1966 National Preservation Act

- Gave States the rights for Historic Preservation
 - Also gave enabling legislation power to local municipalities to preserve/regulate under local control
- But different States have different laws
 - Wisconsin doesn't allow municipalities to give local property tax relief as an incentive
 - Other States/Cities have this option (California and Texas as examples)





1966 National Preservation Act

- Some states only use the National Register Designation (Districts & Sites) as the basis for Preservation
- Madison only regulates its 5 Local Districts and 181 Landmark Sites
 - 14 National Register Districts and National Register Sites are only regulated if they are also designated as Local Historic Districts or Landmark Sites

Madison Landmarks Commission 101

- □ Local Historic Districts (5) comprise 0.71% of City land area
- □ National Register Districts (14) comprise 1.41% of City land area



Preservation in Madison: Carrot vs. Stick?!

- National Register Districts & Sites are eligible for State Income Tax Credits, but are not regulated by the City
- Local Districts & Landmarks have no tax incentives, only regulation



Preservation in Madison: Planning

- Historic Preservation is integral to our City's Planning and Development Review processes
 - 2006 Comprehensive Plan
 - Goal #1: Maintain and enhance Madison's identity as a center of historic and cultural assets and activities.
 - Goal # 2: Maintain and enhance Downtown's historic and cultural resources.

Purpose and Intent Statements

City Comparisons

Purpose & Intent: Madison

- (1) Purpose and Intent. It is hereby declared a matter of public policy that the preservation, protection, enhancement, perpetuation and use of improvements of architectural, archeological, and anthropological significance; historical interest; special character; and cultural value is a public necessity to foster the health, prosperity, safety and welfare of the people. The purpose of this section is to:
 - (a) Effect and accomplish the protection, enhancement and perpetuation and use of such improvements and of districts which represent or reflect elements of the City's cultural, social, economic, political, archeological, anthropological and architectural history.
 - (b) Safeguard the City's historic and cultural, archaeological and anthropological heritage, as embodied and reflected in such landmarks and historic districts.
 - c) Stabilize and improve property values.
 - (d) **Foster civic pride** in the beauty and noble accomplishments of the past.
 - (e) Protect and enhance the City's attractions to residents, tourists and visitors, and serve as a support and stimulus to business and industry, thereby strengthening the economy of the City.
 - (f) Promote the use of historic districts and landmarks for the education, pleasure and welfare of the people of the City.

Purpose & Intent: Milwaukee, WI

- Pursuant to s. 62.23(7)(em), Wis. Stats., it is declared a matter of public policy that the protection, enhancement, perpetuation, and use of improvements of special architectural character or special historical interest or value is a public necessity and is required in the interest of health, prosperity, safety, and welfare of the people. The purpose of this section is to:
 - a. Effect and accomplish the protection, enhancement and perpetuation of such improvements and of districts which represent or reflect elements of the city's cultural, social, economic, political and architectural history.
 - B. Safeguard the city's historic and cultural heritage, as embodied and reflected in landmarks and historic districts.
 - **c. Stabilize and improve property values.**
 - d. **Foster civic pride** in the beauty and noble accomplishments of the past.
 - e. Protect and enhance the city attractions to residents, tourists and visitors, and serve as a support and stimulus to business and industry.
 - f. Relate municipal programs in preserving housing and revitalizing commercial areas to the objectives of historic and architectural preservation.
 - g. Educate the public regarding the desirability of landmark designation and historic preservation as an enhancement of the quality of life.
 - h. Aid and assist individuals and public entities in the nomination of their properties to the national register of historic places.

Purpose & Intent: Columbia, MO

- (a) Purpose. The purpose of this section is to promote the economic, cultural, educational and general welfare of the city by:
 - (1) Conserving and improving the value of property within district HP
 - (2) Protecting and enhancing the attractiveness of the city to home buyers, home owners, residents, tourists, visitors, and shoppers, thereby supporting and promoting business, commerce, industry, and providing economic benefit to the city;
 - (3) Providing a mechanism to identify and preserve the distinctive historic and architectural characteristics of the city.
 - (4) Fostering civic pride in the aesthetics and cultural accomplishments of the past as represented in the city's landmarks and historic areas;
 - (5) Fostering and encouraging preservation, restoration, and rehabilitation of structures, areas and neighborhoods;
 - (6) Promoting the use of landmarks and historic areas for the education, pleasure and welfare of the people of the city.

Purpose & Intent: Des Moines, IA

- 58-56. Purpose. It is declared as a matter of public policy that the protection, enhancement, perpetuation and use of improvements of special character or special historical or aesthetic interest or value is a public necessity and is required in the interest of health, prosperity, safety and welfare of the people. The purpose of this article is to:
 - (1) Effect and accomplish the protection, enhancement and perpetuation of such improvements which represent or reflect elements of the city's cultural, social, economic, political and architectural history;
 - (2) Safeguard the city's historic, aesthetic and cultural heritage, as embodied and reflected in such improvements;
 - (3) Stabilize and improve property values;
 - (4) **Foster Civic pride** in the beauty and accomplishments of the past;
 - (5) Protect and enhance the city's attractions to residents, tourists, and visitors and serve as a support and stimulus to business and industry;
 - **G** (6) Strengthen the economy of the city.

Purpose & Intent: Riverside, CA

- Purpose. The purpose of this Title is to promote the public health, safety and general welfare by providing for the identification, protection, enhancement, perpetuation and use of improvements, buildings, structures, signs, objects, features, sites, places, areas, districts, neighborhoods, streets, works of art, natural features and significant permanent landscaping having special historical, archaeological, cultural, architectural, community, aesthetic or artistic value in the City for the following reasons:
 - A. To safeguard the City's heritage as embodied and reflected in such resources;
 - B. To encourage **public knowledge**, **understanding and appreciation** of the City's past;
 - C. To **foster civic** and neighborhood **pride** and a sense of identity based on the recognition and use of cultural resources;
 - D. To promote the enjoyment and use of cultural resources appropriate for the education and recreation of the people of the City;
 - E. To preserve diverse and harmonious architectural styles and design preferences reflecting phases of the City's history and to encourage complementary contemporary design and construction;
 - **F.** To **enhance property values** and to increase economic and financial benefits to the City and its inhabitants;
 - **G**. To protect and enhance the City's attraction to tourists and visitors, thereby **stimulating business and industry**;
 - H. To identify as early as possible and resolve conflicts between the preservation of cultural resources and alternative land uses;
 - I. To integrate the preservation of cultural resources and the extraction of relevant data from such resources into public and private land management and development processes;
 - J. To conserve valuable material and energy resources by ongoing use and maintenance of the existing built environment.

Purpose & Intent: Boulder, CO

- 9-11-1 Purpose and Legislative Intent.
- The purpose of this chapter is to promote the public health, safety, and welfare by protecting, enhancing, and perpetuating buildings, sites, and areas of the city reminiscent of past eras, events, and persons important in local, state, or national history or providing significant examples of architectural styles of the past. It is also the purpose of this chapter to develop and maintain appropriate settings and environments for such buildings, sites, and areas to enhance property values, stabilize neighborhoods, promote tourist trade and interest, and foster knowledge of the city's living heritage.

Purpose & Intent: Buffalo, NY

- It is hereby declared as a matter of public policy that preservation, protection, conservation, enhancement, perpetuation and utilization of sites, buildings, improvements and districts of special character, historical or aesthetic interest or value are necessary and required in the interest of the health, education, culture, prosperity, safety and high quality of life of the people.
- B. The purpose of this Preservation Code is to:
 - (1) Promote the intellectual, cultural and general welfare as well as the economic well-being of the people of the City.
 - (2) **Safeguard** the City's history and **heritage** as embodied and reflected in its landmarks, landmark sites and historic districts.
 - (3) Preserve, protect, perpetuate and utilize landmarks, landmark sites, historic districts, neighborhoods, areas, places, buildings, structures and improvements which have a distinctive character or are of historic, aesthetic, architectural, archeological or cultural interest or value to this City, state or nation.
 - (4) **Stabilize and improve property values** in the City.
 - **1** (5) Avoid demolition of historically or architecturally important properties.
 - (6) **Enhance** the visual and aesthetic **character**, **diversity and distinctiveness** of the City.
 - (7) Enhance the City's attraction for residents, visitors, tourists and prospective residents.
 - (8) Preserve the economic and architectural integrity of vacant or underutilized landmark properties by means of substantial rehabilitation and adaptive reuse.

Purpose & Intent: Gainesville, FL

- b) Purpose. In recognition of these findings, the purpose, of this chapter is to promote the health, morals, economic, educational, aesthetic, cultural and general welfare of the public through:
 - (1) The identification, protection, enhancement, perpetuation and use of districts, sites, buildings, structures, objects and areas that are reminders of past eras, events and persons important in local, state or national history, or which provide significant examples of architectural styles of the past, or which are unique and irreplaceable assets to the city and its neighborhoods, or which provide this and future generations examples of the physical surroundings in which past generations lived;
 - (2) The enhancement of property values, the stabilization of neighborhoods and business centers of the city, the increase of economic and financial benefits to the city and its inhabitants, and the promotion of local interests;
 - (3) The preservation and enhancement of varied architectural styles, reflecting the city's cultural, social, economic, political and architectural history; and
 - (4) The enrichment of human life in its educational and cultural dimensions in order to serve spiritual as well as material needs by fostering knowledge of the living heritage of the past.

Purpose & Intent: Nashville, TN

- Purpose and intent. The historic overlay district provisions are established by this title to insure the ongoing preservation of structures of historic value to Metropolitan Nashville and Davidson County pursuant to the authority contained in Section 13-7-401 of the Tennessee Code Annotated. The provisions of this title are intended:
 - A. To preserve and protect the historical and/or architectural value of buildings, structures or areas of significant importance;
 - B. To regulate exterior design, arrangement, texture and materials proposed to be used within the historic districts to insure compatibility;
 - C. To create an aesthetic appearance which complements the historic buildings or other structures;
 - D. To stabilize and improve property values;
 - **E.** To foster civic beauty;
 - **F.** To strengthen the local economy; and
 - G. To promote the use of historic districts for the education, pleasure and welfare of the present and future citizens of Nashville and Davidson County.

Powers and Duties: Inventory, Historic Designations & Preservation Planning

- Inventory eligible properties and create Preservation Plans
 - Madison, Austin, Buffalo, Columbus, Milwaukee, Minneapolis
- Landmarks and/or Historic District Designation Recommendation

Powers and Duties: Education & Advocacy

- Public education to increase awareness of the value of historic preservation
 - Buffalo, Madison, Minneapolis
- Apply, accept and expend grants for goods and services from private and public sources
 - Buffalo, Milwaukee, Madison
 - To advise owners of historic structures on physical and financial aspects of preservation, renovation, rehabilitation and adaptive reuse (seek and identify incentives)
 - Austin, Buffalo, Minneapolis, Madison
- To work with State and local preservation offices and/or advocacy groups, neighborhoods, business associations
 - Columbus, Milwaukee, Madison
- Prepare or cause to be prepared necessary measured drawings, photographs and documentation for sites/structures that are endangered
 - Milwaukee

Powers and Duties: Regulation

- Approve or disapprove certificates of appropriateness for erection, alteration, restoration, renovation, relocation, demolition, signage
 - Madison, Buffalo, Columbus, Milwaukee, Minneapolis
- Approve or disapprove Certificates of no effect or certificates of special exception
 - Buffalo
- Issue mothballing certificates to allow enforcement of the city's building maintenance and condemnation codes against historic structures to be stayed
 - Milwaukee

Powers and Duties: Advising

Advise Mayor, Common Council, Other City Commissions, City Departments on all Historic Preservation Matters

- Austin, Buffalo, Columbus
- To hear appeals from decisions of Planning Director, Director of inspection or other official
 - Minneapolis
- Hear and make recommendations to city council on proposed historic variances
 - Minneapolis
- Conservation District establishment and recommendations, and review
 - Minneapolis
- To hear and make recommendations to the city council on proposed transfer of development rights
 - Minneapolis

Powers and Duties: City Owned Land

Recommend that City acquire a historic property if acquisition is the only means by which to preserve property

Austin, Minneapolis

 Advise Mayor etc on conservation, alteration and demolition of city-owned historic structures and sites
