Conceptual Approach

This project involves placement of 350 yard signs with short, ambiguous phrases all around Madison. The signs will be distributed to city residents to place in their yards or house/business windows. Yard signs traditionally sell something or promote a cause; in recontextualizing this familiar object and taking poetic license with it, artist Trent Miller and poet J.L. Conrad (who are also married) hope to encourage viewers to engage with this medium, inserting themselves into the statements on the signs, and encourage open-ended interpretations. The signs should invite, surprise, and provoke. A Blink grant will enable us to bring our "If Not This Then What" project to a city-wide audience and to plant the seeds for future iterations of this present undertaking.

Project Description (400 words or less)

Our project, "If Not This Then What," will put mysterious, open-ended phrases out in the public that cause people to pause and think. We've considered multiple formats but in the end landed on yard signs to deliver the messages. Yard signs traditionally sell something (rent this house, support this cause) or promote a point of view (everyone is welcome here, support our school). In this context, we want to create signs that say things like "If not this, then what?" and "meanwhile, the toast is getting cold." All the phrases will come from text written by poet J.L. Conrad and have an open-ended interpretation.

We've specifically picked phrases that will read in different ways depending on the viewer's current mood, life situation, etc. For example, "If not this, then what?" could be read as inspirational to some people and as unsettling for someone else in different circumstances. Either way, the physical sign could be interpreted as a "sign" for that person in their life.

We plan to print 350 signs and give them out all over town. We will use our own social networks and set up give-away stations at multiple Madison Public Library locations (we've confirmed that we can do this) to help distribute the signs to a broader network of people. Anyone taking a sign will be asked to post a photo on social media, or text/email us a photo with the sign and hashtag #ifnotthisthenwhat. The signs will also have the hashtag on the bottom corner so members of the public can share photos on personal social media accounts. This will help distribute the project even further, as we would eventually like to see it spread to other locations and be distributed in multiple physical formats.

In his role running the Bubbler at Madison Public Library, Trent has focused his energies on lots of public art projects and has extensive background in working on projects that interact with the public in meaningful ways. Trent has shifted his artistic practice from a focus solely on paintings and drawings to include public/social projects. J.L. has worked on multiple poetry projects and collaborations with artists; this project would enable her to move her words off of the page and out into a broader public view. She also has expertise in design, and this project will put her design work out into the public as well.

J.L. Conrad is the author of one full-length collection of poems, A Cartography of Birds (Louisiana State University Press), and a limited-edition artist's book, Species of Light, carried out in collaboration with printmaker Sarah Noble. - 1) Screenshot from collaborative art/poetry web project by J.L. Conrad and artist Emil Corsillo titled "Groundworks" (full project viewable at www.jlconrad.com/groundworks). J.L. based the text for this piece on a web search of architectural terms and used Emil's methods for composing his artwork; in other words, J.L. attempted to "translate" Emil's paint into language. This undertaking shows J.L.'s willingness to work with artists in reimagining her own writing and in generating something novel.
- 2) Screenshot of website design (partial page viewable) by J.L. Conrad for her Chapbook *Not If But When* (Winner of Salt Hill's Third Annual Dead Lake Chapbook Competition). This shows some of J.L. Conrad's design skills, as well as the sort of typography that would be used in the proposed "If Not This Then What" project.
