2015 ASSEMBLY JOINT RESOLUTION 91

December 22, 2015 - Introduced by Representatives SUBECK, BERCEAU, KAHL, SARGENT, C. TAYLOR, BALLWEG, CONSIDINE, GENRICH, GOYKE, HEBL, HINTZ, JORGENSEN, POPE, RIPP, SPREITZER, WACHS and ZEPNICK, cosponsored by Senators RISSER and MILLER. Referred to Committee on Rules.

1 **Relating to:** congratulating the city of Madison on achieving Platinum status as a
2 Bicycle Friendly Community by the League of American Bicyclists.

3 Whereas, Madison's "Platinum Bicycling Committee" was formed in 2006 and
4 has been working on improving Madison's bicycle infrastructure to reach Platinum
5 status; and

6 Whereas, the partnership between the city of Madison, cycling enthusiasts,
7 Trek, and Madison B-Cycle led to improvements in bike lanes and safety,
8 transforming Madison into a cycling city where more than 5 percent of commuters
9 travel by bicycle; and

10 Whereas, Madison has nearly 75 miles of off-street bicycle paths, 120 miles of
11 on-street bikeways, designated safety zones at intersections, and bike parking at the
12 majority of businesses and institutions; and

13 Whereas, Madison is one of only five cities in the United States to reach
14 Platinum status, which is the highest rank achieved by any American city; and
