

The Machine



Key assumptions from Part 1

- Racism exists and needs to be acknowledged.
- Racism is pervasive, complex and interrelated with other types of oppression.
- Racial inequities are not random; they have been created and sustained over time.
- Addressing individual bias is not enough; we must disrupt institutional and structural racism.
- Historically, government has been complicit in creating or perpetuating racial inequity and now we have a responsibility to undo patterns of unfairness.

When to use racial equity tools?



To identify **root causes** of existing inequities

To understand inequitable impacts of current policies and programs

Develop new policies, plans, partnerships...

Analysis Tool Guidelines

ls:

- A systematic examination
- An intentional pause

- To minimize adverse impacts
 & identify new options
- To be conducted with a variety of perspectives and stakeholders

Is not:

- The "answer"
- To stop a process or slow it down beyond recognition
- To be used for political or professional gain
- A way to create token representation in decisions

Best Practices


Identify groups and individuals most likely to be impacted and find ways to involve them.

Adapt it to your needs and reach out for technical assistance as needed.

The analysis can be conducted in a variety of ways but it is not intended to be a solo "desk exercise."

Share the analysis widely and **be transparent** about the process and any missing elements.

Case Study for Use with RESJI Tool

A neighborhood has experienced a significant increase in violent crime in a short span of time. A group of high-level city officials visited the neighborhood to see if they could find out more about issues underlying the violence. As it became dark, they noticed that many of the streetlights in the neighborhood were out. In investigating why so many streetlights were not working, it was identified that streetlight repairs are done via a complaintbased system and that very few calls were coming in from this part of the city.




