Why Public Health Is at the Table

Violence is a public health issue tied to trauma, housing instability, and mental health

Violence is predictable and preventable

Prevention reduces long-term demand on police and emergency services

Public Health operates at the intersection of prevention, systems coordination, and healing

PHMDC uniquely serves both City of Madison and Dane County residents

This dual role should allow us to bridge city services with county-funded and regional strategies

Examples of City-Level Collaboration




Coordination around properties contributing to violence or unsafe conditions



Partnership with Building Inspection and City Attorney Zilavy on nuisance abatement



Alignment with harm reduction and housing stabilization efforts



Shared data, leveraging partnerships, aligning programming/services and case coordination where allowable

Work Beyond the City: County & Regional Collaboration

County-funded violence prevention and supportive service contracts

Coordination with Dane County Human Services partners

Partnership with Office of Community Justice Reform

Alignment with statewide and national violence prevention initiatives

Leveraging county resources to prevention work

What the Violence Prevention Unit Does

- Community-based violence intervention and outreach
- Conflict mediation and de-escalation
- Connection to comprehensive supporting including harm reduction, housing, and mental health services
- Contract management and support for community-based organizations
- Data, evaluation, and continuous improvement





What We've Accomplished with Limited Resources

Built strong cross-department and community partnerships

Expanded outreach and coordination in priority areas

Improved alignment between prevention, housing, and harm reduction

Laid infrastructure for data-driven violence prevention

Council Investment Matters

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The city currently supports about 70% of the total Violence Prevention Unit Budget



Recent budget investment converted existing positions to full-time



This increased staff capacity and program stability



More bandwidth to coordinate with MPD, MFD, and other agencies



Stronger support for community partners and residents

Ongoing Challenges



Prevention outcomes take time to materialize



Demand continues to exceed available resources



Workforce burnout in high-intensity roles



Need for sustained, multi-year investment

Closing: Public Safety Is a Shared Commitment

No single agency can own the burden of public safety
