I am writing on behalf of the Humane Society Veterinary Medical Association (HSVMA) to convey our strong support for ending the practice of declawing cats in Madison unless medically necessary to treat a physical illness, injury or disease. HSVMA is a national association of approximately 9,000 veterinary professionals—including 225 Wisconsin members—focused on the health and welfare of all animals, including companion cats.

Declawing is a painful, invasive surgery—a series of 10-18 separate amputations of the last bones of a cat's toes. Contrary to widely-held belief, declawing is not simply removal of nails. It is typically performed for convenience and to avoid possible damage to household items. However, declawing exposes the patient to risks of anesthesia, infection and blood loss, as well as chronic pain, nerve damage and lameness

Research has repeatedly indicated a high post-operative complication rate of 50%. A 2001 study published in the *Journal of the American Veterinary Medical Association* found that 33% of cats suffer at least one behavioral problem after declaw or tendonectomy surgery. The study showed that 17.9% of declawed cats had an increase in biting frequency or intensity and that 15.4% would not use a litter box. Tragically, these are the primary behavioral reasons why cats are relinquished to shelters, where many face euthanasia. A prominent 2017 study in the *Journal of Feline Medicine and Surgery* found that 63% of declawed cats had painful bone fragments remaining after surgery. This led to further exacerbation of permanent side effects, including back pain and litter box avoidance.

Scratching is a normal feline behavior. It removes dead husks from cats' claws, marks territory, and stretches muscles. Where scratching may be a problem, HSVMA advocates the use of humane alternatives. These are better not only for the cats'



health, but also for cat owners who are often not informed about the common, expensive, frustrating and potentially dangerous consequences of this misguided surgical procedure. Sensible alternatives include well-selected scratching posts, alternative furniture selection or placement, nail trims, training, and nail caps.

HSVMA joins the American Animal Hospital Association (AAHA) and American Association of Feline Practitioners (AAFP) in strongly opposing convenience declawing. Declawing has already been prohibited in dozens of countries worldwide. In 2019 New York became the first to implement a statewide ban prohibiting convenience declawing. If this declaw ban is enacted, Madison will join twelve other U.S. cities—Austin, TX; Denver, CO; St. Louis, MO; Pittsburgh, PA and Los Angeles, San Francisco, Santa Monica, Berkeley, Beverly Hills, Burbank, Culver City and West Hollywood, CA—in prohibiting this inhumane surgical procedure.

We strongly urge you and your colleagues on the Board of Health of Madison and Dane County to demonstrate your humane leadership by prohibiting cat declawing in Madison. Thank you.

The Paw Project strongly supports Legislative File #67344, which will prohibit the inhumane and unnecessary practice of declawing in Madison. The Paw Project is a national nonprofit, veterinarian-run organization that has worked for 20 years to end declawing. Declawing is, most commonly, a series of amputations of all or most of the last bone of each of an animal's toes performed to prevent unwanted scratching. Declawing removes an integral part of an animal's anatomy and subjects animals to the risks of pain, infection, behavioral changes, and lifelong lameness. Safe and effective alternatives to declawing include simple training and other established deterrent methods. We urge you to vote YES on this proposed ordinance.

Declawing is common in the US and Canada, but it is illegal or considered unethical by veterinarians in most countries. The Paw Project partnered with New York Assemblymember Linda Rosenthal to pass the nation's first statewide declaw ban in July 2019. There are active anti-declaw bills in NJ, MA, PA, and CA in 2021. In recent years, public opinion regarding declawing has evolved due to educational campaigns and published evidence exposing the harmful effects of declawing. Eight cities in California, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Burbank, Santa Monica, Berkeley, Beverly Hills, West Hollywood, and Culver City, have prohibited declawing. Denver, CO, Austin, TX, Pittsburgh PA, and St. Louis, MO are other US cities to ban declawing. In the past three years, declawing has been prohibited in eight of ten Canadian provinces, Nova Scotia, British Columbia, Newfoundland and Labrador, Manitoba, New Brunswick, Alberta, Saskatchewan, and Prince Edward Island.

The American Association of Feline Practitioners (AAFP) forbids its certified Cat Friendly practices from performing declaw surgery. The AAFP states, "There is no current peer-reviewed data definitively proving that cats with destructive behavior are more likely to be euthanized, abandoned or relinquished. The decision (by veterinarians) of whether or not to declaw should not be impacted by these considerations." VCA and Banfield Hospitals, which operate many clinics in Wisconsin, will not perform declawing, which they consider below standard of care."

Much evidence exists that behavioral changes following declawing can result in the relinquishment of animals to shelters. The CDC and NIH advise pet owners to "not declaw" their animals since declawing is not an effective means of preventing opportunistic disease in immunocompromised individuals.

In 2018, a peer-reviewed scientific article in the Journal of Feline Medicine and Surgery reported that "declawing increases the risk of long-term or persistent pain, manifesting as unwanted behaviors such as inappropriate elimination (soiling/urinating outside of the litter box) and aggression/biting. This is not only detrimental to the cat (pain is a major welfare issue and these behaviors are common reasons for relinquishment of cats to shelters), but also has health implications for their human companions, as cat bites can be serious."

We proudly support this ordinance, which will greatly protect animals and will end declawing in Madison.

If we are truly concerned about public health, then we need to be against declawing. A cat will give behavioral cues about their boundaries; some of which are subtle. However, if those indicators are not intelligible by the viewer, the claws are then used to communicate that a boundary is being crossed and needs to be respected. If you take that option away from them, they will learn that their next best option may be to bite. I think anyone in the public health community would agree that a cat bite is far worse than a scratch. For another reason, there is neuropathic pain endured post amputation that can cause litterbox misusage due to the pain of trying to dig or having those granules push on now tender areas. **Chronic pain is noted in 80% of people who have undergone amputations** (https://www.amputee-coalition.org/chronic-pain/). Also, if a cat can't scent mark through normal scratching behavior on scratching posts (they have scent glands in their feet) they may choose to scent mark in other ways, possibly by urination or defecation outside litterboxes. This can lead to owners getting angry and upset at this occurring, this then increases stress and induced fear in the household, which again may illicit aggression. Whose life is this benefiting?

There is just no excuse or reason for this to still be in practice. This day and age there are ample resources available to deter any unwanted behavior such as videos online, video behaviorist consultations, books, cheap cat furniture/scratching alternatives, and behavior modifiers you can readily search and buy off of amazon. How is surgically modifying/mutilating an animal still a standard practice? Would we be ok with an owner electing to remove all of their dog's teeth because they nipped at their child who pulled its tail? Or how about amputating a hind leg of a dog to keep it from jumping onto the bed? Where do we draw the line, as the above examples as well as declawing, are all major surgical modifications to an animal's natural state for the mere 'perceived'

convenience of modifying a behavior.

We need to stop looking at cats like material objects within our households that we can choose to alter to our whim out of mere convenience, and finally start to look at them like the family members they are, that also experience pain, fear, contentment, and also enjoy play just as we do.

Anti-declawing is a worldwide movement, it is banned in entire nations and countries including Europe, Germany, Brazil, Australia, and many others. It is catching and gaining ground in the United States as well with it now banned in the entire state of New York amongst many other cities throughout the country. Madison and Dane County is a great progressive place to live and is why I have resided here in Dane county for the last 28 years. I strongly urge you to vote yes on this ban, to prove not only to our country, but to the world, that we are leaders and indeed one of the best places to live as we respect and put our animal's welfare over materialistic convenience.

Dear Members of the Board,

I am writing in support of proposed ordinance 67344. I am the chief medical officer for external affairs at Mars Veterinary Health, which operates VCA, Banfield, and BluePearl animal hospitals across the country. I have practiced nearly 45 years and have seen many progressive changes in veterinary medicine over the years. I am a firm believer that the time has come to stop all elective declaw procedures in the United States. I am happy to have lead the decision by VCA, in early 2020, to stop offering declawing procedures in any of our 900 hospitals across 45 states, including in Wisconsin. It was a decision based on current evidence and we reached it after having discussions with our veterinarians all around the country.

Our decision has been embraced and we have not looked back. Our clients are happy knowing that the well-being of their animals is our top priority, our staff are happy knowing that they will not be participating in the potential harming of animals and that they are working in hospitals that follow evidence-based medicine, and our veterinarians are happier knowing that they will no longer feel pressured by a small minority of clients into performing procedures that they are uncomfortable with. Our hospital staff have become well versed on educating pet guardians about how to live with cats that have their claws and about the potential ramifications of declawing which can include chronic pain (paws and back pain), aggressive behavior including biting, and inappropriate soiling. A scientific paper documenting these sequelae was published in 2018 (Pain and adverse behavior in declawed cats; Journal of Feline Medicine and Surgery, Vol. 20(4), 280-288).

Declawing is an unnecessary practice. A growing number of cities around the country has either banned declawing or is strongly considering it. Contrary to what some people have thought would happen, there is no evidence that stopping declawing will lead to more relinquishment of cats at animal shelters. To the contrary, the

relinquishment numbers are actually higher due to biting and inappropriate soiling/avoidance of litter box use. Declaw bans first went in to effect in our city of Los Angeles in 2009 (Hollywood, Santa Monica, West Los Angeles) and since then the ban has widened to include all of Greater Los Angeles.

We have found that some clients seek us out because of our no declaw position; they know they can trust us with their animals because we aren't doing unnecessary and harmful surgeries on our patients. We call on all veterinarians to stop declawing cats. We hope that all veterinarians will choose their patients' well-being over profits. We must always focus on the wellbeing of our patients and prevent animal suffering to the best of our ability.

The Humane Society of the United States, the nation's largest animal protection organization, strongly supports passage of a ban on elective cat declawing, which would end the inhumane and unnecessary practice of declawing cats in Madison, Wisconsin. Convenience declawing of cats is already illegal in New York State and in eight California cities, including Los Angeles and San Francisco, the city and county of Denver, Colorado, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and Austin, Texas. Australia, Brazil, much of Europe and many Canadian provinces also prohibit non-therapeutic declawing.

Declawing is a medical procedure with serious implications that involves the amputation of the last bone of each toe. If performed on a human being, it would be equivalent to cutting off each finger (and toe) at the last knuckle. It is an unnecessary surgery, most often performed to address convenience issues such as problem scratching of household furniture and it provides no medical benefit whatsoever to the cat.

Declawing of cats is not fully condoned by any veterinary medical association. A multitude of veterinarians across Wisconsin and the country refuse to perform this procedure on ethical grounds, citing that it is an invasive convenience surgery. In the last few years both <a href="the American Animal Hospital Association">the American Animal Hospital Association</a> (AAHA) and <a href="American Association">American Association</a> of Feline Practitioners (AAFP) strengthened their position statements against declawing, with the AAHA now asserting that it "strongly opposes the declawing of domestic cats." The Humane Society Veterinary Medical Association (HSVMA) opposes any surgical procedure—including declawing—done solely for the convenience of the caregiver and yielding no medical benefit to the companion animal.

This surgery can be extremely painful and may lead to life-long health risks and complications, including behavioral abnormalities such as litter-box aversion and increased biting. These conditions often lead to owner surrender of declawed cats and place financial burdens on already-strained shelters and often, the taxpayer.



On behalf of our members and supporters in Madison and the state of Wisconsin, we strongly urge you to support passage of Ordinance 67344 which will protect the health and well-being of family pets and allow Madison to shine as a leader in humane values.

Members of the Board.

I am writing in support of proposed ordinance 67344. I introduced the City of St. Louis' ordinance to prohibit cat declawing, which was approved overwhelmingly by my colleagues in 2019. Additionally, I was able to partner with St. Louis County to help pass their local law on this issue last year with bipartisan and broad support.

As I'm sure you're aware, many times opponents speculate that declawing bans result in an increase of cats surrendered to shelters, where a likely outcome is euthanasia. Fortunately, my colleagues were persuaded by current data and research, which indicates that relinquishment of cats to shelters has consistently decreased in cities, states, and provinces having declaw bans. Other places that have implemented declaw bans include Los Angeles, San Francisco, Beverly Hills, Burbank, Santa Monica, Culver City, West Hollywood, Denver, Austin, Pittsburgh, and the State of New York. None have reported increases in relinquishment.

Research has also documented well that declawing is an abhorrent practice. It is a mutilation of the cat — amputation of a portion of its digits to remove the claws. The result, regardless of the technique used, is a significant risk for life-long physical harm and behavioral changes, including biting and litter box avoidance. Published evidence indicates that declawed cats are more likely to bite than non-declawed cats, so a prohibition of declawing helps protect people, particularly the most medically vulnerable, from unnecessary risks. Reports from the Mayo Clinic state that one-third of cat-bite victims, who present to its emergency departments, require hospitalization.

In my effort to ban declawing, I was privileged to have the support of national animal protection organizations such as the Paw Project, the Humane Society of the United States, the Humane Society Veterinary Medical Association, and of local animal advocacy organizations.

Community Cat, Inc. is extremely supportive of the proposed ban on elective declawing (onychectomy), and we very strongly encourage your support as well.

Community Cat is a nonprofit cat rescue and advocacy group based in south-central Wisconsin, including the Madison area. We focus on cats who are at high risk of euthanasia elsewhere and are considered less adoptable: seniors, disabled, hospice, and special needs. We have saved over 1,700 cats since we were founded in 2009. Every cat adopted from our rescue has a stipulation in their adoption contract which prohibits declawing. We are firm on this requirement, for several reasons:

- Declawing is a surgery with serious complications, not something to be lightly undertaken for human convenience. The surgery involves the amputation of the third digit of a cat's toe. For you and I, it is like removing the tips of our fingers at the last knuckle. Multiple studies have shown that short-term complications following declawing occur in as many as 50% of cases, and include pain, lameness, hemorrhage, decreased appetite, personality change, infection, lethargy, and cystitis. Long-term complications after declawing include claw regrowth, lameness, chronic pain, sore paws, flexor tendon contraction, and increased biting. Up to 10% of cats can suffer claw regrowth- imagine walking around all day with sharp pebbles in your shoes!
- Cats are much more likely to develop behavioral issues after being declawed, such as litter box avoidance and biting. Anecdotally, our volunteers have experienced these behavioral issues on a much higher basis when caring for declawed cats.
- The demand for cats that have been declawed, in our experience, is minimal. We believe there has been a significant shift of preferences away from declawed cats in the last ten years. Today, people are more aware of what a declawing surgery entails and what complications may occur, and are far less willing to submit their cat(s) to the procedure. Rarely do we receive an adoption request for a declawed cat or from a potential adopter who expresses interest in declawing.
- Cats are easily trained to use designated scratching posts or pads. They are creatures of habit, and once their scratching behavior is redirected in a positive manner, they will continue to use the human's preferred location for scratching.
- The act of scratching is an important physical and psychological act for cats. It allows them to stretch, strengthen their muscles, exfoliate the outer layers of the claws, and mark their territory. Yes, cats have interdigital glands and leave their scent when scratching! (Us humans don't have noses canny enough to smell it.) Exercising and marking territory are essential for the cat psyche; it helps them feel safe and provides mental stimulation. This is why even a declawed cat will still attempt to scratch.

We would love to see a ban on elective declawing in Madison, and believe passing this ordinance will bring our city forward in regards to companion animal welfare.

I am a small animal veterinarian in Madison (co- started Lakeview Veterinary Clinic on Monroe Street), an adjunct professor at the UW-Madison School of Veterinary Medicine, and the most recent past president of the Wisconsin Veterinary Medical Association. I have been in practice for over 27 years and am speaking as a member of Madison's small animal clinical community.

I strongly support the effort to make cat declaws illegal in Madison unless there is a medical reason. I recently sent out a survey to area veterinarians to get feedback on this proposal. 47 veterinarians replied. The most common reasons this procedure is performed in Madison practices is split fairly evenly among 4 categories (landlord requirement, avoid scratching of healthy cat owners, avoid scratching of health compromised cat owners, and avoid damage to owner's furniture). A cat declaw is literally a disfiguring procedure removing a bone from each digit. The cat will then bear weight for the remainder of its life on the joint of all those removed digits. There is no strong argument to put a cat through this procedure for any of the reasons listed by area veterinarians. Even the CDC does not advocate declawing cats in the homes of HIV and other immune compromised people.

This is, unfortunately, a subject that my profession has been unwilling to take a unified leadership position against. My practice stopped performing this procedure about 10 years ago as have many other practices in the city. However, we are in a service industry and some feel compelled to continue to offer this to their clients. And if it is on the menu, clients will continue to order it and feel that it must be a reasonable and humane procedure because their veterinarian is willing to do it.

I think this proposal will force our state association to have a thoughtful discussion on declawing. I hope it will have an thoughtful impact on Madison landlords. They should not have the authority to make medical decisions for the family pets of Madison residents.

Declawing is an amputation and de-knuckling, whether performed by scalpel, clippers, or laser. We believe there is never a reason to declaw for non-therapeutic reasons (that is, unless surgery were necessary to treat animals' medical conditions, e.g., cancer). Declawing does not keep cats in homes, a fact acknowledged by the American Animal Hospital Association (AAHA). The state of New York banned declawing in 2019. Eight cities in California - Los Angeles, San Francisco, West Hollywood, Burbank, Santa Monica, Berkeley, Beverly Hills, and Culver City - plus St. Louis, Denver, Austin, Pittsburgh, and St. Louis County (MO) have enacted declaw bans. Veterinarians in the Canadian provinces of Nova Scotia, British Columbia, Prince Edward Island, Saskatchewan, and Newfoundland and Labrador have rejected declawing as unethical and inhumane.

<u>I have friends in Sweden, Germany and England where declawing is illegal and</u> they cannot fathom that mutilation of a cat's toes is done for human convenience.

Dogs that dig in the yard do not have their toes amputated to prevent this behavior that is natural to them, rather, they can be trained with positive reinforcement, as cats can be trained to scratch surfaces designated for them.

Statistics publicly available from the cities having declaw bans, and from British Columbia, indicate that the relinquishment of cats to shelters in those cities, in the years since the bans were enacted, has not increased - in fact, the number of cats dumped in shelters has DECREASED consistently in the eleven to 18 years since the laws went into effect. The hundreds of veterinary hospital operated by VCA and Banfield no longer offering declawing. Clinics certified by the American Association of Feline Practitioners (AAFP) and Fear Free are not allowed to declaw.

There is no reason to believe that declawing cats protects human health. The NIH, CDC, US Public Health Service, the Infectious Diseases Society of America, and the Canadian Medical Association, all have specifically stated that the declawing is "not advised," even for the animals of persons who are severely immunocompromised, including those with HIV. This opinion is echoed in statements on declawing published by the AAHA and AAFP.

I hope this ordinance will be successful and be a model for humane legislation in other cities in Wisconsin and in the US.

"Medical drawbacks to declawing include pain in the paw, infection, tissue necrosis (tissue death), lameness, and back pain. Removing claws changes the way a cat's foot meets the ground and can cause pain similar to wearing an uncomfortable pair of shoes. There can also be a regrowth of improperly removed claws, nerve damage, and bone spurs.

For several days after surgery, shredded newspaper is typically used in the litter box to prevent litter from irritating declawed feet. This unfamiliar litter substitute, accompanied by pain when scratching in the box, may lead cats to stop using the litter box. Some cats may become biters because they no longer have their claws for defense."

Dear Chair Halverson and Members of the Board of Health of Madison and Dane County:

I am writing on behalf of the Humane Society Veterinary Medical Association (HSVMA) to convey our strong support for ending the practice of declawing cats in Madison unless medically necessary to treat a physical illness, injury or disease. HSVMA is a national association of approximately 9,000 veterinary professionals—including 225 Wisconsin members—focused on the health and welfare of all animals, including companion cats.

Declawing is a painful, invasive surgery—a series of 10-18 separate amputations of the last bones of a cat's toes. Contrary to widely-held belief, declawing is not simply removal of nails. It is typically performed for convenience and to avoid possible damage to household items. However, declawing exposes the patient to risks of anesthesia, infection and blood loss, as well as chronic pain, nerve damage and lameness.

Research has repeatedly indicated a high post-operative complication rate of 50%. A 2001 study published in the *Journal of the American Veterinary Medical Association* found that 33% of cats suffer at least one behavioral problem after declaw or tendonectomy surgery. The study showed that 17.9% of declawed cats had an increase in biting frequency or intensity and that 15.4% would not use a litter box. Tragically, these are the primary behavioral reasons why cats are relinquished to shelters, where many face euthanasia. A prominent 2017 study in the *Journal of Feline Medicine and Surgery* found that 63% of declawed cats had painful bone fragments remaining after surgery. This led to further exacerbation of permanent side effects, including back pain and litter box avoidance.

Scratching is a normal feline behavior. It removes dead husks from cats' claws, marks territory, and stretches muscles. Where scratching may be a problem, HSVMA advocates the use of humane alternatives. These are better not only for the cats'



health, but also for cat owners who are often not informed about the common, expensive, frustrating and potentially dangerous consequences of this misguided surgical procedure. Sensible alternatives include well-selected scratching posts, alternative furniture selection or placement, nail trims, training, and nail caps.

HSVMA joins the American Animal Hospital Association (AAHA) and American Association of Feline Practitioners (AAFP) in strongly opposing convenience declawing. Declawing has already been prohibited in dozens of countries worldwide. In 2019 New York became the first to implement a statewide ban prohibiting convenience declawing. If this declaw ban is enacted, Madison will join twelve other U.S. cities—Austin, TX; Denver, CO; St. Louis, MO; Pittsburgh, PA and Los Angeles, San Francisco, Santa Monica, Berkeley, Beverly Hills, Burbank, Culver City and West Hollywood, CA—in prohibiting this inhumane surgical procedure.

We strongly urge you and your colleagues on the Board of Health of Madison and Dane County to demonstrate your humane leadership by prohibiting cat declawing in Madison. Thank you.

The Humane Society of the United States, the nation's largest animal protection organization, strongly supports passage of a ban on elective cat declawing, which would end the inhumane and unnecessary practice of declawing cats in Madison, Wisconsin. Convenience declawing of cats is already illegal in New York State and in eight California cities, including Los Angeles and San Francisco, the city and county of Denver, Colorado, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and Austin, Texas. Australia, Brazil, much of Europe and many Canadian provinces also prohibit non-therapeutic declawing.

Declawing is a medical procedure with serious implications that involves the amputation of the last bone of each toe. If performed on a human being, it would be equivalent to cutting off each finger (and toe) at the last knuckle. It is an unnecessary surgery, most often performed to address convenience issues such as problem scratching of household furniture and it provides no medical benefit whatsoever to the cat.

Declawing of cats is not fully condoned by any veterinary medical association. A multitude of veterinarians across Wisconsin and the country refuse to perform this procedure on ethical grounds, citing that it is an invasive convenience surgery. In the last few years both <a href="the-American Animal Hospital Association (AAHA)">the American Animal Hospital Association (AAHA)</a> and <a href="American Association of Feline Practitioners">AMERICANTERING (AAFP)</a> strengthened their position statements against declawing, with the AAHA now asserting that it "strongly opposes the declawing of domestic cats." The Humane Society Veterinary Medical Association (HSVMA) opposes any surgical procedure—including declawing—done solely for the convenience of the caregiver and yielding no medical benefit to the companion animal.

This surgery can be extremely painful and may lead to life-long health risks and complications, including behavioral abnormalities such as litter-box aversion and increased biting. These conditions often lead to owner surrender of declawed cats and place financial burdens on already-strained shelters and often, the taxpayer.



On behalf of our members and supporters in Madison and the state of Wisconsin, we strongly urge you to support passage of Ordinance 67344 which will protect the health and well-being of family pets and allow Madison to shine as a leader in humane values.

I strongly support Legislative File 67344: The proposed ordinance to prohibit removing or disabling a cat's claws by performing a declawing procedure,

Declawing is amputation, whether performed by scalpel, clippers, or laser. We believe there is never a reason to declaw for non-therapeutic reasons (that is, unless surgery were necessary to treat animals' medical conditions). Declawing does not keep cats in homes, a fact acknowledged by the American Animal Hospital Association (AAHA). The state of New York banned declawing in 2019. Eight cities in California - Los Angeles, San Francisco, West Hollywood, Burbank, Santa Monica, Berkeley, Beverly Hills, and Culver City - plus St. Louis, Denver, Austin, Pittsburgh, and St. Louis County (MO) have enacted declaw bans. Veterinarians in the Canadian provinces of Nova Scotia, British Columbia, Prince Edward Island, Saskatchewan, and Newfoundland and Labrador have rejected declawing as unethical and inhumane.

Statistics publicly available from the cities having declaw bans, and from British Columbia, indicate that the relinquishment of cats to shelters in those cities, in the years since the bans were enacted, has not increased - in fact, the number of cats dumped in shelters has DECREASED consistently in the eleven to 18 years since the laws went into effect. The hundreds of veterinary hospital operated by VCA and Banfield no longer offering declawing. Clinics certified by the American Association of Feline Practitioners (AAFP) and Fear Free are not allowed to declaw.

There is no reason to believe that declawing cats protects human health. The NIH, CDC, US Public Health Service, the Infectious Diseases Society of America, and the Canadian Medical Association, all have specifically stated that the declawing is "not advised," even for the animals of persons who are severely immunocompromised, including those with HIV. This opinion is echoed in statements on declawing published by the AAHA and AAFP.

We hope this ordinance will be successful and be a model for humane legislation in other cities.

Dear Staff of Public Health of Madison and Dane County, and my Alder District 6, Brian Benford, and the entire City Council members,

I gave testimony last week to the City and County Dept of Public Health in favor of making Madison a city that will not allow the declawing procedure on felines.

I am a volunteer on the Feline behavioral team at a local animal rescue, Underdog Pet Rescue, since October 2020. I make my home with my 15 year old cat Addy, and our Archie cat passed 4 years ago at age 20. I feel I'm qualified to speak on this issue too because I have almost twenty years of cat guardian experience, as a cat parent, and knowledgeable and caring about cats and kittens. Over these years I have read 8 books on cat behavior, attended workshops by noted cat behaviorists, and I can confidently say that these behaviorists and feline experts would NEVER recommend the last digit surgical removal of a cat or kitten.

The field of feline behavior and science is still relatively new to animal guardian society, which began in the late '90s early 2000s. All those close to cats are just learning, really, and I observe this now and did constantly in my 5 year professional petsitting business in cat households. Our cats were, and are but it's improving slowly, a very misunderstood companion animal.

At the vanguard of our more educated and compassionate understanding of how cats perceive their world, is the cat caring people who published, got on YouTube with educational videos and webinars. They firmly believe that declawing a cat is an abomination and an inhuman tragedy to that cat.

I consulted on a story of a woman who adopted a 5 year old cat with all digits on all 4 paws amputated, that was surrendered to a shelter out of state, who had intermittent behavior of mild biting and scratching, which I highly suspect was correlated. We did everything we could but in the end the most humane for him was euthanizing.

If people would see the simplicity of the solution of a scratchpost for their cats or cats, actually a few scratch posts I'd advise, and research best materials, (sisal, not carpeting), and show their cat what it's for, by rubbing catnip, or drape a wand toy over it, I'm confident that their cat will use it, and NOT turn to the couch to scratch that. Plenty instructional online.

We ourselves must take responsibility and learn ourselves how to be better friends to our felines. Proven by functional DNA testing and published in 2014, the Feline Project, proved that cats are mostly wild, not fully domesticated. A behavior from their wildness is the need to

scratch for 4 different purposes; I'm optimistic we can learn what they need and require to be happy and healthy.

On behalf of Alley Cat Allies and our nearly 1,000 supporters in Madison, I urge you to support Legislative File Number 67344 – Prohibiting Declawing Procedures. If enacted into law, this ordinance would prohibit declawing, also known as onychectomy, a painful procedure which involves the surgical amputation of the last joints of an animals' toes.

Alley Cat Allies is the global engine of change for cats. We protect and improve cats' lives through our innovative, cutting-edge programs. We are seen around the world as a champion for the humane treatment of all cats. Founded in 1990, today Alley Cat Allies helps tens of thousands of individuals, communities, and organizations save and improve the lives of millions of cats and kittens worldwide. We are reaching out to you because prohibiting the declawing of cats in Madison will significantly benefit the health and wellbeing of cats in your city.

Cats rely on their paws, including their nails, or claws, for behavioral and grooming needs. Their claws help them to protect and defend themselves, and scratching removes dead nail sheaths and stretches and strengthens their muscles. Unfortunately, many people think declawing is a harmless solution to address unwanted scratching behavior and will result in more cats staying in their homes. However, declawing is a predominantly elective surgery that can be traumatic and cause permanent damage and pain for cats.

Declawing a cat is both psychologically and physically harmful. Side effects from declawing can include hemorrhaging, paw pad lacerations, swelling, radial nerve damage, lameness, infections, and chronic pain. Cats who suffer from these side effects may develop behavioral issues, such as aggression, biting, and urinating outside the litter box. These consequences of declawing are the behavior issues that cause most cats to be relinquished to animal shelters. Instead of declawing cats, there are many affordable humane alternatives available to address scratching behavior, like scratching posts, spray deterrents, and nail caps.

Leaders in veterinary medicine hold positions against declawing since it is usually done for the preference or convenience of the cat owner rather than for the health of the cat. The American Association of Feline Practitioners (AAFP) has ended elective declawing procedures in its "Cat Friendly Practices®." Major national veterinary chains Banfield, VCA and BluePearl Pet Hospitals have prohibited cat declawing in their 2,000+ hospitals. Other organizations that oppose declawing include the Humane Society Veterinary Medical Association (HSVMA), the International Society of Feline Medicine (ISFM), and the World Small Animal Veterinary Association (WSAVA).

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) does not recommend declawing for immunocompromised cat owners.

Laws and policies to ban declawing have been adopted worldwide. Policymakers in New York state, 12 major U.S. cities, eight Canadian provinces, and at least 42 countries have passed legislation and national veterinary policies to make declawing cats and other animals illegal. The case is clear: declawing is unacceptable.

On behalf of our supporters, your constituents, and Madison's animals, we urge you to support a prohibition on declawing procedures and keep cats' claws on their paws.
