V. Assumptions and Conclusions (Mike/Sharyl)

a. Individuals/Families/Group Needs Change

b. Categories can reflect/educate/guide in providing a full perspective of the continuum of family needs and connections related to community well-being

c. Philosophy/Roles: Policies/decisions are driven, based upon assumptions. What drives the city policies and funding decisions? An economic development lens? Safety crime prevention lens? Technical assistance/support in re-design?

d. Process: Support feedback/dialogue from individual agencies to develop a cumulative decision. Agency determines where services fit or can be modified.
