We are transitioning to work at system level and the leadership team participated in a retreat to develop and refine the mission and vision for the department. The mission statement is being developed and before it is finalized, we will seek Board and staff feedback.

We would like to acknowledge work staff has done, above and beyond, to support the Affordable Care Act, including colleagues who have been picking up the work of public health staff working as ACA counselors. In approximately six weeks they have met with around 100 people and we will continue into March rather than ending in December. The department purchased T shirts for staff to wear and would like the Board to have one to wear. Heinrich provided a handout describing a presentation that we are participating in, along with UW Extension and Covering Kids and Families, to help non profits develop an outreach strategy for getting the word out on affordable health insurance.
