Zebra swallowtail (*Eurytides marcellus*) was spotted in the Sunken Garden by Horticulturist Samantha Malone. The zebra swallowtail is widely distributed from southern New England west to eastern Kansas and south to Texas and Florida. Southern Wisconsin is a small part of its normal range, so a sighting in Madison is quite rare. Sam shared her sighting on iNaturalist and the word was out! For a couple weeks, butterfly enthusiasts from Madison and beyond were sighted in the gardens with binoculars and cameras in hand looking for the zebra swallowtail. It wasn't the only rare butterfly sighting in the gardens this summer either! Build it and they will come, build pollinator habitat that is!
