# Arts BLINK Grant Application (continued)

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Project Description (400 words or less)

In realizing a curated public art festival was lacking from the thriving Madison cultural scene, Makeshift organizers sought to make this the focus of a new annual art and food festival created to increase appreciation for Madison parks. The project involves former organizers of Yum Yum Fest, members of Underground Food Collective, members of the Parks Foundation Board and a new event production company VEA: Visual Edible Audible.

Makeshift curators (Bethany Jurewicz (VEA), Trent Miller (MPL Bubbler)) have invited artists from throughout the midwest to contribute artwork that achieves one of the following goals:

- 1. References public space and/or the community that such space represents
- 2. Creates a new, memorable interaction for an audience in a park they likely know well
- 3. Highlights a specific aspect of Olbrich Park
- 4. Creates an immersive experience for the audience

Makeshift will feature artwork from 12 - 15 artists presented in three ways:

- 1. Two Mobile galleries (shipping containers) curated by Arts Literature Laboratory and the Bubbler
- 2. Two or three artist made tented environments (Jeremy Wineberg, Jennie Bastian)
- 3. Freestanding sculpture and site specific installation (Erica Hess, Gail Simpson, Tom Loeser, Jason Yi, Alex Peyton-Levine, Tri M Ngo, Michael Duffy, Eric Adjetey Anang, Gabe Strader-Brown)

Makeshift seeks funding to directly support an artist(s) involved in the festival. We propose one or two Makeshift artworks become Blink sponsored and ideally live on in a public space for a few months following the festival. The artwork and space would be of MAC's choosing. Should this "temporary commission" of a work be infeasible, we would still hope to have the financial support of MAC to ensure adequate compensate for artists involved. We are happy to disperse awarded funds evenly among participants or designate specific Blink sponsored works in accordance with the desire of Madison Arts Commission.
