
Amendments 1 - 3: Requested by Alders


Amendment No. 1

Requested by Ald. Bidar-Sielaff

Split ward 05-C into two wards along Regent Street. Ward 05-C2 would continue to vote at West High School. Ward 05-C1 would vote at Blessed Sacrament Catholic Church which is where the area in the new ward currently votes.







Requested by Alds. Subeck and Phair

Modify the boundary between Districts 1 and 20 and adjust the wards. The population in District 1 would be 11,960. The population in District 20 would be 11,457. This amendment would require creation of an additional ward in District 1 (01-F) that would contain 999 people. The northern part of Ward 01-A would become a ward containing 841 people. The southern part would be added on to Ward 20-D and would contain 2,755 people.






Modify the boundary of District 15. District 15 would extend further north and have a population of 11,957. District 12 would have a different configuration and have a population of 11,397. District 6 would extend further east and have a population of 11,609. Some of the wards involved would remain the same and several would be reconfigured.

In terms of neighborhood association boundaries, this proposal removes one neighborhood association split (Carpenter-Ridgeway), but creates three splits (Eken Park, Schenk-Atwood-Starkweather-Yahara, Eastmorland).

Amendments 4 - 6: Suggested by the Redistricting Committee and Requested by Alders




Amendment No. 4

Requested by Ald. Weier

Modify wards 18-A and 18-E. Ward 18-E1 (the northern ward) would contain 3,207 people and vote at Black Hawk Middle School. Ward 18-A1 (the southern ward) would contain 1,450 people and vote at the Warner Park Community Recreation Center.



Change the polling place for ward 01-A from the West Police District to Our Redeemer Lutheran Church. Under Ward Plan 14b, Ward 01-A and Ward 01-B would vote at the West Police District and Ward 20-B would vote at Our Redeemer. This amendment would have ward 01-A vote at Our Redeemer instead.

This amendment would be negated if Amendment No. 2 is approved.





Split ward 14E into two wards, using the centerline of the former railroad line and the Beltline, and have the western/northern ward vote at the Arbor Hills-Leopold Community Police Station. The new ward 14-E would contain 1,007 people and continue to vote at Leopold Elementary School. Ward 14-F would contain 2,129 people and would vote at the Arbor Hills-Leopold Community Police Station which is located at 2821 Todd Drive near the intersection of Todd Drive and the Beltline.

Amendments 7 - 12: To Accommodate the State's Redistricting Plan




Amendment No. 7

Split Ward 20-C using Raymond Road. Ward 20-C1 would have 1,032 people. Ward 20-C2 would have 584 people. Both wards would still vote at Good Shepherd Lutheran Church.



Split Ward 12-A using Anderson Street and International Lane. Ward 12-A1 would have 31 people. Ward 12-A2 would have 2,000 people. Both wards would still vote at the MATC Commercial Avenue Education Center.

Change the proposed polling place for Ward 10-D from the MGE Innovation Center to the Odana Hills Club House. Currently, the western part of this area votes at MGE and the eastern part votes at Odana Hills. City staff recommended that MGE be used for this proposed ward, because Odana Hills has been cold in the winter months, overnight storage of equipment has not been available and it has not been a good environment. City of Madison Parks Division staff feels that these issues can be resolved.
