2013-2014 Community Resources Funding Committee Instructions

The CDD Summer Funding process has begun! The Community Development Division received 129 proposals. 98 of those proposals were requests for Community Resources Funding.

Please review this document and the materials provided to you, and let us know if you have any questions or concerns. Your work and input into this important process is valued and appreciated and we want to make sure you have the information you need to make thoughtful decisions.

Meeting Dates and Deadlines

Please find attached the schedule of tasks and meetings for your Committee's work related to the program proposals.

Committees and their Purview

There are 5 committees involved in this process and they have particular roles:

Early Childhood Care & Education Committee (ECCEC) –Reviews applications in Children & Families program area and forwards their funding recommendations to the CSC.

Committee on Aging (Formerly the Senior Citizens Advisory Committee- SCAC) –Reviews applications in the Senior program area and forwards funding recommendations to the CSC.

Community Services Committee (CSC) – Reviews applications in Youth, Domestic Violence, Sexual Assault, Crisis Intervention and Safety & Support, Access to Resources and Neighborhoods program areas. The CSC makes final funding decisions on recommendations referred by the ECCEC and COA.

Conference Committee (A joint Committee of the CSC and CDBG committees) – Reviews Adult Workforce Preparedness and Employment program area.

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) – Reviews proposals for Affordable Housing, Business Development and Access to Information.

Review materials

In this Application binder you will find the following documents:

- Table of Contents: A listing of all proposals submitted for the identified program area.
- **Submitted applications**: You will see the program description followed by the proposed program budget and the agency overview. When agencies have applied for two programs under the same objective you will see both program descriptions.
- **Program Summaries**: New to the Community Resources Committees this year. These summaries provide a brief overview of funding history, and program and agency description.
- Staff reviews: City staff provides notes and commentary in response to identified criteria.
- Blank Committee Review and Question forms: Please complete one of these for each program you review, and submit it to the CDD office on or before the due date.

Application Review Sequence:

- 1. Applications were due at Noon on June 1, 2012.
- 2. Staff sorts and compiles applications and creates tracking systems and binders by program area.
- 3. Staff reviews applications and completes program summary and staff review criteria forms. Staff may contact agencies with questions.
- 4. Committees receive application binders and binders are posted on CDD Funding process website.
- 5. Committee members individually review and evaluate applications, using standard review form. This form and questions are submitted to staff prior to relevant meeting.
- 6. Staff sends committee questions to agencies for response.
- 7. Agencies submit responses. Responses are attached to agenda or presented at relevant meeting.
- 8. Staff presents initial recommendations for funding to relevant committee by program area.
- 9. Committee determines initial recommendations for funding at review meeting.
- 10. Agency staff and/or concerned citizenry responds to initial recommendations.
- 11. Committee considers public input in determining preliminary recommendations.
- 12. At CDD Public Hearing agencies respond to preliminary recommendations. Committees convene to finalize recommendations.

Agency and Public Input

After the last funding cycle many of our contracting agencies requested that we minimize the number of meetings and specify which meetings we recommend agencies to attend.

Given the volume of proposals to review and the meetings scheduled, we ask that committees have the opportunity to review agency proposals, staff materials, agency written responses to Committee questions, and to make initial recommendations, <u>before</u> hearing public testimony. Agencies will be encouraged to attend the meetings designated for public comment and the public hearing, to provide commentary and response to the initial and preliminary recommendations.

Conflicts of Interest

As we discussed in all committees earlier this year, committee members will be asked to identify any potential conflicts of interest they may have with any of the proposals before them. Please refer to the document in this packet on Conflicts for recommended procedure.

Absences from Meetings

Please let staff and the Chair know as soon as possible if there are scheduled meetings you have to miss. We recognize that the meeting schedule can be pretty intensive. However, absent committee members may create quorum issues. We can plan for absences, and minimize disruption in the timelines if we have advance notice.

Communication

Community Resources Program Program Area Goals and Objectives For 2013-2014

Program Area I: Youth

All proposals for Program Area I: Youth will be reviewed by the Community Services Committee.

Objectives listed below are in priority order within each goal area.

Goal:

Support youth to become successful members of their families, school, communities, and workplace through collaboration with the public school system and other key stakeholders.

High Priority:

- A1. Provide low-income middle school youth access to programs that complement in-school learning and development during non-school hours.
- A2. Provide life skills, vocational/career guidance, pre/post-employment support and job placement for low-income youth.
- A3. Provide low-income high school youth access to programs that complement in-school learning and development during non-school hours.

Intermediate Priority:

- B1. Provide opportunities for juveniles who commit municipal violations to receive alternative sanctions from a peer youth court.
- B2. Provide culturally and/or gender specific programs for vulnerable youth that promote positive youth development
- B3. Provide opportunities for positive community engagement for youth atrisk of involvement in the criminal justice system.

Lower Priority:

C1. Provide access for low-income parents/guardians education, skills and resources to raise successful youth.

Program Area II: Domestic Violence, Sexual Assault, Crisis Intervention and Safety & Support

All proposals for Program Area II: Domestic Violence, Sexual Assault, Crisis Intervention and Safety & Support will be reviewed by the Community Services Committee.

Objectives listed below are in priority order within each goal area.

Goal:

Provide crisis intervention and supportive services for victims of sexual assault, victims of domestic violence, vulnerable children, runaway/homeless youth, and families in crisis.

High Priority:

- A1. Provide immediate direct services for victims of sexual assault or domestic violence.
- A2. Provide immediate direct services for vulnerable children, runaway and homeless youth.

Intermediate Priority:

- B1. Provide immediate support services for the prevention of abuse and neglect.
- B2. Provide assessment, referral and short-term services for children/youth that have experienced trauma.

Lower Priority:

C1. Provide education for the prevention of domestic violence and sexual assault.

Program Area III: Access to Resources

All proposals for Program Area III: Access to Resources will be reviewed by the Community Services Committee.

Objectives listed below are in priority order within each goal area.

Goal:

Provide services to overcome barriers to the basic resources that increase self-sufficiency and improve the quality of life for the community's most vulnerable individuals. Basic resources may include: food security, housing, healthcare, employment and child care. Barriers may include: language and cultural accessibility, education, knowledge or awareness of services, transportation and history with the criminal justice system.

High Priority:

A1. Provide culturally specific or targeted supportive services to members of low to moderate income and/or marginalized groups that increase access to basic services and resources and increase participation in community life.

Intermediate Priority:

B1. Provide systemic solutions which address barriers and improve access to services that meet basic needs for low to moderate income and/or marginalized groups.

These services may be targeted to serve a specific population, or a geographic area.

Program Area IV: Adult Workforce Preparedness and Employment

All proposals for Program Area IV: Adult Workforce Preparedness and Employment will be reviewed by the Conference Committee.

Objectives listed below are in priority order within each goal area.

Goal:

Improve the opportunities for economic stability for residents encountering multiple barriers to employment including: criminal background and/or associations, language barriers, long-term poverty, lack of skills and/or formal education.

High Priority:

A1. Provide employment related services to unemployed or underemployed individuals who face multiple barriers to employment with a goal of obtaining and maintaining full employment. These services may include literacy and language skills, life skills, vocational/career guidance, pre and post employment services or employment support. Services may be community wide or neighborhood based.

Intermediate Priority:

B1. Provide services to Madison residents that provide education and literacy proficiency to acquire maintain or improve their opportunity for full employment.

Program Area V: Neighborhoods

All proposals for Program Area V: Neighborhoods will be reviewed by the Conference Committee.

Objectives listed below are in priority order within each goal area.

Goal:

Create and sustain healthy neighborhoods by supporting neighborhood facilities and programs which promote community cohesion, stability, quality services and efforts which build resident capacity, create sustainable partnerships and enable all residents to participate fully in their neighborhood and the broader community.

Higher Priority: Please Note: Applications will not be accepted for this Objective in this 2013-2014 CDD Funding process.

A1. Sustain and enhance the operation of neighborhood centers. Centers should be neighborhood focal points that are used by low and moderate income residents, and community groups, and should offer programming relevant to the neighborhoods they serve.

Intermediate Priority: Please note:

B1. Support programs and processes that promote and enhance opportunities for residents to be informed and engaged in decisions affecting their neighborhood and the broader community. These programs will decrease isolation, promote supportive community connections, increase leadership capacity of residents to effectively engage in neighborhood based issue identification, problem solving and advocacy; and support programs that provide community mediation and/or create neighborhood mediators. These programs will be accessible to all residents including those of low and moderate income.

Please Note: this objective is not intended to support individual neighborhood associations, their activities or events.

Program Area VI: Children & Families

All proposals for Program Area VI: Children and Families will be reviewed by the Early Childhood Care and Education Committee.

Objectives listed below are in priority order within each goal area.

Goal:

Ensure that children and their families have access to developmentally appropriate, quality, affordable child care. Assist and educate parents/guardians, child care providers and the community to prepare Madison's children for optimal growth and development.

High Priority:

- A1. Provide for the availability of affordable, stable, quality child care and/or elementary school-age care for low-income *or homeless* children with emphasis on full-time programming.
- A2. Provide access to education and resources for low-income parents/guardians to raise successful healthy children.

Intermediate Priority:

B1. Provide specialized training and consultation services for City of Madison accredited programs that strengthen the ability of child care staff to serve at-risk children.

Lower Priority:

C1. Provide professional development opportunities that improve the quality of child care in the City of Madison.

Program Area VII: Seniors

All proposals for Program Area VII: Seniors will be reviewed by the Senior Citizen's Advisory Committee.

Objectives listed below are in priority order within each goal area.

Goal:

Help seniors live as independently as possible, maintain/improve seniors' health and well-being, and reduce seniors' isolation.

High Priority:

- A1. Provide case management activities that help seniors live independently by connecting them to needed services.
- A2. Provide volunteer-based home chore services that help seniors remain in their homes.

Intermediate Priority:

- B1. Support focal point agencies that provide information, referral and other services that maintain seniors' health and independence.
- B2. Provide services that improve seniors' health and connection to the community through recreational, educational, social, health and safety, multi-cultural and intergenerational activities, and volunteer opportunities. (Agency referrals and special projects)
