COMMUNICATIONS TO BOARD OF PARK COMMISSIONERS

Parks Superintendent's Monthly Report Summary

Staff braved the brutal temps and wind chills at the end of the year to install hockey boards at several locations and groom the ice at rinks. Most of the ice rinks opened, hopefully for the season, on December 26. The new NiceRink at Heritage Heights is already proving to be an asset by retaining water and allowing for a quicker re-freeze.

The public engagement process for the James Madison Park master plan and shelter design will begin with a community kick-off meeting on January 17 at Central Library.

In its second year of production, the Madison Parks Calendar proved to grow in community engagement and popularity with the last calendar sold on December 20.

In 2017, WPCRC served over 221,000 visitors in a variety of events, programs and rentals.

Park Ranger numbers for 2017 over 2016 show significant increase in "check area" requests and a decrease in number of "animal complaints."

Staff and Isthmus Architecture are finalizing plans for a new concessions and restroom addition to the historic Breese Stevens stadium. The project is anticipated to be released for bids in March 2018, with the majority of the construction occurring during the 2018-2019 off-season.

Volunteer naturalist Paul Noeldner continues to lead the way for Bird & Nature Outings, with eight free events offered each month and a newly added location for 2018. On the first Saturday of each month, a guided walk along Lake Mendota and the Yahara River Parkway bike path will begin at the Tenney Park beach shelter.

WRITTEN REPORT OF SUPERVISOR'S ACTIVITIES EAST PARKS – CRAIG KLINKE, SUPERVISOR.

Winter has finally come in full force. We've had a few minor snow events to contend with along with brutally cold temperatures. That being said, we've had pretty good conditions for getting our rinks up and running. At the end of December, we had all of Tenney, Heritage Heights, and the general rink at Olbrich open. Much thanks and appreciation goes out to our staff that worked through these brutal conditions during the holiday season. Without their efforts, we would not be in as good of shape as we are. After the first of the year, we'll have a Parks Worker to help us in our efforts as well as three additional seasonals to help cover weekend ice maintenance.

The Park Arborist Crew is still working for Forestry thru the end of the year. After the first of the new year, we'll be working in some park locations that are typically wet, and we can only get equipment in when the ground is frozen. After that, we'll shift our focus back to Yahara Golf Course. We still have many, many trees to remove from the course.

Aside from that, we've been working on year end budget spending, planning for next mowing season, pruning trees, and flail mowing. Our staff loves the challenge the winter brings to Park Operations and we hope to have a long winter recreational season for our residents to enjoy!

CENTRAL PARKS & MALL CONCOURSE – CHAD HUGHES, SUPERVISOR Central Parks

December was a bit of a roller coaster ride for temperatures, starting out warm and ending the month in a deep freeze. The warm spells made establishing ice take a little longer than anticipated but we were able to get both Vilas and Goodman open the last week of December. Snowfall totals for the month were way below normal, however, giving us a chance to work out in the parks for longer than usual. The Landscape Maintenance Workers (LMW's) were able to spend a considerable amount of time grinding ash tree stumps in the parks and golf courses. We welcomed Laurel Franklin on as our new Parks Worker. She will be with us until March before moving on to West Parks.

As we move into January, maintaining the ice rinks and snow removal from our paths and walks will be our two priorities. Our winter seasonal will come on board after the first of the year to assist with ice maintenance Friday through Monday. The LMW's will continue to grind stumps when they can and assist the Park's Arborists as needed. When not busy with snow and ice, the PMW's will maintain snow equipment and work on painting picnic tables and garbage cans. Spring will be here before we know it so any spare time will be spent preparing summer equipment for next season.

Mall Maintenance:

Lack of a major snowstorm was the headline for the month of December at the Mall Concourse. The crew only had a few dustings to try out the snow removal equipment. However, the lack of snow allowed all of the salting equipment to be calibrated. For the first time at the Mall Concourse, all equipment has been calibrated to disperse the proper amount of salt with snow removal operations. The Mall also has a new drop spreader attachment for the toolcat, which will limit salt accumulation next to the foundations of buildings.

Due to the limited snow removal operations, the crew has been busy refurbishing furniture in the service area. Wooden benches, bus shelter repairs, and bicycle rack replacements have had extra attention during the month.

The BID's "Shine On Madison" event is starting to wind down, with their holiday lights and trees making the downtown look spectacular. The Mall is excited for the new year!

WEST PARKS & FOREST HILL CEMETERY – LAURA BAUER, SUPERVISOR

Forest Hill Cemetery:

The snowfall the week before Christmas has shut down the last of our leaf removal operation at the cemetery. Staff is busy now helping to get the skating rinks up and running, as well as continuing with burial operations and lot sales. We will also be removing snow from sidewalk and bike routes, as well as cemetery roads and lots.

In regular cemetery business, there were twelve interments, one cremains burial, 3 entombments, and 1 inurnment.

Summit Maintenance:

We have officially moved into winter operations. We're working on establishing the ice sheet at Westmorland and at the Nakoma and Rennebohm volunteer rinks, using the water tanker truck. The volunteers have done a great job getting Wexford, Westmorland hockey, and Hillington up and running. The Elver hockey boards went up on December 27 after a surprisingly slow ice build, especially considering the frigid temperatures.

We're also doing snow & ice removal on our assigned routes, including a significant expansion of sidewalk and bike path on McKee Road.

If it continues to be a light year for snow, we will be working on constructing, repairing, and staining/painting picnic tables and benches, as well as pruning trees out in the parks. We will be running our garbage truck once or twice per week.

CONSERVATION – PAUL QUINLAN, SUPERVISOR

In December, Conservation staff performed additional repair and maintenance on our snow making equipment, and were able to make snow on the sledding hill at Elver during the last week of December. While our high-pressure pump was rebuilt this year, the snow guns are 20 years old and will require several thousand dollars to refurbish. New equipment may be more cost effective in the long run, at this point.

Conservation staff continued with invasive woody species control (buckthorn and honeysuckle) at Cherokee Marsh, Edna Taylor, Heritage Sanctuary, Owen, and Prairie Ridge. Custom native seed mixes were developed and purchased for selected areas at Cherokee Marsh, Edna Taylor, Owen, and Prairie Ridge. Depending on the site, seed will be sown this winter or early next spring, following prescribed burns.

Aquatics

2017 was a great year at the Goodman Pool. We are extremely proud of what we have achieved this past summer. We had another year with no major incidents, tons of great programs and the community became more involved in our long term goals. Our guards this year successfully built a cooperative relationship with the Clean Lakes Alliance, which allowed us to be responsive and knowledgeable of changing conditions with Madison's lakes. This also allowed us to better serve the community and gather solid data on our beaches.

The Goodman Waves won their first meet since their inception, followed by their second meet at their home pool. For a program that focuses more on building strong swimmers and building community, where winning is not emphasized as much as learning and growing individually. This was an extremely positive summer for the team and the swimmers really worked hard for all they achieved. This would not have been possible without the tremendous support of the Goodman Foundation, Shelley Glover Foundation and Parks Foundation who have been key in building the Goodman Pool into a community resource and allow those who may not have a chance to swim, a chance to compete and learn. At the Goodman Pool, we saw an active community usage. We are proud to be fulfilling the Goodman Pool's mission which was devised when it was built: to be a true community resource. We have also been heavily working on bettering our internal training process and progressive certification of our staff. This past year, we implemented a Lifeguard Instructor program to allow staff to achieve and maintain higher levels of certification. The Goodman Pool serves the best community around and our goal is to have the best lifeguard staff.

Bowman Field Baseball Backstop Netting Poles – South Status: Pending Construction

Joe Daniels Construction has started construction of the new backstop at Bowman Field. The project is schedule for final completion prior to April 1, 2018, to avoid conflicts with current field reservations.

Forest Hill Cemetery – Near West Status: Pending Construction

Improvements will include the irrigation system upgrades, storm water management improvements and reconstruction of the road system in the cemetery. Phase 1 contract has been awarded to Drax Inc. The contractor is planning to start work in spring 2018.

Garver Feed Mill – East

Status: Pending Construction

The developer obtained their final zoning approvals and closed on the Lot 1 property in early December. S&L Underground was awarded the contract for removal of stockpiled leaf and stump grinding materials, with a low bid of \$214,355. Removal operations have begun and are anticipated to be completed by the late January, 2018.

Breese Stevens Facility Plan – Isthmus/Central

Status: Planning

Staff and Isthumus Architecture are finalizing plans for a new concessions and restroom addition to the historic stadium. The project received approval from the Wisconsin State Historical Society in October and City of Madison Landmarks Commission in early December. The project will be reviewed by the Urban Design Commission on January 31, 2018. The project is anticipated to be released for bids in March 2018, with the majority of the construction occurring during the 2018-2019 off-season.

Penn Park Improvements – South

Status: Construction

The project was bid in two phases, one for the shelter and restroom portion of the project and a second contract for the site work and parking lot improvements. The first bid package for the renovation of the existing shelter and the new concession/restroom building is expected to be completed May of 2018. The associated site work for the parking lot improvements is also anticipated to completed May of 2018.

Emerald Ash Borer Mitigation – City Wide

Status: On-going

Staff developed a GIS-based mapping database to inventory all ash trees removed and replaced in the park system and continues to coordinate with parks operations staff for the citywide replacement of ash trees.

2018-2022 Park and Open Space Plan – City Wide

Status: Ongoing

Staff has completed most of the data collection and engagement for the 2018-2022 Park and Open Space Plan (POSP) Update. Staff is currently working on developing the draft plan and using the Racial Justice and Social Equity Toolkit as a guide for analysis as part of the plan development.

2017 Parks Division Landscaping – City Wide

Status: Construction / Maintenance

Work has been completed for the installation of trees and shrubs at various sites in the park system. Maintenance under the contract continues through December 1, 2018.

2017 Parks Division Rain Garden Management – City Wide

Status: Construction / Maintenance

Work has been completed for the installation of raingardens at sites in the park system. Maintenance under the contract continues through December 1, 2018.

James Madison Park Master Plan and Shelter Design- Near East Status: Planning

Ken Saiki Design, Inc. has been awarded design contract for the James Madison Park Master Plan and Shelter Design for the amount of \$203,340. The public engagement plan is being developed and the first public input meeting is scheduled for January 17th, 2018.

Vilas Park Fishing Pier- Near West

Status: Construction

Parks staff will be working with Building and Construction Trades Council of South Central Wisconsin to install an accessible fishing pier in Vilas Park on Lake Wingra. Building Trades Council will be responsible for refurbishing an existing City owned pier for use on the site. Building trades has transported the wooden pier to their winter workshop and will finish work on the new decking throughout the winter. Final pier installation will be in spring 2018.

Vilas Park Pedestrian Bridge Replacement- Near West

Status: Construction

Strand and Associates is working with staff to replace 2 pedestrian bridges within the park that are located at the lagoon. Bids for the project were received on December 15th with R. G. Huston the apparent low bidder at \$773,996.17. Pending final approval of the construction contract, work is anticipated to begin in the spring of 2018 with final completion by August 15, 2018.

Gates of Heaven Improvements – Central

Status: Planning

Gates of Heaven flooring replacement is scheduled for 2018 in conjunction with exterior improvements being completed by Engineering staff. Staff will work with the State Historical Preservation Office (SHPO) to determine if a more durable variety of flooring will be allowed since Gates of Heaven is on the National Register.

Olbrich Park – Walter Street Restroom Building and Site Work Improvements – East Status: Planning

A public input meeting was held in October to discuss the replacement of the restroom building and planned sitework improvements to the park. Engineering Facilities will lead the project and it is anticipated that the contract to construct the building will be issued in early 2018, with construction anticipated to begin in June 2018. Sitework improvements (including the parking lot) will occur in 2019.

Eken Park Place making Improvements – East

Status: Planning

Staff will re-issue a Request for Quotes (RFQ) for the installation of a seating area and historical plaque at Eken Park in early 2018 with construction anticipated in spring 2018.

Wingra Park – Near West

Status: Planning

Staff is working with Engineering to address shoreline improvements to Wingra Park. Staff met with park stakeholders in April and had a second stakeholder meeting in August. Staff held a public informational meeting on this project on September 7, 2017. Work is tentatively scheduled for 2018, pending permit approvals.

Thousand Oaks Park – Far West

Status: Construction

Staff has completed the master plan development of Thousand Oaks Park. The developer, Veridian Homes, will be working on park improvements under a private developer contract. The improvements will be phased with grading and storm sewer work in the fall and playground, path and shelter improvements in 2018. The construction of the park by the developer offsets the Park – Development Impact Fees that would have otherwise been paid to the City.

Ocean Road Park Playground Replacement – South

Status: Planning

Staff held a public input meeting on October 30th and December 18th to discuss the Ocean Road playground replacement. The construction will be completed by Parks Construction crews.

Dudgeon School Park Playground Replacement – West

Status: Planning

Staff held a second meeting with the neighborhood on December 12th at Wingra School to vote on the equipment to be installed at Dudgeon School Park in 2018. This project will be combined into a contract with two other playground sites and is anticipated to be bid for construction in March 2018.

Indian Hills Park Playground Replacement – West

Status: Planning

Staff held a second public input meeting on November 29th with the neighborhood intended to vote on the equipment to be installed at the park but unfortunately there were no attendees. Parks worked with the alder and neighborhood association to make the proposals available on Next Door. This project will be combined into a contract with two other playground sites and is anticipated to be bid for construction in March 2018.

Odana Hills Park Playground Replacement – West

Status: Planning

Staff held a second public input meeting on December 7th with the neighborhood to vote on the equipment to be installed at the park in 2018. This project will be combined into a contract with two other playground sites and is anticipated to be bid for construction in March 2018.

Acewood Park Playground Replacement – East

Status: Planning

Staff held a playground workshop on November 7th to discuss the Acewood Park playground replacement. A second public input meeting was held on December 6th. This project will be combined into a contract with other playgrounds and bid out for construction in 2018.

Elmside Circle Park Playground Replacement – Near East Status: Planning

Staff held a playground workshop on November 7th to discuss the Elmside Park playground replacement. A second public input meeting was held on December 11th. This project will be combined into a contract with other playgrounds and bid out for construction in 2018.

Washington Manor Park Playground Replacement – East

Status: Planning

Staff held a public meeting on November 29th to discuss the Washington Manor playground replacement. The second public input meeting is tentatively scheduled for January 18th, 2018. This project will be combined into a contract with other playgrounds and bid out for construction in 2018.

Reger Park Playground Replacement – Near East

Status: Planning

Staff held a public input meeting on November 20th, 2017 to discuss the Reger Park playground replacement. A second public input meeting is scheduled for January 23rd, 2018. This project will be combined into a contract with other playgrounds and bid out for construction in 2018. Parks staff will also be coordinating the installation of lighting improvements, funded by CDBG, with the playground installation project.

Mayfair Park Playground Replacement – Near East Status: Planning

Staff held a playground workshop on November 7th to discuss the Mayfair Park playground replacement. A second public input meeting is scheduled for January 17th, 2018. This project will be combined into a contract with other playgrounds and bid out for construction in 2018.

Olin Park Boat Launch Reconstruction – Isthmus/Central Status: Pending Construction

The proposed project will remove and replace the cracked and deteriorating existing concrete ramps in the same location and will include some small improvements to ramp slope and lake bed stabilization. The project will begin at ice out in the spring and be complete by early May 2018. This project has been bid and the City has selected Janke Contractors to perform the work.

North Star Park Expansion – Far East

Status: Planning

Staff held a public meeting on December 4th to discuss park improvements to the expanded, unimproved section of North Star Park in conjunction with the master plan development of Camar Park (see below). Staff issued an online survey as part of the master planning process and mail paper surveys to residents in January.

Camar Park Master Plan – Far East

Status: Planning

Staff held a public meeting on December 4th to discuss master plan development for the new park property along with the expansion area at North Star Park (see above). Staff issued an online survey as part of the master planning process and mail paper surveys to residents in January.

Elver Park Inclusive Playground – South/West

Status: Planning

Staff will hold a public meeting with the neighborhood to kick-off planning for the addition of an inclusive playground at Elver Park to replace the existing playground near McKenna Blvd. This meeting is scheduled for January 18 at the Elver Park Neighborhood Center / Wisconsin Youth Company.

Greenside Park Master Plan – South / West

Status: Planning

Staff anticipate holding a public meeting with the neighborhood in spring 2018 to discuss master plan development at Greenside Park following a tree survey to be conducted in January to assist in determining the type and quality of overstory trees on the 2.51-acre property.

Meadowood Park Sun Shelter - West

Status: Planning

Staff are currently working with District 20 Alder and the neighborhood association to determine whether a public meeting process is necessary for the replacement of the existing shelter at the park with a new open-sided, reservable shelter in 2018. This project is anticipated to be bid in March 2018.

City-wide Invasive Removal Contract

Status: Planning

Staff is putting together the first city-wide park and engineering contract to removal invasive plants throughout city raingardens, shorelines, greenways, and along bike paths. Installation of native seed and plants will be included in this contract. This contract will be advertised to bid in December.

Other Projects

- Staff is working on replacement of portions of the Duck Blind facilities that were destroyed by fire.
- Staff is working on the relocation and development of a storage building at Olbrich Botanical Gardens to replace the one that received fire damage.
- Staff is working with the Parks Long Range Planning Subcommittee on drafting policies related Ice Rinks and Ice Rink volunteer groups.
- Staff will be working with Engineering on the Warner Park Lagoon Planning Grant. Staff is working
 with a group of area residents interested in determining the feasibility of rehabilitating the Annie
 Stewart Memorial fountain at Vilas Park. InSite Consulting Architects has prepared a Preliminary
 Assessment that will provide guidance on the fountain restoration.

- Staff is working with the Madison Food Policy group on a report to identify potential community garden locations in the University Hills Neighborhood.
- Staff is working with the City Attorney's office on updating the Madison General Ordinances to allow for Temporary Land Use permits and Art Installation permits for private access and work in parks.
- Staff is working with Oblrich Botanical Society and Engineering for the proposed Olbrich Garden expansion.
- Staff is working with Engineering on the proposed Atwood Avenue improvements, which include improvements in Olbrich Park.
- Staff are working with City Planning to identify projects at the respective parks that can be constructed with funding provided by Planning through Community Block Development Grants (CDBG)
- Staff is reviewing potential options for new dog parks in accordance with the recently adopted dog park policy.
- Staff are coordinating with organizers of the CrossFit games to identify a potential location and installation for adult outdoor fitness equipment.
- Staff is working on planning efforts to site recreational bike facilities within the City. The City is coordinating with a local volunteer organization Capitol Offroad Path Finders (CORP) to establish a winter Fat Bike route in 2018 and plan for future off road bike facilities.
