity unless their master plan was amended.

Edgewood High School has shown blatant disregard for city zoning law and agreements that they've made with the city and the surrounding neighborhoods. How can neighbors trust anything that Edgewood claims when they so flagrantly break the law already?

Claim: "It's only 5/18/26/27/40 nights a year!"

Fact: Edgewood's formal amendment requests that lights be permitted for up to 40 games per year, plus unlimited practices. They are setting no conditions or limits on the number of games or outside events at which amplified audio would be permitted. The "compromise" proposed by the alder appointed for our district by the city would limit the use of lights to five football games, but still allow Edgewood unlimited use of amplified audio at other times, and permanently allow Edgewood to continue what they are currently getting away with by violating their zoning.

Claim: "Edgewood hosted neighborhood listening sessions to share our ideas and gather feedback. Those sessions helped identify... areas that we have specifically addressed as we move through the process".

Fact: This is half-true. They did host neighborhood meetings and issued various press releases and other documents, but have done nothing to actually address the core neighborhood concerns about stadium lights, amplified sound, and crowd noise. The process has been characterized by Edgewood telling us their intentions, neighbors expressing their concerns and objections, and Edgewood dismissing those concerns as overblown or irrelevant and saying that they're going to do it anyway. This does not demonstrate "a commitment to positive neighborhood relations" – it is demonstrative of an attitude of entitlement that has generated an enormous amount of discord and distrust in the neighborhood.

In a 2015 Wisconsin State Journal article, Edgewood High School President Mike Elliott was quoted as saying that their project to resurface the practice field 'has received the support of area neighborhood groups that have balked in the past at the idea of turning the facility into a competition site for Edgewood's many athletic programs', and acknowledging that "We're between two neighborhood associations. They have been vehemently opposed to us having lights or playing games here. We're really building this to be able to give our athletes the practice facilities that provide the best surfaces possible and to expand the amount of outdoor practices we can hold especially in the spring."

Edgewood is a private non-profit tuition-based school campus that resides in the Dungeon

Monroe neighborhood (www.dmna.org). I attended multiple meetings for the proposed Edgewood Stadium with my neighbors and Edgewood. Edgewood wants to have a permanent stadium playing field immediately adjacent to its neighbors on Woodrow and Monroe Streets in Madison. You must see the "practice field" location to truly appreciate what they are proposing to visualize the effect a permanent stadium will have on the Dudgeon Monroe neighborhood.

Personally, I believe you should be able to do whatever you want to do on your own property as long as it is not to the detriment of your neighbors. For example, I may want to divert rain water away from my house to prevent flooding in my basement, but I should not be able to divert my rainwater downspouts to my neighbor's house and routinely flood their basement. Edgewood is proposing to do something very similar to the analogy above. My concerns about crowd noise, lighting and parking are below.

I have heard everything from the stadium will only be used for the High School Football team for a few games at night; to it will be used for 40 night games for various events; to it would be a great asset for the neighborhood and benefits many other organizations in Madison. I have a hard time believing that this stadium is only going to be used by the Edgewood High School which is why in the past I have asked the question concerning the number of events projected. Edgewood is going to want to maximize the return on the investment of this privately held asset.

I am very concerned about crowd noise. If we get lost in the technical solution provided in the presentation, it is easy to lose sight of the human impact (e.g. a crowd cheering for their team). It can be a vicious cycle of cheers of joy supporting your team when you are winning or be ing the "twelfth man" trying to prevent from your opponent's team from being able to communicate. The average volume provided in the presentation (average over duration) is not a good representation of what my neighbors are going to experience from peak noise levels. If this is allowed to move forward, crowd noise is not enforceable, and the community residents will have to live with noise. This will have serious effects on my neighbors to the point I fear we will not be able to enjoy our residential properties, so this private, tu ition-based institution can have a stadium in our neighborhood. We should be allowed to make enhancements to our properties, but not when they are to the detriment of our neighbors.

Personally, I do not want to see this neighborhood change. We chose this neighborhood because we recognized it was special. We do not want the noise and light pollution and other challenges the stadium is going to bring. Edgewood's presentation was for 30 fc based on what they received from the group trying to sell them the solution. We saw members of the sales team once, and they were more Account Executives than engineers who would or could honestly answer questions when challenged on what was presented. Edgewood's presentation was modeled for 30 fc of lighting.

I am disappointed there was not verification of the study provided to Edgewood to certify the results and assumptions made by the sales team trying to make the sale. The sales team is selling a solution and will assure Edgewood it will work for their application. Edgewood will implement the solution, and when it does not work as projected. Edgewood will request

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additional changes that will invalidate what Edgewood presents to you and will continue to negatively impact its neighbors. For example, Edgewood will cite something like student athlete safety requiring the light illumination level to be raised to a higher value (50 fc is the NCAA

recommendation). I do not want to see anyone get hurt due to poor lighting on the field because Edgewood decided to believe what is was presented.

I am also concerned about parking based what is proposed. Edgewood would like us to believe parking will not be a problem because they have sufficient parking stalls based on their estimates, but once people who are not local to the Dudgeon Monroe community figure out that it is faster for them to park in our neighborhood and walk to the stadium, they will park in our neighborhood, and they will walk to avoid parking on Edgewood campus and the associated traffic issues to them when they try to either get to a game or leave from a game. There is a reason we have 2-hour enforceable parking limits without a residential permit during the day on our streets near Edgewood's campus.

Finally, a point was made concerning what happens to property values if this moves forward. We have something special here today. Once it is gone, it is gone forever and there is no turning back. I firmly believe if this change is allowed to move forward what makes our neighborhood special will be gone. As a result, I believe property values will decline because of the negative ef fects presented, noise, parking, lighting, etc. The neighborhood will become a less sought location for families and the result is property values will decline. Who is left to absorb the financial impact when the revenue generating property taxes for the Dungeon Monroe neighborhood public school drop?

It would be financially irresponsible for Edgewood to invest additional funds to the existing "practice field" to see what the impact would be to neighborhood. Based on what the existing practice field looks like today they may have already been financially irresponsible, or maybe they always had the intention to have a permanent stadium in Dungeon Monroe even though this was not what was presented in its 10-year plan. Perhaps this was always the plan despite the damage Edgewood would cause to their neighbors. It is impossible for me to know what is in the hearts and minds of the people behind Edgewood, but it does not feel like they are living to up to their values.

Based on past their past performance with promises made (e.g. practice field used for games), Edgewood cannot be trusted to implement a solution that will not create problems for its neighbors. There are other places not in this peaceful, treasured, densely populated residential community where this private tuition-based institution can have a sports facility that would not be immediately adjacent to a dense residential community. We have something special here. Once it is gone, it is gone forever. Please vote no on the Edgewood stadium proposal.

I am disappointed I will not be able to attend the planning commission meeting personally. I will be out of state due to military commitments.

After twenty-seven years as a homeowner at 702 Leonard Street, I retired from my position as Professor at UW-Madison School of Music in the summer of 2016, sold my home on the corner of Leonard Street and West Lawn, and moved to New York to be closer to family.

Since that summer, I have continued my artistic relationship and friendships in Madison, and return monthly to play in the Madison Symphony and produce a summer classical chamber music festival, the Bach Dancing and Dynamite Society. Madison has never been far from my thoughts, and I have followed the questions over the new potential Edgewood stadium with alacrity.

When Edgewood High School decided to move its main entrance to the corner of Leonard Street and Monroe Street, there was never any thought (on Edgewood's part) about how it would affect the neighbors on Leonard Street, but only about the new light and how the entrance would enhance the Edgewood campus. With my neighbors on Leonard Street and beyond, we entered a heated battle with the city, and with Edgewood, to close Leonard Street and turn our street into a cul de sac, so that people would not be revving their engines at 7:00 AM right outside our front doors. After a struggle of almost two years, we succeeded in our quest and have preserved Leonard Street as a quiet residential street. The neighbors all heaved a huge sigh of relief.

A bit of historical perspective: My kids learned how to ride their bikes on the Edgewood track on Monroe Street, and until it was a locked, gated, and fenced-in track, the community appreciated and enjoyed it in an informal way. Over the past years, since the greatly-enhanced track was installed, I have been woken on countless mornings at 6:30 AM (sometimes earlier), with screaming, bullhorns, and roaring crowds. And this is all without a

stadium and lights1 This has been greatly disruptive, and contributed to the overall mayhem that Monroe Street has become, with ever-denser apartment building, lack of parking and traffic.

Although I am no longer a full time citizen of Madison or a homeowner at 702 Leonard Street, I can say with some authority that I believe it would be a terrible, terrible mistake to allow Edgewood to once again run roughshod over the neighborhood, to continue to alter their sworn master plan, and to forever alter the character of the neighborhood we have loved for so long. It is a well-documented fact that neighborhood children do not even attend Edgewood, and it has long been known as a haven for wealthy students from the far regions of Madison metropolitan area.

Once it's done, it will never be undone. For once, let the developers take a back seat to the legitimate neighborhood concerns, which are legitimate and numerous. It's an abhorrent idea to build a stadium on Monroe Street on the Edgewood campus, and will lead to many other "deviations" from their "master plan" down the road. Edgewood has shown its hand, and it's a self-serving, money-grubbing, and thoughtless grab.

Hi,

My name is Matt Stoner Fehsenfeld and my wife and I own a house on Terry Place. We are writing to you to express our strong opposition to Edgewood's proposed plan to build a stadium.

We live on the East side of Terry Place at 815 and already experience noise from the existing "practice," especially during weekend events when we are in our back yard with our two young kids. While the current levels of noise are not significantly intrusive, the prospect of that noise being much louder, more frequent and in the evenings as well as the day time, is very concerning. Also, I worry evening games would prevent us from having our windows open in the summer, especially with two young kids who go to bed early.

We chose to purchase a house on a dead end street three years ago in part because it is so quiet and peaceful. We regularly eat dinner on our back deck together as a family in the evening to unwind and connect during the warmer months on our back deck. Stadium noise would significantly harm our ability to enjoy this sort of back yard activity and affect our quality of life negatively.

I am also concerned that Edgewood is not planning any additional parking for this new stadium. Our street is completely full of student cars every day there is school at Edgewood and so their claim that their current capacity for parking is sufficient to cover this additional demand does not ring true.

Lastly, I have significant concern about Edgewood's commitment to operating in good faith to respect any limitations on the number or type of events they are allowed to host if a stadium is built. They already host outside groups for games on a regular basis on what is supposed to be a practice field, some of which bring in their own amplified sound systems which we can hear at our house. Barring the creation of a new enforcement mechanism, what would keep Edgewood from once again agreeing to a set of use conditions on the new construction and then violating them once it was complete.

In summary, we as a family are strongly opposed to allowing Edgewood to modify their zoning/master plan and granting them exception to city noise ordinances. We feel that it would hurt our family's quality of life, potentially lower our property value and place too great a burden on our neighborhood with questionable or no offsetting benefit.

I add my voice to the chorus expressing opposition to the proposed new Edgewood High School stadium. Thank you for considering my opinion.

Through various public platforms — including articles and letters in the WSJ, the "nonewstadium" web site, the DMNA position paper — the negative impacts of the project have been effectively articulated:

- * Amplified sound, as well as crowd noise, will disturb the peace of neighborhood residents and visitors enjoying the beautiful Wingra lake, park and paths;
- * Light pollution will affect every creature (human and non-human) in the vicinity, including across the lake;
- * Traffic to and from the games will clog Monroe Street; drivers wanting to avoid waits and fees at Edgewood lots will take spaces on side streets.

Another impact is aesthetic: the tall poles supporting the light fixtures will be an eyesore, not only during night games, but at all times.

Stadium sound, lighting and crowds will surely also impact other activities at Edgewood — music and theatre events, lectures, library study.

I don't believe that EHS has adequately addressed these concerns, nor made a winning argument for the necessity of a new stadium. Take for instance the issue of commuting to games. If the majority of EHS students do not actually live near the school, as I understand is the case, they will have to drive to the school for games. How is this an improvement over the status quo, where they have to commute to a stadium elsewhere?

To significantly and permanently alter the quality of life of a community and environment is a serious matter, as all stakeholders agree. But if this decision were put to a vote, it seems to me that priority should be given to those most directly and routinely affected — nearby residents and businesses, and those who spend time at Wingra park and lake.

And what about the Wingra wildlife? Too bad they can't have a say in the debate.

As a past president of the Vilas Neighborhood Association and longtime Madison resident, I am deeply concerned about Edgewood High School's proposal to build an athletic stadium on the Edgewood campus and urge you to vote against this proposal at your upcoming meeting. My specific concerns are as follows.

- •The proposed project does not conform to the Monroe Street Commercial District Plan and master plan agreed upon by Edgewood.
- •The excessive noise and light levels at athletic events will negatively impact the residents on neighboring streets, the nearby Park and Pleasure Drive, the Arboretum and Lake Wingra.
- •The increased traffic resulting from these events will negatively impact Monroe Street and the adjacent neighborhoods.
- •Edgewood High School is a private institution that does not contribute to the city's tax base. Nor do a majority of its students reside in the adjacent Vilas, Dudgeon Monroe or Regent neighborhoods.

I feel that the Vilas Neighborhood Association Council's vote in favor of this project did not take into account its members' widespread opposition to it and thus did not properly represent its membership. Likewise, Alder Arntsen's positive vote did not reflect the will of his constituents.

Through the years, our neighborhood association has worked closely with Edgewood in ensuring that its campus plan is acceptable to both the school and neighborhood. The relationship has been a good one. It is only now that I feel that their proposal exceeds acceptable guidelines and is injurious to the quality of life in our neighborhood and city.
