INTRODUCTION

As we prepare the young people in our community to be college, career and community ready, it is essential that we invest in providing a well-rounded education that includes the arts for every child.

In July 2013, Madison, Wisconsin was named the 12th city in the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts' *Ensuring the Arts for Any Given Child* program to make that investment happen.

The primary goal of the Kennedy Center's Any Given Child program is to assist communities in developing a plan to ensure there is equity and access to arts education for all K-8 students in their schools. As a national leader in arts education, The Kennedy Center brings to this program more than three decades of work with thousands of students, teachers, principals, administrators, business leaders and art administrators across the country.

More than two years ago, leaders of the arts, education and city government began the application process for Madison to become an *Any Given Child* city. As conversations began, it was clear that all sectors of Madison—education, arts, business, government, and the community in general—were committed to ensuring our students have access to the rich tradition of arts in Madison, which is imperative as we prepare our students to be productive citizens for the 21st century. This commitment allowed for the quick formation of the Madison Community Arts Team, a cross-sector working committee of 40 invested community members.








by Certified Specialist: Course taught Enrolled in a Students Percent of In Grades K-5




In Grades 6-8, Percent of Students Enrolled in a Course taught by Certified Specialist
