**Subject:** Moving Madison Oversight from Defensive Rhetoric to Systemic Design

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Dear Members of the Common Council,

As we look ahead to the structural runway provided by the recent contract extension for the Interim Independent Police Monitor, Madison has a unique opportunity to elevate our civic conversation. Much of the recent public commentary frames the ongoing friction within City Hall as a localized, personal conflict. However, evaluating our current oversight model reveals a much deeper, less personal reality: we are trying to manage a systemic design flaw with defensive rhetoric. True, independent accountability is a vital community necessity, but to be effective and sustainable, it cannot be performative, and it cannot exist outside the standard rules of municipal governance.

Dismissing standard administrative protocols as "technocratic discourse" undermines public trust. When city leaders raise valid, audited concerns regarding data security (such as ensuring that unredacted files containing the names of crime victims are not stored on personal, unencrypted laptops) they are executing their basic fiduciary duty to protect residents. Accountability is a two-way street; an oversight body cannot demand total transparency from law enforcement while bucking standard data-privacy laws and municipal policy memos.

While past traumas are real and must be respected, policy must be built on ongoing, comprehensive data. Audited metrics from the MPD 2025 Annual Report prove that recordable force occurs in only about **0.25%** of all calls for service. That means **99.75%** of daily police dispatches are entirely non-violent, service-oriented, successfully de-escalated interactions (medical, mental health, traffic, compliance, community policing,...) Building a multi-million dollar oversight apparatus exclusively optimized for an adversarial warzone ignores 99.75% of how the police department actually operates.

Conflating MPD's operational budget with the OIM's administrative budget obscures the real structural issue.

Regarding the Internal Affairs department within MPD investigating their own officers, that is completely normal. Companies evaluate employee conduct all the time. They're looking for violations of policy and procedure, company standards, etc. An MPD Internal Affairs investigation is normal and there is no conflict of interest for an internal affairs board to conduct an investigation into their own employee's behavior. This is part of quality assurance. Body cameras would be extremely helpful in evaluating quality of service on a call for service (like the December 19th high-profile incident, which was a response to a call for service by someone in our City).

The Independent Monitor may wish to conduct an investigation involving the PCOB Chair, although it gets complicated by the fact that the PCOB Chair, at the heart of a criminal investigation, also supervises the Independent Monitor. It would've been wise for the City to hire outside counsel to investigate this, as there is some level of conflict of interest. MPD conducts a lot of Internal Affairs investigations of MPD employees every year. But if the

Internal Affairs Lieutenant was involved as a subject in a case, they certainly wouldn't have the IA Sergeant conducting the investigation. It wouldn't happen.

These PSIA investigations are obviously not criminal investigations. They decide whether or not the officers involved acted in accordance with their training, policies, and procedures. Can you imagine if MPD did not have an Internal Affairs bureau (like every other police department around)? It would have been one of the first recommendations in the OIR Report.

Instead of defending a structurally vulnerable, isolated office with defensive rhetoric, Madison should evolve this conversation toward a modern Inspector General (IG) framework. An IG model achieves everything advocates want: it is granted true statutory independence with a dedicated budget to hire independent legal counsel, permanently severing the conflict with the City Attorney. Furthermore, an IG expands accountability to monitor contracts, TID allocations, and operations across all city departments. It looks for fraud, waste, and abuse and could fund the office more adequately through cost savings.

Let's elevate the conversation. Real, non-performative accountability is achieved through brilliant institutional design, not by branding standard municipal process as "gossip."
