a. Horticulturists Erin Presley & Dan Schuknecht report on their experience as Guest Gardeners at Chanticleer, a public garden in the Philadelphia area

Chanticleer has a foundation and, as a former estate has enough space to allow for housing guest gardeners. A survey is sent in advance to find out interests which are matched with their gardeners to best meet the guests' needs and interests.

Dan was interested in the Asian Woods area – as the Thai garden original trees are maturing, he can now think about the understory. He saw some great examples, although not all options would be hardy enough here.

Erin was interested in the vegetable garden and North American forest – she also worked in the gravel gardens. She intends to bring more architecture and drought resistant plants to her gardens and to create more late season interest in the Wildflower Garden.

Erin and Dan also noted that not only did the Chanticleer staff share their time, they also shared seeds, cuttings and divisions. The staff at Chanticleer have more "free time", so have time to spend on individual installations, small touches like fresh flowers in the public bathrooms, and they make their own compost. Many things Erin and Dan think that can be added at OBG over time. The area outside Philadelphia is known for "30 gardens in 30 miles", so Erin and Dan were able to visit a number of other gardens in the area.

a. Capital Campaign Update – Ashlyn Mehlhaff reported that she is working with Development staff to touch everything and everyone possible, to hand hold donors and get the best donation possible. The architects met about 2 weeks ago and don't have updated naming opportunities yet. President White noted that the building project is moving along and the Urban Design Commission will be getting a presentation tomorrow – just informational. The City of Madison did include the \$4.5 million in the 2018 approved capital budget.
