Project Description (Describe what is being proposed and why the project is needed)

Parks staff regularly receive proposals to install bird or bat houses in parks. A recent example is the proposed blue bird trail at Tenney Park. There are no policies to inform and/or guide the decision-making process. Requests are evaluated by staff, with recommendations made to the Board of Park Commissioners regarding the request.

While bird and bat houses are important and frequent examples, there are other requests from the public to install temporary structures or items in Parks for scientific and/or educational purposes. This project will study and propose standards and guidelines for consideration, acceptance, and potential future removal of these items in the Madison park system.

Outcome (Research, Recommendation to Park Commission, Written report, etc.)

The goal is to draft a policy to guide the Board of Park Commissioners' decision-making process and/or create an administrative process for approval. The policy will clarify (1) steps organizations and individuals will follow when requesting scientific or educational installation(s) and (2) considerations that the BPC might review in determining its response to the request.
