SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT – FEBRUARY, 2012 EAST PARKS – CRAIG KLINKE, SUPERVISOR

It has been an interesting winter, to say the least. Getting the rinks up and running has been a real struggle. With unseasonably high temperatures, we've faced challenge after challenge this winter, snow on top of thin ice, and overall, just poor quality ice. Our crews have done their best and we managed to open the majority of the rinks for short time periods.

We haven't received too much snow this season, either. Our crews have been able to clear all of the snow at skating events in a very timely fashion.

Additional duties we've been working on this winter include: pruning, assembling soccer goals, and performing table, bench, and barrel maintenance. We are also meeting with user groups to develop improved plans for mowing maintenance this spring.

WEST PARKS - KRISTIN MATHEWS, INTERIM SUPERVISOR

During December, we were finally able to establish some ice at our outdoor rinks, but it was an ongoing battle. When we thought we had good ice, the temperatures would warm up and we would lose any ground we had gained the week or days prior. The ice was constantly changing and the quality was so poor, that, as a result, a few machines went through the ice. Fortunately, only one machine suffered major damage. On the few days we did have snow crews were out in full force on the plow routes, sidewalks, and parking lots. I feel we did a great job on staying on top of problem areas with sand and salt. Unfortunately, with temperatures in the upper 30's to low 40's to round out January, I don't anticipate any chance for improvement with the rinks to finish out the season. This was definitely one for the record books!

On a good note, we had two successful events this season. One was held at the Westmorland, their neighborhood party and the other was held at the Vilas, with the *UW Women's Hockey Team* and the *Madison Speed Skating Club*.

CONSERVATION - RUSS HEFTY

The unusual winter weather continued to be mild and relatively snow free. We did get some dry snowfall during the middle of the month that allowed a thin base to be packed for cross-country skiing, but there was insufficient snow depth to set tracks for classic style skiing. Then at the end of the month, the very unseasonable warm temperatures returned and closing the ski trails soon followed. Hopefully, we will get some snow in February to bring the trails back into service.

The lack of significant snowfall did allow us to proceed with the oak savanna restoration project at Edna Taylor Conservation Park. We leased a Forestry mower unit with a skid steer loader to mow exotic brush and small trees. We cleared approximately 10 acres one week. We found a geologic gold mine of exposed glacial erratics adjacent to the drumlin in the park. These made for slow going as we dodged the boulders while mowing brush. We will follow up hand cutting trees on the effigy mounds in the park. This coming spring, we'll conduct a controlled burn to remove some of the slash from the forestry mowing operation. Following the burn, a herbicide will be applied to the exotic shrubs that have resprouted. Lastly, native seeds of grasses and forbs will be added to the site to increase the natural diversity.

FOREST HILL CEMETERY - KEVIN SORENSEN

The month of January was unusually warm and we had little snow. We do have frost, though. In most places, we have about 6" in the ground. With this amount, we need to use frost heaters fueled by LP gas in order to open graves. This typically adds one additional day of preparation time for each grave.

We received a new sanding unit from Fleet Services. This is an important piece of equipment to us. Our many roadways become icy when people drive on the fresh snow. The icy conditions are especially a problem if we get snow on the weekend and we can't clear it right away.

We were able to get some tree and shrub trimming done in January.

Current staffing levels are at 5.5 permanent employees.

The West Forestry Unit continued with district cycle pruning in Forestry District 27 and small tree area pruning in Districts 37 & 19. Forestry has been prioritizing street segments within District 27 at the request of the Streets Department to raise the canopy of trees that are interfering with snow removal and street sweeping operations.

The East Forestry Unit completed district cycle pruning in Forestry District 10 this month with the next area scheduled to continue district cycle pruning being District 14. Crews also continued small tree area pruning in Districts 12 and 28. Pruning in advance of 2012 Engineering street reconstruction projects was started at the end of this month and will continue throughout February.

There were five general plows where Forestry staff was assigned to assist Streets in plowing. Forestry Specialists continued putting together the 2012 spring tree order, along with the planting routes for the Forestry Crews and Contractors.

Special projects that were completed include:

- Tree removals at Hill Creek Park playground
- Tree pruning and removal at Wingra Park
- Tree removals and clearing brush for improved sightlines at Owl Creek Park.

PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT – KAY RUTLEDGE Warner Park Parking Lot

The Parks Division will be reconstructing the Warner Park parking lot in 3 phases over the next three years. In Phase 1, fall of 2010, we replaced the storm sewer and built 2 retention ponds that will hold all of the parking lot run off prior to it going into the channel and lagoons. Bays 2, 3, and the roadway binder were completed as a part of Phase 2 in the spring and fall 2011. In December 2011, plans and specifications for Phase 3 were completed. Phase 3 includes bay 4 (in front of the park shelter), bay 1 (in front of the Mallards office) and bay 5 (new parking bays by the soccer fields). Bids will be due on January 27, 2012. Construction will start as soon as possible in spring 2012 and the project should be completed by May 25, 2012.

Quann Tennis Courts

The reconstruction of six of the 12 tennis courts at Quann Park is complete. The color will be done in spring 2012, under separate contract; the refurbishing of the net posts will be done by our staff this winter.

Cherokee Park Playground

With the construction schedule finalized, bidding will be in March, with construction starting in May. Neighborhood representatives have secured their fund raising goal of \$20,000 for the basic playground configuration; if additional fundraising is achieved, space for additional play components is available to incorporate some standalone items.

Tenney Park Pavilion

We are resolving final punch list items with *J.H. Findorff & Sons*. Comments on as-builts and O&M manuals need to be addressed among other issues. With some colder temperatures we received the shelter has been open for skating and has received a lot of positive feedback.

Tenney Park Maintenance Bridge

We hired *Bloom Companies* through our RFP (Request for Proposal) process in mid October met with the consultant on October 28th to start the design process. We held a meeting with the consultant on December 21st to review preliminary designs and alignments for the new bridge. We will coordinate with the City's Historic Planner and the neighborhood regarding final design options.

Playgrounds, Paths and Basketball

Site restoration will be completed in the spring on most of the playground projects.

Park Landscaping

We are working on plans and specifications for installing new plantings this summer at BB Clarke Beach (including managed meadow along the shoreline), Tenney Park, Door Creek Park, Garner Park and Warner Park, among other projects. Staff is continuing to develop construction drawings and special provisions for bidding in February.

Olive Jones Park

The consultant is nearing 90% plans and specifications for the reconstruction of the retaining wall along the north, south, and east perimeters. Preliminary pricing estimates have exceeded budget authorization and discussions are on-going to revise and adjust the plan as needed. We anticipate bidding in the spring for construction during the summer months while school is out.

Marshall/Spring Harbor Park Dredging

Marshall Park/Spring Harbor Park Dredging is complete. The contract calls for us to pay 75% of the dredging bid item this fall, then survey the sediment pile in the spring after it has set and drained, to determine actual final quantity.

Park and Open Space Plan

The Long Range Planning Sub Committee approved the draft Park and Open Space Plan and recommended it be referred to the Park Commission. The draft Park and Open Space Plan will be presented to the Park Commission at the February 8th Park Commission Meeting.

Hudson Park

Parks staff is progressing on the design for the Hudson Park beach improvements. On October 25th, Parks and Engineering staff met with the neighborhood to discuss three options for improvements to Hudson Park. The neighborhood chose a final option with some additional suggestions for changes. These items were discussed with the DNR, along with permitting requirements for the project. Design revisions have been made and sent out to the neighborhood for input. The design needs to be completed by early February for permit submission and construction in the fall.

Hoyt Park Improvements

Staff met with the *Friends of Hoyt Park* on January 19th to review priority projects for 2012. These items included fixing the existing damaged stone steps, adding a railing to all stone step staircases, funding the purchase of native plants to aid restoration efforts completed by the Friends group and volunteers, contracting removal of invasive trees identified for removal by the Friends group, repairing the damaged stone wall near the entrance, acquiring soil borings to investigate increasing infiltration at the park, restoring the drains at the overlook and asphalt patching. Staff is moving forward with the next steps.

Esther Beach Master Plan

Staff met with members of the neighborhood association on January 25th, to start the public input process on the plan which will incorporate the additional land acquired in 2011. Based on the input received, a draft master plan will be created so that it can be discussed further with the neighborhood.

Other Projects

- We are continuing to work with alders and neighborhood representatives regarding upcoming projects for Blackhawk and Highland Manor Parks.
- We are working with Planning on the Arbor Hills/Leopold Neighborhood Plan and Hoyt Park Neighborhood Plan.
- We are continuing to work with the Engineering staff to evaluate proposed improvements at Stevens Street Park as requested by the Alder.
- We are working on developing a new ski trail map for Elver Park.
- We are working with IT Department to complete workable upgrade of our computer system to accommodate *Windows* 7 and compatible upgrades to *MicroStation* V8.
