Proposal Birds on the Bike Path

Conceptual Approach

Birds on the Bike Path is a solidly built, aesthetically pleasing, whimisical series of staked metal sculptures that range in size from 3'-41/2' tall. These giant birds and flowers embrace the community's core values about recycling while creating a magical, mysterious oasis of interesting creatures for people to appreciate around the bike path. It will be a great stopping-off point for pedestrians, residents and passersby. The sculpture garden will enhance the opportunity for people wanting to take pictures of our beautiful city. This exhibition connects to its physical surrondings by combining elements of nature, scrap metal and old bicycles. Birds on the Bike Path will encourage public dialogue and contribute to a sustainable, healthy community as they show people a beautiful way to use reclaimed materials while creating harmony and balance in nature.

Project Location

- The first choice for the sculpture installation is off John Nolen Drive, north east of the traffic light for Lakeside Street and the entrance road that leads to Olin Park in the grassy area overlooking Lake Monona and the Monona Convention Center
- Second choice for installation is on John Nolen Drive in the grassy area along the lake between the traffic light for Broom Street and the Monona Convention Center.
- Third choice for installation is along the bike path on Atwood Avenue after the First Avenue traffic light but before Monty's Blue Plate Diner.

Proposed Budget

The project budget is \$1,300 which includes materials and a minumum of 45 hours artist time to create and install the the sculptures.

Timeline

The installation will take place before bike to work week in June and remain in place until after Ride the Drive in September.
