# SB 1210 Homeless Bill of Rights

Chief House Sponsor Welch; Passed House 76-33-0 Chief Senate Sponsor Silverstein; Passed Senate 41-11-1

## What the bill does:

SB 1210 protects homeless people from discrimination by creating basic rights.

Under the bill, basic rights, such as the right to maintain gainful employment, to access public services and spaces, to access emergency medical care, and the right to vote on the same basis as others cannot be denied solely because someone is homeless or lists a shelter as their address.

A person discriminated against because of his or her housing status would have the right to take legal action and seek damages.

### How the law would protect homeless people:

Since 1993 Cook County has had a "housing status" protection in place in its human rights ordinance. In 1998, a suburban public library fired a long-term employee immediately after it learned that he was homeless. The aggrieved employee was able to sue and his job was restored with compensation for lost wages and benefits. Under SB 1210 similar rights would be applied state-wide.

### Protections include:

**Employment** - People experiencing homelessness who must use the address of a shelter or social service provider cannot be discriminated against by their employer in maintaining employment.

*Medical care:* Emergency medical clinics cannot turn away otherwise eligible homeless persons solely because they live on the street, in a shelter or temporary residence.

**Public spaces**: Homeless individuals cannot be denied access to public spaces solely because of their housing status.

**Voting:** Homeless persons must be provided sufficient documentation to enable them to lawfully cast a vote in any election.

2	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,
3	represented in the General Assembly:
4	Section 1. Short title. This Act may be cited as the Bill
5	of Rights for the Homeless Act.
6	Section 5. Legislative intent. It is the long-standing
7	policy of this State that no person should suffer unnecessarily
8	from cold or hunger, be deprived of shelter or the basic rights
9	incident to shelter, or be subject to unfair discrimination
10	based on his or her homeless status. At the present time, many
11	persons have been rendered homeless as a result of economic
12	hardship, a severe shortage of safe and affordable housing, and
13	a shrinking social safety net. It is the intent of this Act to
14	lessen the adverse effects and conditions caused by the lack of
15	residence or a home.
16	Section 10. Bill of Rights.
17	(a) No person's rights, privileges, or access to public
18	services may be denied or abridged solely because he or she is
19	homeless. Such a person shall be granted the same rights and

- (5) the right to vote, register to vote, and receive documentation necessary to prove identity for voting without discrimination due to his or her housing status;

1 (7) the right to a reasonable expectation of privacy in 2 his or her personal property to the same extent as personal 3 property in a permanent residence.

(b) As used in this Act, "housing status" means the status of having or not having a fixed or regular residence, including the status of living on the streets, in a shelter, or in a temporary residence.

Section 15. Damages and attorney's fees. In any civil

action alleging a violation of this Act, the court may award

appropriate injunctive and declaratory relief, actual damages,

and reasonable attorney's fees and costs to a prevailing

plaintiff.

Section 99. Effective date. This Act takes effect upon becoming law.

# Synopsis As Introduced

Creates the Bill of Rights for the Homeless Act. Sets forth certain rights of homeless persons. Provides that in any civil action alleging a violation of the Act, the court may award appropriate injunctive and declaratory relief, actual damages, and reasonable attorney's fees and costs to a prevailing plaintiff. Amends the Illinois Human Rights Act to make corresponding changes. Defines "housing status" as the status of having or not having a fixed or regular residence, including the status of living on the streets, in a shelter, or in a temporary residence.



### Senate Floor Amendment No. 1

Deletes reference to:

775 ILCS 5/1-102

775 ILCS 5/1-103

Provides that a person experiencing homelessness has the right not to face discrimination while maintaining (rather than while seeking or maintaining) employment due to his or her lack of permanent mailing address, or his or her mailing address being that of a shelter or social service provider. Deletes amendatory changes to the Illinois Human Rights Act making it unlawful to discriminate against any individual because of his or her housing status and defining "housing status" as the status of having or not having a fixed or regular residence, including the status of living on the streets, in a shelter, or in a temporary residence.

### House Committee Amendment No. 1

Replaces everything after the enacting clause. Reinserts the provisions of the engrossed bill with the following changes: Redefines "housing status" to mean the status of having or not having a fixed or regular residence, including the status of living on the streets, in a shelter, or in a temporary residence. Adds an immediate effective date. Effective immediately.
