"house-warming."
The spacious new building, now just receiving the contractor's fin-ishing touches, will be thrown open to the public Saturday from nine in the morning until nine at night. The entire first floor is occupied by the numerous specialized departments devoted to real estate sales, rentals, property management, insurance and investments. Each of these departments is under an able executive, trained in expert management by years of experience with the Stark organization.
17 Years Expansion

The new building is the outgrowth of 17 years of constant expansion and sound business experience in Madison, which has resulted during the last sever years alone in the selling of over \$8,000,000 of real estate in the city. Last year sales went over the \$1,500,000 mark.

The opening celebrates the completion and installation of a far larger equipment than the company has ever before possessed. ### Homer Designs Building

Philip M. Homer, who designed the Stark-French building on the corner of West Mifflin and Fairchild streets, is one of the younger architects who is rapidly coming to the front in this city. The Stark-French building is only one of a group of commercial and office buildings which he has planned for Madison business men. Probably one of the most imposing structures built by him is the Schenk building on the corner of Atwood Avenue and Winenbago street directly opposite the Security State bank. This building has attracted a great deal of attention and is one of the outstanding buildings on the East Side.

Mr. Homer designed the No. 5 fire station on Atwood Avenue for the City of Madison. In this matter, he departed boldly from the custom prevailing in Madison for buildings of this type, and created a Fire Station which suggests the home rather than the ordinary type of building. Instead of being a detriment to surrounding property, this building is generally considered one of the assets of the East Side, demonstrating how an architect can be of service in building up values rather than destroying in a community.

Mr. Homer also designed the Mifflin arcade on the corner of Mifflin and Fairchild streets across from the Stark-French building, the Ricder store and apartment building the corner of University avenu



and Lake street, and a large number of other buildings both residential and commercial.
