As co-editors of Verse Wisconsin, versewisconsin.org, we have worked with many Madison poets, leaders, businesses and institutions in a variety of ways. We have worked with editors at Madison Magazine and Wisconsin People and Ideas to help get information to the Madison community about poetry activities we're involved in. We have been invited repeatedly to appear on WORT's Radio Lit program as representatives of the poetry scene in Wisconsin. We have worked extensively with Avol's Books owner Ron Czerwien to set up multiple poetry events in town. Wendy has co-ordinated the Wisconsin Fellowship of Poets' marathon reading at Olbrich Gardens for 5 years. We have created, with Madison's Poetry Jumps Off the Shelf, a poetry vending machine which has been featured at Avol's and Orange Tree Imports, as well as further afield around the state. We worked with David Wells and the Terry Family Foundation to create an event for Wisconsin poetry publishers at Edenfred. We have worked with faculty and students at the University of Wisconsin and provided materials to the Odyssey Literacy Program, to correctional facilities, to community centers and libraries, and to teachers at MATC and UW-Extension. We have presented at the Wisconsin Book Festival for three years in a row, as well as festivals at  $\hat{U}W$ -Madison, and in nearby towns and beyond. As editors of Verse Wisconsin we feature poets from Madison and Wisconsin, and bring their poems to a wider audience around the state and the nation. During the political protests this winter, we created a special section of our online issue where many poets from Madison sent work about their experience of the political events; we invited writers with a broad spectrum of views to submit work, and have created a space on the website for poets to enter into dialog about issues.

We both look forward to serving a four-year term in Madison, as Co-Poets Laureate. We see the position of Poet Laureate as being an invitation to serve a community within the context of one's talents and art, which we have been doing for the past two years as coeditors of *Verse Wisconsin*. As Madison is an engaged and vibrant city, we look forward to exploring what the role of City Laureate might encompass.

The current Laureate, Fabu, has been an active and inspiring presence within the community, especially within the schools. We see our proposed service as Laureates as an opportunity to shift this role to better match our own talents, continuing the wide work that we do with *Verse Wisconsin* and Cowfeather Press. We will continue to make the poems of Madison and Wisconsin poets available to a broad variety of audiences in prisons, schools, libraries, colleges, nursing homes and retirement facilities. We will continue to reach out to a broad variety of communities, striving to represent the true diversity of Madison and Wisconsin. We will continue to reach out to the University, to partner with them in any way that proves helpful to all, building bridges between university and community poets. We will remind the community at large that poetry is fun, by working to find a wide variety of homes for our Verse-O-Matic poetry vending machine. And we hope to partner with the Little Free Libraries project to establish at least one Little Free Library in Madison devoted to poetry.

As publishers of Cowfeather Press, we hope to promote community reads of Wisconsin Poet Laureate Bruce Dethlefsen's current new collection, *Unexpected Shiny Things*. We look forward to partnering with libraries, book groups, and even grief counselors, to help find a wide audience for this book, and help more people discover that poetry can be fun, funny, provocative and of great comfort in difficult times.

We will also work to remind our fellow poets, and the larger community, that poets play a role in the public town square as well, and that poetry, and the arts, have value, whether or not that value immediately translates into dollars. Through our words, we recall the primary importance of the experience of the individual within society. We serve as witness, not replacing the historian or the journalist, but complimenting both with our third way of representing events, and the truth of large and difficult questions. As poets, we know that words have meaning and weight, and our examples serve as a public reminder of that fact and a rebuke to those who would use language lightly or dishonestly. Through the practice of poetry, we make a political statement, regardless of the content of our poems.

And finally, we both look forward to working with the Madison Arts Commission and the Mayor's office, to continue to define and explore what the role of a Madison Poet Laureate should be and become.

Working sixty hours a week on office accounts, fingers striking the 10-key like well-aimed missiles, morning to night and through the lunch hours as its tape unspooled, her mind's tape unwinding, too, considering the problem in 1962 of how and when to leave a no-account husband whose faults included drinking, womanizing, overspending. They could never get ahead, no matter how much overtime she put in. No surprise that when she turns up pregnant it's as welcome an event as any other sexual disease or warhead appearing on your door step one night. Or that she ducks and covers behind her desk for nine months, first to arrive, last to leave. Or that she practices Containment: squeezes even through the final days into a full-length rib-flattening, breath-tightening, body-armoring girdle, and always a little heavy in the middle, manages by skipping lunch to lose weight so that in the end, on the morning when she straightens her desktop's tacks and clips, phones her husband to pick her up then takes the year's two-weeks, no one's the wiser, including my mother, who on the last day of this crisis, delivers me while the world waits, holding its breath to see who'll blink at the earth's thick waist, as a world-class philanderer and a drinker, both spendthrifts, bring us all to the brink.
