SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT – DECEMBER, 2011 EAST PARKS – CRAIG KLINKE

The weather in November was very favorable, allowing us to continue to work on projects that we couldn't normally do this late into the season. We have been working at Tenney Park, and continue to do so. Most of our work has been along the shoreline. Now that the shelter construction is almost complete, we will begin working inside the shelter. We will prepare the bathrooms, seating area, the garage, etc., to have it ready for winter use.

We are continuing to prune trees (many oaks and elms) and mulching leaves throughout our park system. We finished softball field restoration, and aerated more areas than we ever have before. Lastly, we are converting equipment for winter use.

We look forward to December and the colder temperatures to come. We are excited to begin ice rink operations, and are prepared to meet the challenges of the upcoming snowfalls. We look forward to another great season of cooperation between city staff and volunteers for the *Adopt an Ice Rink* program.

WEST PARKS - KRISTIN MATHEWS, INTERIM PARKS SUPERVISOR

With the wonderful weather in November, West Parks has been able to accomplish a lot of grounds maintenance work. In most instances, we were able to mulch our parks more than once. Our new agrimedal rear mount blower proved to be very useful and only took one person to operate, which was beneficial. The Elver ball diamond was regraded, new material was added, and we touched up with new sod as well. We wrapped up the hayrides just before Thanksgiving and the wagons are in storage until next season. We laid off the rest of our seasonal staff for the remainder of the year. It was certainly nice to have the extra help on board for so long. All of the barrels and picnic tables that need refurbishing are in the shop for yearly maintenance. We will continue trimming trees in the parks while the weather allows.

MALL CONCOURSE - TOM SKAIFE, SUPERVISOR; LAURA BAUER, LEADSWORKER

As November ends, we're installing and servicing the last of our snow removal equipment. We have salt for the walks in our shop, and are now ready for snow. We're also excited about incorporating two seasonal employees into our winter operation this year. Their assistance will greatly help us in improving our coverage.

Our trees have a few leaves remaining and of course the leaves from the Capitol lawn still continue to blow around as they will all winter; but the majority have been collected and are now composting peacefully behind the *Garver Feed Mill*.

The winter pine bough arrangements were placed in the planters by a contractor chosen by the *Business Improvement District*, the snowflake lights have been hung by the Facilities Maintenance crew, and East Forestry trimmed, leveled, and refilled our tree grates (a huge job, and much-needed). We appreciate everyone's contributions that were made to the safety and festive appearance of the downtown area.

As we wait for winter weather, we are collecting rubbish, recycling, and sweeping the sidewalks, as conditions allow.

CONSERVATION - RUSS HEFTY

Staff completed the construction and signage for new hiking trails at Hiestand Park. These trail links will improve public access to the conservation park located at the north end of the Hiestand Park. The Parks' construction crew completed grading on the trail linkages at Door Creek Park. This will enable us to open the first phase of a new ski trail system this winter. It will be on a limited basis, and when there is adequate snow cover. We are anticipating opening additional trails next year, following the installation of three creek crossings.

We finished trimming along ski trails in preparation for the winter cross-country ski season and have now started installing trail signage. New trail signage was installed at Door Creek Park using permanent *Carsonite* posts (these flexible posts are very durable and do not pose a hazard to skiers). We began moving ski equipment into our winter locations at Elver Park and Odana Golf Course.

We leased a Forestry mower in order to move forward with oak savanna and prairie restoration projects at Prairie Ridge and Owen Conservation Parks. We were able to clear brush from approximately seven acres in less than a week. The areas mowed will require follow up treatment with an herbicide, and native seeds will be sown to increase plant diversity.

We have received a \$10,000 grant from the United States Fish and Wildlife Service to restore 13-acres of oak savanna at Edna Taylor Conservation Park. We plan to lease a Forestry mower this winter

and staff will clear the exotic brush and small trees to start the restoration process.

planting was completed, both East and West Forestry arborists moved back into pruning and removal work. The West Forestry unit did get some time to do some cycle pruning whereas, the East unit did not. Special projects include:

- Prune oaks near the playground at Glenwood Park
- Remove trees for Door Creek Cross-country Ski trail
- Prune oaks near Glen Oak Hills Park playground
- Dead tree removal at Hoyt Park along Regent Street
- Brush pick up for Olbrich Ball Diamond Renovations
- Dead elm removals along the Southwest Bike Path
- Oak tree pruning at Orton Park
- Prune low hanging trees at BB Clarke Beach for construction clearance
- Repair and level tree grates around the Capitol Square and along State Street
- Remove dead trees in Meadow Ridge Park behind Veith Avenue properties

GOLF - RAY SHANE

The golf season came to an end with Monona and Odana Hills closing on November 21. Glenway closed on November 6 and Yahara Hills on November 16. The end of year reports have not been completed, but it appears that the program will have another financially successful year.

Staff is being kept busy preparing the courses and buildings for the winter months. Snow mold protection products have been applied to the greens and most of the tees at all four courses. Irrigation systems have been winterized, and buildings have been shut down for the winter months. All of our mowing equipment has been transported out to the maintenance building at Yahara for sharpening and annual maintenance.

Plans are being finalized for the upcoming 2012 season. We are reviewing green fee prices and programs along with completing ending inventories, so that items we will need to purchase can be bid on.

I want to thank all of the staff in both the clubhouse operations and the course maintenance for all of the hard work and dedication to the Parks Division. A special "Thank You" is extended to Bob Farr. Bob has announced his retirement and will be leaving us in January. Bob has been the Greenskeeper at Glenway for the past several seasons and his leadership and experience will be greatly missed. We all wish him and his family the very best.

PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT – KAY RUTLEDGE Rennebohm, Wingra and Door Creek Path Paving

Construction is complete for the paving of paths at Rennebohm, Wingra and Door Creek Parks, including installation of a new backstop at Rennebohm Park.

Warner Park Parking Lot

The Parks Division will be reconstructing the Warner Park parking lot in three phases over the

next three years. In Phase 1, fall 2010, we replaced the storm sewer and built two retention ponds that will hold all of the parking lot run off prior to it going into the channel and lagoons. Bays 2, 3, and the roadway binder are complete. We are working on plans and specifications for phase 3 to be done in spring 2012. Phase 3 includes bay 4 (in front of the park shelter), bay 5 (in front of the Mallards office and bay 5 (new parking bays by the soccer fields).

Olbrich Park Softball Light Replacement

This project is 75% complete. The old lights came down the last week of October. All trenching and conduit installation should be done by the start of November. The new lights are up and all wiring complete. Landscaping is to start the first week of December, with testing to follow.

Quann Tennis Courts

The reconstruction of 6 of the 12 tennis courts at Quann Park is about 75% complete. The color will be done in spring, 2012, under separate contract. The refurbishing of the net posts will be done by our staff this winter.

Thut Park

We are the constructing a berm and corresponding inlet to address stormwater concerns.

Cherokee Park

We coordinated with the Alder, neighborhood representatives, vendors, and staff to identify the location of the new playground and potential playground components. The prepared presentation materials are to be unveiled at the Neighborhood Holiday party to kick off fundraising efforts.

Tenney Park Pavilion

Installation of heating and electrical systems was completed by the end of November, along with painting the interior, finishing the bathrooms, and the concession area. Coordinated interior wiring for telephone and potential WiFi by IT is to be done by a contractor; working with AT&T to get telephone and DSL service installed. Final trade inspections were signed off on November 30, and a certificate of occupancy was issued. Staff training was held on November 30, as well. Punch list items have been generated and Findorff is working to resolve outstanding issues. We are waiting to receive receipt of asbuilts and O&M manuals.

Tenney Park Maintenance Bridge

In mid October, we hired *Bloom Companies* through our RFP (Request for Proposal), process. We met with the consultant to start the design process on October 28, 2011. We are completing additional survey work to facilitate design development.

Playgrounds, Paths and Basketball

Pathways are complete at Odana, Monona, Secret Places, Goodman and James Madison Parks. Playgrounds are complete at Klief, Monona, and James Madison Parks with the exception of completing final punch list items (swings at James Madison will be replaced at a later date). At the Alder's request, we sent out notification letters to neighbors adjoining Northland Manor Park prior to moving forward with installation of the playground surfacing; playground surfacing scheduled for replacement this week.

Park Landscaping

Fall landscaping is complete. This included screening plantings and trees at Rennebohm Park, and landscaping of the new parking lot as part of the Warner Park Parking Lot project.

Olive Jones Park

The contract has been issued for the design work needed to prepare plans and specifications for the retaining wall repairs/reconstruction. This work will be incorporated into the Board of Public Works contract that will include re-paving and the fence replacement around the balance of the perimeter next year. Soil borings should occur the first weekend in December to facilitate the design of the retaining walls. Additional paver inscriptions and installations to the amphitheater were completed.

Marshall/Spring Harbor Park Dredging

Marshall Park dredging is about 80% complete. Scheduled start for Spring Harbor is December 5.

We expect the completion of both projects by December 16.

Park and Open Space Plan

Remaining sections of the report were submitted to Long Range Planning on November 7 for their review and comment. A draft of the plan was also presented to Department Heads and Dane County Parks Division for their review and comment. A complete revised draft will be presented to the Long Range Planning Sub Committee on December 12.

Hudson Park

Parks and Engineering staff met with the neighborhood to discuss three options for improvements to Hudson Park on October 25, 2011. The neighborhood chose a final option with some additional suggestions for changes, which were discussed with the DNR along with permitting requirements for the project. We are continuing to evaluate design changes suggested by the neighborhood. The Alder sponsored a capital budget amendment for additional funding to support these changes, which was approved.

Other Projects

- Continuing to work with Parks and Engineering staff to site amenities for the Cannonball Trail
 junction at Knollwood Park and the UW Arboretum.
- Continuing to work with the Glen Oak Hills volunteers and Alder to provide trees for their ongoing
 planting days with funds from the Neighborhood Association and matched through the People for
 Parks program.
- Kiosk and trail construction have been completed at Hiestand Park, along with the informational materials for the kiosk.
- Worked with the Planning Department to coordinate materials and installation for placement of City landmark plaques in various parks (Breese Stevens, Tenney Park, Yahara Parkway and Owen Parkway).
- Working with Planning on the Arbor Hills/Leopold Neighborhood Plan and Hoyt Park Neighborhood Plan.
- Working with the Engineering staff to confirm location of Kingswood Park trail link to the developing neighborhood to the south across Midtown Rd.
- Evaluating proposed improvements at Stevens Street Playground as requested by the Alder for capital budget amendment.
- Completed Kaboom Let's Play Spruce grants for various park playground improvements completed in 2011.
- Working on developing a new ski trail map for Elver Park.
