Also a gardener named Tessa Lowinske Desmond described the garden as a "special multicultural space".

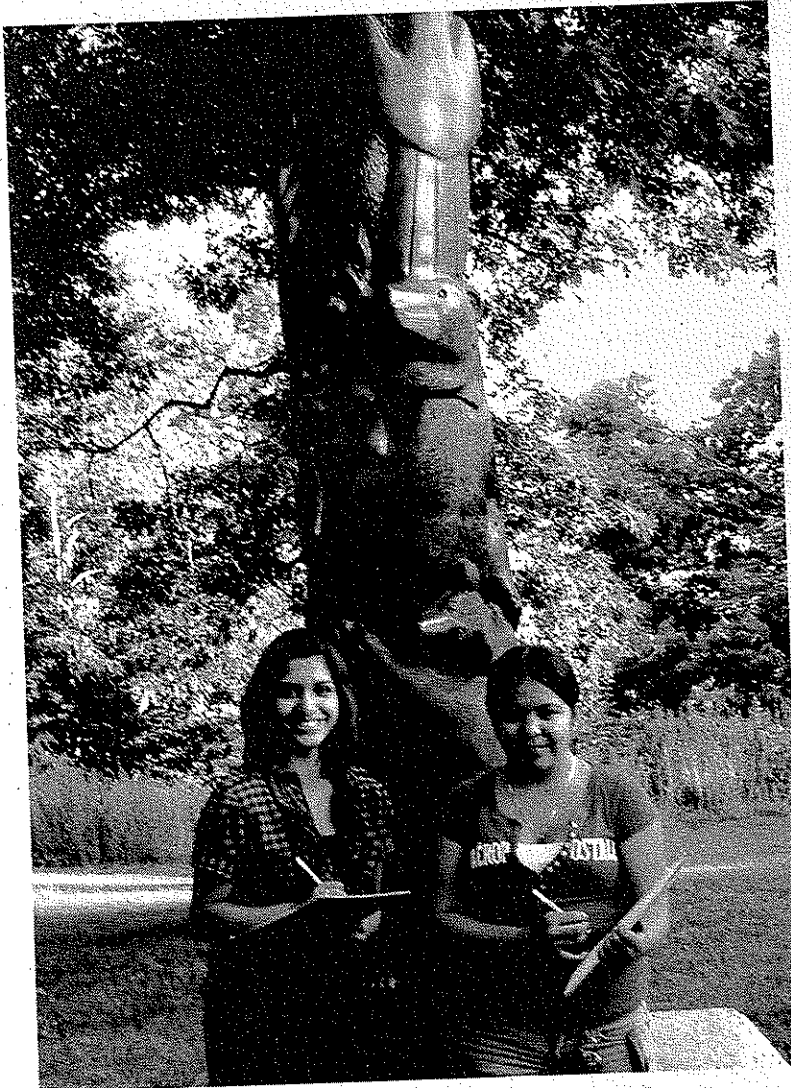
She also believes that it is good to know where your food comes from.

Latest Sculpture by Harry Whitehorse Erected Near Lake Monona

Harry R. Whitehorse, a Native American artist from the Ho Chunk tribe, is well known locally for his sculptures.

Recently, a group of Simpson Street Free Press reporters went to see a new Whitehorse sculpture called "Let the Great Spirits Soar." This new piece is a tribute to the Effigy Mound Builders, native peoples who hundreds of years ago inhabited what is now Wisconsin. The sculpture is made of wood and is surrounded by burial mounds.

Whitehorse's latest work is located on Lakeland Avenue near Olbrich Gardens in Madison. The sculpture reflects Ho Chunk culture and features eagles, bears, wolves and other animals.

Harry R. Whitehorse, a Monona native, tries to live in traditional ways and share his cultural knowledge with the public. ♦
