# Purpose of POSP:


- Inform public policy and system-wide park facility decisions.
- Supports City Boards, Commissions, City agencies and staff, other government agencies, and interested residents and volunteers.
- Guides decision-making related to the following areas:
  - Park policies
  - Land acquisition
  - Development of parkland and facilities
  - City financing and operations.
- Updated every 5 years
- Required for participation in State & Federal Grants

Madison is 2<sup>nd</sup> largest city in WI

Population expected to exceed 300,000 by 2040 (WI DOA)

71% of population identifies as white, 21% as BIPOC, 8% Latinx (U.S. Census Bureau)

Residents ages 20-34 account for 1/3 of the population (U.S. Census Bureau)

Residents ages 65-84 is expected to nearly double by 2040 (WI DOA, 2017)

## Public Engagement Efforts

- A city-wide survey conducted through the University of Wisconsin Survey Center 898 households completed
- Four Public Input Meetings (PIMs) open to the general public
- Four Youth-focused "Pop-Up" events held at City-run Parks Alive Events -- 144 kids participated
- Three BIPOC and Youth Focus Groups, held both virtually and in-person
- 13 'Wish Boxes' distributed to libraries and community centers across Madison to gather comment cards
- A supplementary Youth and BIPOC-focused online survey, promoted via the wish boxes and po-up events (62 completed)

## Top Park Uses:

- 1. Engaging in general physical fitness such as walking, hiking, or running
- 2. Participating in or supervising others doing leisure activities, such as picnicking, celebrations, or nature viewing
- 3. Attending festivals or events
- 4. Activities involving Madison's Lakes, such as boating, fishing, paddle sports or swimming
- 5. Biking

#### Community Voice

- Residents place great value in parks—integral to City's character
- Residents passionate about protecting parks
- Most popular activity for Kids: Swings & Slides!
- Need to balance development with conserving environment
- Additional basic facilities (benches, picnic tables, shelters, drinking fountains & clean restrooms)
- Need for SAFE & WELCOMING spaces for all
- Lack of activities for teens
  - Per survey, only 17% respondents felt needs of youth age 13-18 are met



## Recurring Themes in Public Comment


- Desire for greater variety of programming responsive to community needs.
- Increased Strategic partnerships
- Improved access to parks and amenities
- Increased specialty facilities-skate parks, pickleball, dog parks
- Better connection between parks, walking & biking trails



# Use of Parks (in 2024)

- Shelter Reservations:
  - More than 2,000 reservations
  - Most Reserved: Garner, Highland Manor & Brittingham
- Athletic Uses
  - Top 3 sports: soccer, pickleball & tennis
  - Top 3: Garner, Quann & Reindahl Parks



## Strategies from 2018-2023 POSP

- Improve Public Access to Lakes
- Develop park facilities to accommodate diverse activities and populations
- Protect and enhance natural and cultural resources
- Acquire parkland to alleviate parkland deficiencies and address increasing residential density.
- Ensure that existing levels of service are maintained and supported through the park system and are increased as new parks and facilities are developed.
- Ensure that new park development occurs in a fiscally sustainable manner.
- Create equitable access and funding for parks
- Improve the park system's capacity to withstand future environmental changes
- Increase connectivity between parks to enhance access
- Develop a healthy and diverse urban tree canopy on street terraces and within parks
- · Increase engagement with groups and organizations and develop new ones
- Pursue regional solutions to regional issues

  - Madison Park Golf Program
