Bat House Installation Proposal

at Prairie Hills Community Garden in Lucy Lincoln Hiestand Park

Overview:

Prairie Hills Community Garden is proposing the addition of 1) a bat house and 2) a small butterfly garden at the base of the bat house. This is a part of a long term sustainable approach to support the natural balance of beneficial species in our garden ecosystem and to contribute to Wisconsin's native bat species conservation efforts. The bat house will help with mosquito control and butterfly garden will act as both brining beneficial species to the garden as well as a barrier to deter people from coming near bat house.

Location:

See attached map

Bat house will be installed on the south west part of the garden in a small clearing between the garden and the sumac tree line. Currently this small clearing is not mowed by parks and is maintained/mowed by garden volunteers. The location is out of the way from foot traffic and receives the necessary amount of sunlight for bat houses.

We propose trimming encroaching sumac back about 3 feet as well as a small stand that juts out into the clearing. Bat house would be placed where small sumac stand juts out. Location is approximately 15-20 feet from garden path and about 20-30 feet from back property line.

Timeline:

We have volunteers from the garden ready to install the bat house fall of 2017 or the spring of 2018 depending on when we can get materials. Installation of bat house will be complete as a part of the normal monthly garden workdays by garden volunteers. Installation of butterfly garden at base of bat house to be completed the following month on the next workday.

Materials/Cost Estimate:

Funding will come from Prairie Hills Garden Savings and/or Garden Micro-Grant (if awarded)

- 2 4x4x16 pressure treated post \$100
- 1 can dark paint or stain \$15
- 1 single chamber bat house kit (50-75 bats) and mount kit \$119 bat house to be purchased http://www.bestbathouses.com/houses.html (see attached image)

Additional tools/supplies to be borrowed from garden members:

heavy-duty staple gun – Sarah or Dan has
caulking gun – Sarah has
post hole digger – Bob has
spade shovel – Garden tool shed has
perennial wildflowers for butterfly garden (milkweed, coneflowers) – donated by Laurie, Laura, Sarah

Long term maintenance:

Bat house will be inspected in late fall and early spring by garden volunteer (Barb Swartz) to be sure that it is free of pests and will be re-sealed as needed.




Attachment 1Map of Proposed Location
