By design, our practice operates within an ever-evolving gradient of public art, architecture, landscape architecture, installation, urban planning, ecology and advocacy. We leverage our unique perspectives and strengths to allow us opportunities to tackle such critical issues as human rights, climate change, resiliency, social justice, data, remembrance, and migration, among others.

At its core, our work is intended to promote positive change and bring disparate peoples together. Intentionally subtle, our work takes its time to settle in, causing viewers/participants to have to think critically to meaningfully engage with it so as not to illicit immediate reactions – allowing for a true sense of discovery and often framing unexpected and differing perspectives.

We intentionally use natural systems, materials, wayfinding, and planning as ethereal yet critical tools to set conditions for people to engage with our work in entirely new ways during each visit – and by doing so, progressively opening their eyes to new possibilities. We believe this nuanced approach helps to break down cultural and ideological barriers allowing for meaningful understanding to occur.

Ultimately, we seek to do great work that makes a difference and believe that each of our projects adds significant value to the spaces and places that we work within.

Our work has been recognized globally with various awards and honors from Google, Fast Company, CODAworx, the World Architecture Festival, the Institute for Public Art, The Architect's Newspaper, Architizer, Architecture Hunter, the American Planning Association, and the American Institute of Architects, among others.

Whether these are individuals, small offices or large-scale firms depends on the project challenges and the client's aspirations. Often we try to leverage our experience in a mentorship capacity to help younger designers/artists/firms who don't yet have large scale project experience to build a more robust portfolio that they can then leverage to grow their own respective practices moving forward.

Equally nuanced is the makeup of our highly multidisciplinary practice as it's intentionally like having 10 toes within 10 different disciplines, all however deeply rooted in meaningful storytelling and with a deep focus on doing social good within the built environment.



Engagement

In the projects I develop, I focus on a connection with ourselves that expands into a conversation with each other, or, if people choose, a solo process. When we work on our individual projects, I explain there is no right or wrong to what we're doing, this a way for us to be ourselves and get to know who we truly are. When murals are the goal, I design them so regardless of the skill level, there is always something for people to contribute, and often times hidden talents are discovered and embraced. Because of this, participation comes organically, and confidence surfaces. After our workshops that connect us with who we are, I use these ideas to form a mural design, or we have a brain storming session based on a collective theme. When the budget allows, I create several designs to choose from and we take a vote. This is expanded into a mural either I make on my own, or the community members assist with, where they can choose what parts they'd like to paint. It's helpful to remind people "Do your best, but if you mess up, just paint over it." Pointing out sections of what involves more or less detail is encouraging for those intimidated by participating. During these projects, it's important to get to know each other to create a relaxed environment with determination towards a goal that builds community.

Social Practice Art
Experience

From individual pieces to community focused projects, my work is intended to help people connect with themselves and create a sense of freedom. In the past, I've created a summer series of workshops with teens in the shelter home, where we observed nature in Olbrich Botanical Gardens and brought the organic designs into our own project. The intention was to help understand that quiet can be accessed anywhere at anytime, by knowing it comes from within, or by finding a space to "be." A final collective mural expressed our experiences together. A similar workshop style ending with a mural was also used in spaces like Jefferson Middle School, Toki Middle School and Innovative High. I was invited by the Executive Director of Alternative Programs at Metro High Schools to create a project for a new alternative GED program at Innovative High. Working with the students for an entire school year, I led workshops to reveal what it is they wanted out of life by exploring the deeper parts of their personalities. At the end of the year, we worked together on a design for a mural and painted it before their graduation. In Dane County Jail, I worked with men in Parenting Inside Out, a class that develops skills to connect with their children. We worked together on a mural design that would become a tool used in their lessons. While painting they voiced interest in meditation, so I developed a year long meditation series to help them find peace. During a residency at Garver Canvas Gallery, the public was invited to a workshop where I guided a meditation and we wrote love letters to ourselves. In addition to these, I've led other workshops and more mural projects with mindfulness integrated, in

Artistic Practice & Process

When working with community partners, communication is key. Being clear on the collective goal and how to achieve it is the best approach to ensure a smooth and productive process. Through meetings we discuss our objective, budget, the benefits, and ideas on how to reach it. These sessions birth a timeline and plan of action. Depending upon who the target audience is, a detailed program is developed that's best suited for everyone involved. During the process of working with partners, we determine what our roles are and a specific list of what we'll be contributing during the artistic endeavor, which often makes for a flawless project. When unexpected situations arise, realigning to focus on the end goal creates a relaxed and easy solution.

Audifax is an international muralist and public artist based in Madison, WI. 



Engagement has to be specific, but in general I want to know the overall goal and needs of the project. In addition, I have been inspired by the European Union's theme of "aesthetics of access." I need to know how accessible the location and expectations are for the work. Once that is clear I can honestly invite people in with a "call for participants." My process is collaborative which may include but is not limited to use of prompts, scored spacial patterns or movement games. I almost always work with a composer or sound designer for the sound element. I have also done a few works that include audience participation.

≦ Social Practice Art Experience

Over the past 20 years I have curated, choreographed and performed experiences that are centered around social practice. In 2010 I was a member of Dear Heart Dance and we created a community dance piece that centered on Community Supported Agriculture (CSA). Since then I have created works that have environmental themes. In 2021 I created the piece "Study D_polarize" which explores issues of climate change and also dualistic aspects between people. This was part of National Water Dance. I have directed movement scores for larger groups with ranges of abilities. I am most drawn to environmental themes.

Artistic Practice & Process

Local partners are helpful in many ways. As financial sponsors they can help fund the project. This is why I like to be as honest about the content from the beginning. I have also been fortunate to have community partners provide more educational aspects for the performers and myself. In the CSA project, we used the entire process as a mode of education.

Liz Sexe is the choreographer/artistic director of Liz Sexe Dance Company established in 2014. She is described as a "clean and efficient mover," and having "toughness under her grace." In her processes, tasks inspire poetic movement, game theory finds logical, yet often unexpected phrasing, and athletic dancing is paired with deep intentionality. Her choreographic work has been featured at the World Dance Alliance Festival in Honolulu, Hawaii, University of Wisconsin-Madison, Danceworks in Milwaukee, WI, and Frank Lloyd Wright's Taliesin in Spring Green, WI. 

Engagement

I engage the community by creating inclusive, participatory art experiences that prioritize accessibility, collaboration, and shared storytelling. My work invites individuals to actively contribute to the creative process, not just observe the outcome. Whether in a classroom, gallery, or public space, I aim to foster environments where people feel ownership and agency.

At O'Keeffe Middle School, I led collaborative murals and installations that centered student identity and voice. These projects evolved through open dialogue, hands-on experimentation, and reflection, allowing students to see themselves as artists and decision-makers. The final works became visual landmarks within the school. This was made possible through community participation and collective trust.

In my studio practice, I design multisensory installations that often depend on public interaction to take shape. From contributing personal audio recordings to navigating space through non-visual cues, participants help co-create the meaning and form of the work. These experiences ask individuals to engage differently—with their bodies, senses, and memories and in doing so, build deeper connections to the art and to each other.

I intentionally focus on access, ensuring that a wide range of participants regardless of background or ability can fully engage. By centering the process over product, I strive to create spaces where community members feel seen, heard, and empowered through the act of making.

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My past experience creating social practice artworks centers around immersive, multisensory environments that invite participants to engage with space beyond the visual. Rooted in my lived experience of growing up with a visual impairment, my work seeks to challenge normative ways of perceiving and navigating the world. I design interactive installations that prioritize non-visual engagement sound only environments, edible landscapes, tactile experiences and invite participants to relearn space through touch, smell, sound, and taste. These works prompt reflection on perception, control, and identity, asking viewers to reconsider their assumptions and gain new perspectives.

For example, I have created installations where audiences must navigate spaces using tools designed for the blind, intentionally removing sight to heighten awareness of other sensory information. These environments are not only meant to challenge but also to empower; viewers often move from discomfort to confidence as they develop trust in their own ability to adapt.

This approach extends into my teaching practice, where I encourage students to think critically about identity and storytelling. At O'Keeffe Middle School, I led projects that included site-specific installations and collaborative murals exploring personal narratives and cultural connection. These artworks became platforms for dialogue and reflection, both within the school and the broader community.

Ultimately, my work is about access both physical and conceptual and creating inclusive spaces where all participants can explore and contribute meaningfully.

♣ Artistic Practice & Process

Collaboration with community partners whether businesses, individuals, or organizations is a key part of how I approach art making as a whole. I view these partnerships not just as logistical support, but as creative relationships that shape the final work. My goal is to build connections that are reciprocal, where all involved feel invested in the process and the outcome.

In both my teaching and studio practice, I have worked with community members to co-create meaningful, site-responsive projects. At O'Keeffe Middle School, I collaborated with local artists and school staff to develop installations that reflected the voices of students while also engaging broader community input. For instance, a hallway mural was designed with student ideas and feedback from custodians and teachers to ensure it reflected shared values and served the space functionally and aesthetically.

In my professional practice, I have partnered with small businesses, disability advocates, and cultural organizations to create multisensory installations and accessible experiences. For example, while developing a tactile and scent based piece, I worked with a local individuals to source materials and educate audiences on how scent memory can shape perception. These collaborations add depth to the work and help bridge gaps between art and everyday life.

I begin all collaborations by listening understanding the partner's goals, limitations, and ideas so that the project becomes a shared vision rather than a top down directive. This collaborative spirit allows each participant to bring their expertise to the table, ensuring the work functions in the real experiences and identities of the people it represents.


By working together, we expand the role of art in the community not just as decoration, but as dialogue, connection, and shared authorship!

Biography

Elizabeth Sheeler is a Madison, Wisconsin interdisciplinary artist who has been involved in multiple areas of creativity. Elizabeth was born and raised in Fayetteville, Arkansas where she found her passion for art. She received a Master of Fine Arts in Studio Art with a concentration in 4D at The University of Wisconsin - Madison in 2022. In 2019 Elizabeth received a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Studio Art with an emphasis in Sculpture and a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Art Education with an emphasis in Printmaking.

Her work explores themes of identity, control, ownership, blindness, power, equality, and empathy. She creates environments where the participant is forced to look inward examining themselves and their environment to find their own way to an intro-perspective empathy. Her newer work will emphasis power dynamic, equality, and perception through senses other than sight. Elizabeth has attended several residency's including at The Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts in Philadelphia. Her work has been published in the Scout Guide Magazine and has been shown nationally and internationally including VAE Gallery: North Carolina, The Rome Center: Italy, The Kennedy Center: Virginia, and Arapahoe Community College: Colorado. Elizabeth is a recipient of the Student Support Endowment, and the James B and Susan S. Patterson Graduate Student Fellowship.

Title - Through your skin and the air everyone speaks a secret language,

Media – Benches, Lamps, Speakers

Dates - 2023

Description - in this piece Participants enter a small room that contains benches in the shape of a plus sign. At each edge of the plus sign sits a lamp. The viewer can sit on a bench and listen to a narrative that is coming from the lamps. The narrative prompts everyone to walk in a larger room which is visually empty. The only light in the space is overflow light coming from the smaller room. There is Audio of an intersection creating a surround sound of the space. The participant can try and navigate the auditable intersection and understand their placement in the space.

Title – Broken Cane tips

Media – paint, essential oils, canes, headphones

Dates - 2022

Description - In this piece participants walk into an empty gallery where they place a pair of headphones on and grab a white cane. The audio guides the viewer to different locations of the room with cardinal directions. They confirm they are in the right location by feeling bump dots on the bottom of the blank title cards on the wall. If they are at the wrong location, they are asked to go back to the beginning and start over. If they are at the right location the participant listens to a journal entry. The viewer travels to seven different locations.

Working through concerns, barriers, conflicts and opportunities is a key aspect of any project as we work with complex leadership bodies. organizations and networks that often have significant cultural differences in terms of representation (generation, race, gender, etc.), political agendas and land relationships. Differences that over the long-term can generate a transformative practice based in health for all cultures impacted. When a concern or opportunity arises, we are guided by principles of cultural exchange to take the time necessary to work through a dialogue process with individuals as well as through small and large group formats to identify next steps to resolution. We search for where a concern or opportunity is rooted, explore different interpretations of the situation and the language we are using to relate with each other, brainstorm a range of possibilities for relating to the concern or opportunity, and experiment openly with a short feedback loop to sense where shared action and values can be found. We work from the understanding that each participant may have different learning and communication styles that need to be accommodated. We embed time in our social practice art consulting proposals to allow for this type of dialogue work as it is necessary to create an equitable experience for all participants. This is the sensitive work of facilitation when navigating political and cultural impact questions.


