Site Summary

The surrounding population density and high visibility factored into this site's high score, but its edge on the equity-centered criteria pushed this site above the rest. The area is growing, has a high share of foreign-born residents, communities of color, and families in poverty. There are also several childcare facilities within a half-mile radius, improving local families' access to early literacy resources. Lastly, a library at this site would be a short walk from Sandburg Elementary, a 71% non-white and 71% low-income student body at Sandburg Elementary¹⁷ and currently the only eastside MMSD campus outside of a Madison Public Library service area.

At last night's meeting, staff presented a segment on installation of a cricket pitch that was constructed with artificial turf.

Could it be that the Parks department (or its contractors/leasees) and other local municipal departments are creating "forever" chemical pollution that puts city residents and others at risk, especially youth? that will eventually pollute drinking water?

Possible examples, from Reindahl Park and its environs:

- * A soccer organization contracts with Parks for use of highly-engineered turfgrass fields on the north end of Reindahl Park. In turn, the soccer organization contracts with a company that applies pesticides and fertilizers four times per year. For days and even weeks after each application, the chemicals (pesticides, fertilizers, carriers, surfactants, etc.) can affect people and other critters via dermal contact or pulmonary, ocular, or nasal/sinus intake.
- * To the north of Reindahl Park, the county owns 90 acres (protected from urban development for avigation safety purposes). The county bids/leases most of the land to agricultural users, who in turn apply pesticides and fertilizers to their crops (corn, soccer, etc.).
- * Most of Reindahl Park lies within the wellhead protection zone for the city well located proximate to the park.
- * The county land north of Reindahl Park drains southwest to a wetland/ stormwater detention area adjacent to the wellhead protection zone.

As it now stands the design unveiled by the planners in late January 2022 requires the removal of all the trees around the present Park Shelter. There is a lot of land to build on near the Shelter without cutting trees. IF the planners cannot accommodate their design inside the area set aside in the new Master Plan without removing trees then they need to produce a DIFFERENT design. Otherwise they will need to expand the area to be set aside for the Center so as not to remove trees.

The value of trees in a Park should go without saying, particularly the mature trees in question. Beauty should be valued. Shade in important, particularly to picknickers. The carbon removed from the atmosphere in photosynthesis is more important than ever. The Urban Forestry Commission reported a few years ago on the importance of maintaining trees in Madison. As taxpayers we pay a separate Urban Forestry fee, \$6 to \$7 monthly, hopefully for more than just the removal of diseased ash trees.

Additionally, the Park Shelter-even with its drawbacks-serves public purposes. People do picknick and meet inside, do use the toilets. My son had a high school graduation party there. When I was a Crossing Guard we had one of our end-of-year picnics there. The Shelter should remain available for public use while the Center is being built. When it is time to remove it should be deconstructed in such as way as not to damage the adjacent trees.

Before the time comes to approve the Master Plan it must be amended so that the site chosen by the designers in January 2022 is ruled out. If it is not ruled out, the Master Plan should be rejected.

Preface: I read this analysis at the Commission Meeting on November 9, 2022. Due to time constraints and a full crowd I was not permitted to finish. This is the entirety of the remarks.

I want to give my take on the process through which we arrived at the Imagination Center designers recommending that the Center replace the present Park Shelter thereby requiring the removal of all the trees now there.

Early in Alder Baldeh's first term (2014?) there was the one and only fairly well publicized meeting encouraging building a Library in District 17, held at the former Howard Johnson on East Washington. The Parks Commissioner, Library Commissioner, Alder Baldeh, former Alder Clausius were all there. Attendees broke out into smaller groups to brainstorm a possible site. My first thought ,not alone, was the vacant Steinhafel furniture store close to the Mall. We were told that there were environmental problems with the site...the building still sits empty. There was a lot of enthusiasm for putting it in the Park. Speakers got into adding many functions to the Library. If left early.

I never heard or read anything after that until I learned the Library had changed into the Imagination Center and the City Council had approved the Park as the site. The Library planning procedure apparently required that 2 additional sites in the East Towne area be considered and there was a way to rank which site would best meet the needs under consideration. The other sites were never made public. Reindahl. did not rank highest on some of those scores.

Not having heard any information for months?...a year or more? I began to worry about where it would be sited. Kevin Engelbert was the Park Planner from 2016 to 2018. I pressed him as to where the Library wanted to site the building. Reluctantly he told me that they wanted the building highly visible from East Washington Avenue and near the bus stop. I was told that the exact site would not be chosen until the end of the planning process...a rather odd arrangement. I naively assumed that the public would be involved at that Point. I also naively assumed that the City Council would have to approve the exact site of the building. I started sending Emails to Council members and groups most likely to oppose tree removal in an attempt to head off any site requiring cutting mature trees.

When the Center designers unveiled their proposal in late January 2022 I was still under the impression that the Council would have to approve the site. I only learned on into February that the Parks Commisssion has sole authority to choose the exact site.

I know from observation that the citizen proponents never even thought about the existing trees. I know with certainty that the exact site of the Center was chosen even before the building designers started their work. I queried Samba Baldeh in an Email this September to learn what he might know about siting the Center before he left office at the end of 2020. He replied saying: "I remember discussion about tree removal and replacement before I left."

I am convinced that the exact site for the Center was made long before it was revealed. The citizen proponents cared only that the Center be built-did not propose the exact site. I am sure that very few people knew the approval process. One person who probably knew the process was former Alder Clausius. He served on the Park Commission for may years. He was on the Commisssion when the Tenney park Shelter was replaced. Developer Terence Wall proposed moving up the date for replacing that Shelter with a pledge to pay half the cost of the building. He did it to honor his father.

IF the Library and Parks Departments had encouraged the involvement of area residents in choosing the site and if they had explained the steps to approval of the exact site and if it then the majority of concerned area residents wanted the Center sited where mature trees would have to be cut, I would not be here today. I bear with many decisions by the City Counsil that I strongly disagree with because they are duly elected and the process for influencing their decisions is open. That is not what happened here.
