SUBJECT: Legislative File 45569 (Climate/Energy Resolution)

Dear Chair Shukla and Members:

The Capital Region Advocacy Network for Environmental Sustainability (CRANES) urges passage by the Sustainable Madison Committee (SMC) of the "CRANES Amended Resolution" (below).

We do so on behalf of our Partner Organizations, with members numbering over 5000.

While we support the SMC's proposed reaffirmation of the City's existing 2013 endorsement of all-sector goals of 100% renewable energy and net zero carbon, this resolution must also explicitly affirm the City's existing commitments to:

- · a target date of <u>"2050 or sooner"</u> for achieving the energy/carbon goals; and,
- a 50% overall energy reduction communitywide by 2030 or sooner

Adoption of the "CRANES Amended Resolution" will also harmonize the City's updated climate/energy goals with those of the 2050 Climate Action Plan Framework for the Municipalities of Dane County. The City of Madison endorsed this Framework in 2013, along with CRANES and ~40 other partners in the Capital Region Sustainable Communities partnership (updated 2017, now endorsed by ~50 organizations: please see below).

Fortunately, it seems that everyone involved agrees that this resolution was intended only to add to the City's existing commitments.

Since that is the case, then passing an amended resolution that makes this intention explicit, while also putting all relevant climate/energy goals in one current document, should be supported by everyone on SMC.

Thank you for your consideration of this amended resolution.

Fiscal Note

In the adopted 2017 capital budget Engineering-Facilities Management has budgeted \$750,000 for renewable energy and energy efficient installations via the **Sustainability** [correct sp] Improvements program funded by GO Borrowing. This resolution authorizes the updating of the Energy and Carbon Goals in the Sustainable Madison Plan by assigning up to \$250,000 of that budgeted funding to develop a plan for city operations to achieve goals of 100% renewable energy and net-zero carbon emissions. Funding would be used for third-party expertise required to develop a plan.

Title

To update Energy and Carbon Goals in the Sustainable Madison Plan in response to changing science and technology around climate change, renewable energy and energy efficiency.

Body

- WHEREAS, the City of Madison (City) desires to formulate and implement energy and carbon policy consistent with the environmental, economic and social objectives articulated in the Madison Sustainability Plan (including the communitywide, all-sector goal of a 50% reduction in overall energy use by 2030 or sooner), the City's Energy Work Plan, and existing State of Wisconsin energy policy applicable to local governmental units under Wis. Stat. sec. 1.12; and,
- WHEREAS, in 2011-14 the City invested hundreds of thousands of dollars in funding and other resources in the multimillion dollar, federally-sponsored Capital Region Sustainable Communities (CRSC) effort, and in 2013– along with all the other ~40 CRSC partner organizations– endorsed the CRSC's 2050 Climate Action Plan Framework, calling for the prioritization of energy conservation/efficiency, as well as 100% renewable energy and a 100% reduction in climate disrupting gases or particulates (or a net negative reduction, if at all possible) by 2050 or sooner; WHEREAS, the scientific consensus demands we limit global temperature increases below 1.5 to 2 degrees Celsius to

avoid the most destructive and dangerous effects of climate change; and, [correct omission]

- WHEREAS, existing City energy and carbon goals were created before the 2015 United Nations Climate Change Conference, or COP 21, where 174 countries developed even more aggressive global targets that have since been ratified by the United States; and,
- WHEREAS, the Common Council has directed the Sustainable Madison Committee to "Create a working group of the Sustainable Madison Committee that includes other community stakeholders to review the City's climate change goals and update if needed"; and,
- WHEREAS, the "Energy and Carbon Working Group" has received public testimony, consulted with a variety of experts and identified ambitious and common sense goals during five working group sessions from July through November 2016; and,
- WHEREAS, the 2017 Capital Budget includes \$750,000 directed toward "Sustainability Improvements" including renewable energy installations and energy efficiency improvements; and,
- WHEREAS, the City of Madison aims to lead by example in the community, the state, and across the nation,
- THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Common Council of the City of Madison that: The Sustainable Madison Plan must reflect scientific consensus and community aspirations and establish community-wide, all-sector Energy and Carbon goals of 100% renewable energy and net-zero carbon emissions or better by 2050 or sooner, within a time-frame that aligns with sound and established science, as official energy and carbon goals of the City of Madison; and,
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Common Council of the City of Madison that: up to \$250,000 in re-allocated funding from funds already dedicated to allocated for "Sustainability Improvements" in the adopted 2017 Capital Budget shall be made available for third-party expertise required to develop a plan in harmony with the city-endorsed, county-coordinated 2050 CAP Framework for city operations to achieve community-wide, all-sector goals of 50% reduction in energy use overall by 2030 or sooner, as well as 100% renewable energy and net-zero or better greenhouse gas emissions by 2050 or sooner; and,
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Common Council of the City of Madison that: by January 2018, City staff will develop a plan for City of Madison operations to achieve community-wide, all-sector goals of 50% reduction in energy use overall by 2030 or sooner, as well as 100% renewable energy and net-zero carbon emissions that includes target dates, by 2050 or sooner, for reaching these goals, with front-loaded interim milestones, budget estimates, and estimated financial impacts; and,
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the attainment of this goal is a budgetary and managerial priority, and that as such target dates should be established that are ambitious, optimistic, and realized as soon as is feasible; and,
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Sustainable Madison Committee (SMC) shall be engaged in the development of the RFP for this plan, which would include options for benchmark dates, costs, and adoption of renewable energy, and that the consultant and management team meet regularly with the SMC on its progress; and,
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Common Council of the City of Madison that: City staff will report on progress of City of Madison operations toward achieving City of Madison operations and communitywide, all-sector goals to the Common Council in January 2019 and annually thereafter,
- BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, by the Common Council of the City of Madison that: The Sustainable Madison Committee will review and, if necessary, update community-wide, all-sector goals in January 2019 and biannually thereafter.

- auto-correctives² (pre-authorized by the community) to keep us on course from trailhead to destination
- as possible, historical offsets² for non-natural pollution induced by our activities since industrialization
