-

I moved twice while being in Madison and both times were crazy. The first time was actually before coming to the city for my first year, which was very stressful due to the fact that for graduate students as in my case, most programs tell us we are accepted by the end of February. It is then when we start looking for housing, and as we all know, apartment hunting here starts way earlier in the year. That made it almost impossible to find an affordable place near the campus area and I ended up in a expensive apartment which made it difficult to go by during my first year in the program. Because of that, I moved to where I live now W Johnson St and I am extremely happy with the location and price I am paying now. However, in order to find this place, I started the hunt in October the year before the beginning of my lease, and I toured around 30-40 places since there is also no clear basis line in Madison. It seems that apartment complexes can charge whatever much they want and that makes it difficult. There is no clear standard, and you can end up with either a pricey or a trashy place!

As a graduate international student, we are not allowed to work outside of the university. Therefore, for many of us, our only source of income is our graduate student position at UW. The ideal amount would be less than half our salary which now is around a bit less than 2000. That is, ideally I would like to pay around 700-800 for a one bedroom per month.

I previously lived in the West side of the city near the UW-Madison Hospital, which was very expensive. The most difficult aspect was the lack of transportation and how far it was to commute to campus/downtown everyday. It was also a residential area, so there were no easy access to grocery stores. I know live in W Johnson St, right in front of the buildings they want to demolish. This is a very affordable, nice area which would really cause me trouble if it were to be transformed into luxury housing since I will be forced to leave. I cannot afford those types of places.

If there is a chance it comes up for a vote again to reconsider the item, I would not mind speaking up as a UW-Madison student against this luxury housing project. Thank you so much for what you're doing!

Thank you for rejecting the proposed new "luxury" building and prioritizing existing, affordable housing in the downtown area. I am a recent student and young professional living in an older, affordable building near campus and, as these monstrous buildings have gone up all around the city, I have lived in terror that a company like Core Spaces is going to set its sights on my street and be allowed to demolish it. Core Spaces has already proven with their current projects that their buildings are poorly built, poorly maintained, and shockingly unaffordable with rents totally detached from any reality of supply and demand. They do not deserve to be granted another square inch of Madison. Giving them another housing project would result in another shoddily-built firetrap and send rents further into the stratosphere because it would give them an even more entrenched monopoly over the downtown housing market. That is bad for all downtown residents and bad for Madison as a whole.

Finally, but just as importantly, the revenue these existing, affordable buildings generate stays in Madison with Madison-based landlords, rather than being hoarded by an out-of-state REIT. This is good for the city as a whole. Rents paid in Madison should stay in Madison.

My name is Katie, and I'm studying public affairs and urban planning at UW-Madison.

I'm just finishing up my first year here and preparing to move apartments. I currently am living in a studio that's a 30 min bus ride about 40 min with walking to the bus and waiting from campus. I am going to move to an apartment 15 minutes from campus but more expensive higher rent and parking costs.

I haven't taken many urban planning classes in grad school yet but I have been confused at the number of luxury apartments I keep seeing in construction. I'm not sure if the Madison government is trying to drive up competition to drive down prices, but as far as I can tell, luxury condos and apartments and all housing is only getting more expensive. This is confusing to me because I have heard of classmates and former students living in their cars by the lake or in parking lots. I don't know how more luxury housing is going to fix that.

Personally, I am very lucky. My dad served in the military for 20 years, so my tuition is paid for. But living expenses are not covered and I'm struggling to stay within a feasible budget. I would have had to spend nearly all my money on housing if I wanted to live with 15 bus minutes of campus, without roommates, and the studio apts were like 600 sq ft. I have a 4.5 year old that lives with me part time so roommates and tiny studios aren't an option. Dear Alders,

Thank you for taking the issue of housing seriously, and giving full consideration to all the concerns of the community. We all benefit from your sustained and thoughtful engagement.

I am a recent UW grad, but I have just started working in the Madison area and plan to stay. I really love it here. I would like to share some of my thoughts on housing and transportation in the downtown area. My experience mostly pertains to the campus area, but many of these concerns are applicable to the broader city.

Briefly, my concerns are:

- A housing market without options across the price spectrum. Currently it feels that you have two options in Madison:

1 Brand new luxury apartments.

2 100 year old building with no A/C or dishwasher not substantially cheaper than option 1. A functional market needs options in the middle, so consumers can actually dictate their preferences. Currently, it feels like more of a rock-and-a-hard-place. Please encourage the development of new housing throughout the price spectrum.

- Cars. Cars are bad for the environment uh, hello wildfire smoke, inefficient modes of transportation, noisy, and annoying to get around with. I think cars exist for two reasons:

1 Sometimes there is no other option to get where you want, when you want.

2 People are unaware of the other options, and are not incentivized to use the other options over their cars.

Please expand public transit options the offerings are good already, but the more convenient and timely it is, the more people will opt to use it. This includes ride sharing services like Uber, which are incredibly helpful for filling gaps that would be unrealistic for public transit to fill.

Please expand education/advertisement about public transit. I think the public largely discounts the public transit system prematurely, because their experience in the US especially the midwest has been poor. We should be getting the public engaged and advocating for the

transit they need and will use, and trying out the new transit whenever they can.

Thirdly, please disincentivize car use. This goes hand in hand with expanding the public transit system. Make parking expensive. Penalize businesses for paving over 5 acres of green space for a parking lot, instead of having. Businesses should have bus stops, not bigger parking lots. All of our spaces encourage the use of cars over any other form of transit. People will continue to use cars in these circumstances, for good reason. The problem is fundamentally in the design of the city. It needs to encourage sustainable transportation options. People just need them to be convenient, which needs they need to be prioritized in the design of our city, especially as it expands.

People will never _want_ to use public transit when it is perpetually made less convenient at the expense of making cars more convenient.

Hello Alders,

First, I wanted to thank you for striking down the plan to demolish affordable student apartments and replace them with luxury apartments downtown. I would also like to implore you to expand affordable housing options, consider rent control, and work with UW to address student concerns about housing access.

I've used my own story below to help illuminate the situation faced by graduate students, and I trust that you will similarly seek out the stories of undergraduate students to better know where we are coming from.

I am a graduate student, making 1,560/month 780/paycheck with a 50% assistantship. This means I work 20 hours/week on top of school. I often pick up second and third jobs to make ends meet. Research suggests students school suffers when working more than 20hours/week, and often I don't have a choice but to do so.

My rent is 800/month for a 300 square foot studio. When I was searching for this apartment, it took 6 months to find. In that time, one studio apartment in the Madison area was cheaper, a studio in Middleton that didn't have a window or a refrigerator for 700/month. To get the apartment I have, because I did not make 2.5x the monthly rent in income, I had to apply for an exception. I have to believe that this process of apply for an exception is easier for me than a lot of my peers because I am a white, native English speaking, social worker turned educator who can pass as neurotypical. Each of these identities prompts landlords to trust me. I can't imagine having to go through this process without the privileges I have.

To be 100% transparent, with my biweekly check being 780, and my rent being 800, my income and budget breaks down roughly as follows:

- 800 Rent This is 300 sq ft of non-air conditioned basement space that, this past winter, only heated up to about 60 $\rm F$

- 100 utilities including internet which is not optional as a student

- 150-250 Groceries This is dependent on whether I have the time to take busses to cheaper

grocery stores. Those near campus and hildale are much more expensive and Insta cart is more expensive per item plus fees

- 200 healthcare This I'm sure varies by student. I include prescriptions, otc meds, disability aids, and visit copays

- 45 phone service
- 50 dental insurance coverage

- Remaining income of about 100-150 is spent on things like travel/conferences required for my schooling, the occasional Lyft to a meeting outside of bus range, any clothes or household items needed, needs that my peers have that I can meet, visiting family a couple times/year, and hopefully a little leftover for emergency savings.

Most graduate students I know pay well over 1,000 per month and don't get paid during the summer I'm fortunate to have a year round contract instead of a school year contract. We strategically stagger leases and couch hop between to try to make it by. I often find myself having people crash with me or making sure my peers eat because of how much we all struggle to get by. None of us are able to do our best work when facing homelessness and hunger.

I was in that same position a year ago, having had a roommate for years to get by until it became unsafe. My mental health is still recovering. I spent a month living in a tent on the beach in Oregon and then finding dog and house sitting gigs between leases, because plane tickets, tent & a storage unit was significantly cheaper than two months of summer rent. I crashed with family and friends to get by. And I know that I am one of the lucky ones in my peer group. I'm one of the ones that can invite people over to dinner to make sure they get to eat something more than ramen and free sandwiches thrown out after events.

The current status of housing in Madison makes it clear that students and grad students are not welcome in this city, and are viewed as a passing source of income instead of community members. But we have students on the City Council! We have students staffing nonprofit organizations and doing the essential work of keeping our city going. Students are clearly invested in this community, and its time the community invests back. The only chance this place has at continuing to attract excellent students and grad students, and keeping us here after graduation, is to find ways to work with us so we can afford it. We work so hard to survive in this community, and it doesn't seem like the city is willing to meet us partway.

We need the following:

- More affordable housing options so students have somewhere to go when their housing situation becomes unsafe

- Housing options that are less than 2.5x our income for grad students that means apartments that are 600/month or less

- Housing that is safe, clean, pest free, and within biking or bussing distance of the university, affordable grocery stores, and healthcare facilities

We don't need the following:

- Gyms we have them at UW

- Pools we have them at UW

- Rooftop terraces Make roofs green so I can breath, there is public outdoor space I can use elsewhere

- Marble countertops and hardwood floors the floors in my apartment regularly lift up, but I don't care. I just wish my heat worked or I had the option of moving somewhere it does.
