



rofile, Statistics and Indi	icators
Neighborhood Description:	Burr Oaks Neighborhood is the the gateway into Madison. It is located to the west of South Park Street Corridor between West Beltline Highway and Wingra Creek. The neighborhood is divided between two jurisdications: City of Madison and Town of Madison. However, there is an agreement which town lands will be annexed into the City by 2022. Single-family ranch homes and multifamily complexes are dotted throughout the neighborhood. Lincoln Elementary School lies in the heart of the neighborhood. The first splash park, Cypress Spray Park, provides summer water fun for neighborhood children. The splash park has been a wonderful place to meet neighbors of all ages, race, and backgrounds. Villager Mall, an aging strip mall, is being transformed into a vibrant office-retail center. A new South Branch Library and Urban League of Greate Madison Center for Economic Development and Workforce Training will be the first major buildings to start-othe revitalization efforts.
Neighborhood Boundaries:	Chicago & Northwestern Railroad tracks on the north, South Park Street on the east, West Beltline on the south, and Fish Hatchery Road on the west
	The Neighborhood Indicators Project is a demonstration of key characteristics and various indicators that relate to the quality of life in Madison at the neighborhood level. Basic neighborhood information as well as housing, public safety, health and family well-being, economic, and transportation indicators by neighborhood is available.
	-The Madison Common Council approved \$3 million to acquire buildings on Cypress Way and West Badger Road for demolition to prepare the area for development of a senior housing complex. A two-building senior housing complex will provide 96 affordable apartments for area seniors as well as amenities like a senior center, a green roof with a walking path and outdoor plaza (2009).  -Burr Oaks Neighborhood raised donations and dedicated benches to Stu Seffern and Debbie Luiselle, active neighborhood association members, who were killed in a plane crash (2009).  -Burr Oak Neighborhood Association celebrated its 10th Anniversary of its neighborhood walks and potluck get-togethers (2009).
Recent Accomplishments:	-A new South Madison Branch Library is slated to be constructed in Villager Mall. The Burr Oaks Neighborhood is planning several fundraising events, such as a Valentine Day Spaghetti Dinner, to help in the effort.  -In 2004, the City of Madison Community Development Authority purchased the Villager Mall to spur arts and economic development in South Madison. A Villager Mall Master Plan was prepared with neighborhood residents. In 2008, the City's Capital Budget provided in excess of \$9.0 million to assist in improvements to The Atrium, the purchase of the Citgo and Mobil Gas Stations, a new South Madison Branch of the Madison Public Library (target move-in is Spring 2010), and the new Center for Economic Development and Workforce Training. 	-Madison Parks Division, in cooperation with Madison Metropolitan School District, purchased land adjacent Lincoln School and constructed Madison's first spray park. Cypress Spray Park, on the corner of Cypress Way and Magnolia Lane, give children and youth another opportunity to get wet during the summer months (200 www.cityofmadison.com/parks/major/cypressspraypark.html
	-Madison Transit added a later Saturday night trip on Route 5 from the South Transfer Point to downtown, is providing ongoing security upgrades to the South Transfer Point bus facility, camera upgrades and image fee through the City data network directly into the South Police district, and is undertaking a capital improvement project to replace glass panels in all Metro bus shelters (removing old glass panels with a graffiti film that has become cloudy/opaque with new clear plexiglass panels)(2009).

	-Received a City of Madison Neighborhood Planning Grant to design and install two neighborhood signs (2006).
