Parks Superintendent's Monthly Report Summary

Update on the Parks Superintendent's Monthly Report

This month's report includes some changes as a part of our continual process improvement work. Assembling this report requires a significant amount of staff time and often includes limited updates from month to month. In reviewing the balance of cost vs. benefit and discussing it with staff, I believe moving forward with changes in a relatively rapid cycle makes the most sense to improve this process.

Additionally, we have continued to strive to communicate information on our work to policymakers and the Commission using other avenues of communication, especially the website. Our goal is to migrate to quarterly reports for each of the major branches (i.e. Planning and Development, Operations, Community Services, and Olbrich Botanical Gardens) for inclusion in this report. The expectation is that these quarterly reports will then include information that is more significant and provide the Commission and public more insight into each branch of our important work. Another goal is to include key highlights of items likely to come before the Commission. We will be working towards getting a web presence for the reports to allow members of the public to access this information in a more streamlined manner.

The first step in this migration is that in this month's report there is no Planning and Development portion of the report. The Planning and Development Manager vacancy along with the time constraints on the P&D team with projects going out to bid are the primary reason that this branch was chosen first. In addition, the P&D team has the most prevalent and built out web presence as it relates to its work. I look forward to continuing to work with the Commission to provide higher quality information through these reports and to do so in a manner that maximizes benefit to the Commission and the public while also providing important time back to staff in each branch to focus on meeting the needs of our community. Please reach out to Kay or I if you would like to discuss this further.

Future Commission Items

- The Long Range Planning Subcommittee is likely to approve a draft version of the Park and Open Space Plan (POSP) over the next month or so. Staff anticipates bringing this to the Park Commission in July.
- Staff will be presenting a general overview of the work on planning for the future of Golf to the Golf Subcommittee in June. Staff anticipates having further discussions with the Commission in the fall of this year.
- Community Service staff are working on an update to the Parking Ordinance for Parks and are hopeful to be able to use this as an opportunity to create a legal framework related to parking in Parks that is more consistent, transparent, and promotes voluntary compliance with parking regulations.
- Community Services staff are also working with Food Policy staff on a pilot program related to food procurement processes.
- Planning and Development staff will present an overview of the Capital Budget and planned projects for 2019 in September or October after the Mayor releases his Capital Budget.
- Bids were opened on Breese Stevens Concession and Restroom Addition on May 24th; only one bid was received which significantly exceeded the budget. The contract is scheduled to be rebid in July.

Report Highlights

- An estimated 250 community members and leaders attended the Penn Park ribbon cutting and grand opening celebration on Wednesday, May 23. The park is now open and features a renovated 4,000 sf shelter and new concession/restroom building.
- Ride the Drive 2018 was very successful! The great weather brought out an estimated 7,000 people on Sunday, June 3rd with 27 vendors and 12 food options and a team of 87 volunteers made it all come together smoothly.

- The Goodman Pool opens on Friday, June 8th with the first 500 kids receiving complimentary admission thanks to Goodman's Jewelers.
- Conservation staff continued prescribed burns in May at Owen, Stricker's Pond and Turville Point. Staff also led the 2nd Pond Exploration Day with students from John Muir Elementary School.
- The four closed dog parks reopened, including Odana School Dog Park after a considerable amount of work to restore.
- Rhapsody in Bloom, Ebb & Flow at Olbrich Botanical Gardens is Saturday, June 16.
- The 2018 spring planting season ended in late May with 1,787 trees planted across the city.
- Forestry Specialists re-inspected ash trees for treatment in 2018 and 945 ash street trees were added to the treatment plan.
- New watercraft storage racks were added at Burrows, Cherokee Marsh South, Olbrich and Paunack for a total of 353 rentable spaces throughout the city. All spaces available rented for the 2018 season.
- WPCRC is collaborating with the Northside Safe and Thriving Community and Madison Public Library to extend evening building hours for teen programming on Wednesday and Friday evenings to bring "Summer Nights at Warner Park" June 27 through August 10.

WRITTEN REPORT OF SUPERVISOR'S ACTIVITIES

EAST PARKS – CRAIG KLINKE, SUPERVISOR, Prepared by Kristin Mathews

May was an especially challenging month on many levels. With the extreme amount of rainfalls, it was hard to stay on top of mowing and the preparation of athletic fields. We also had a difficult time getting seasonal employees on board for the summer months. At this point we are nearly fully staffed and are looking forward to staying on top of everything.

The Tiger mower went out for one round of Spring cuts in no mow areas. We anticipate sending it out again soon before thistles go to seed and to cut down Wild Parsnip.

Several scheduled games had to be cancelled due to weather and field conditions throughout the month. But our crew managed to make fields playable if at all possible under very challenging conditions. Olbrich Walter Street basketball court was removed by Construction, in anticipation of the new Walter Street bathroom building. This will be a much needed and appreciated addition to the park! CENTRAL PARKS & MALL CONCOURSE – CHAD HUGHES, SUPERVISOR

Central Parks

With all the rain in May and perfect temperatures for grass, Central Parks was busy trying to keep up with the mowing all month long. Most of our seasonals started in May month with a few coming on in June. The LMW's finished planting their spring trees and had time to tackle some beautification projects also. Athletic activities are in full swing with softball, baseball, soccer and ultimate Frisbee. Penn Park opened up in May after a yearlong renovation with a new restroom/concession building and a remodel of the existing shelter. Shelter reservations have picked up dramatically as have larger events like The Ragnor relay finishing at Olin for the first time this year. The Vilas bridge replacement project is moving along nicely with the new bridges being placed this month.

Heading into June we will continue to be busy cutting grass that does not show any signs of slowing. Beautification projects will occupy the LMW's time now that trees have been planted. Athletic field maintenance as well as some field rehab efforts will take place in June. Reservations and events are numerous in June with Shake the Lakes being one of the larger ones at the end of the month. Our remaining seasonals will begin this month, which should help us get to some of the non-mowing tasks like weeding and pruning.

Mall Maintenance:

May was close to being the wettest month on record, and the heat definitely turned up making the Mall Concourse green as ever! Mowing operations kicked in high gear, and pulling weeds became routine for the entire month. Plants have been added to the Top of State area once again, to enliven the festive months to come. Turf maintenance has been completed, with aerating and overseeding the lawns from winter damage.

Decorative outdoor lighting has been added to the trees at the Top of State to bolster the image of the new visitor center booth. Weekly powerwashing has also been added to the Top of State, to help keep the area clean for events.

Speaking of events, they became plentiful in the month of May, including the Syttendai Mai run, Gilman Night Market, and Madison Marathon. Looking ahead to June, events include Cars on State, Ride the Drive, and another Gilman Night Market. Ben Fahey, Parks Worker, has joined the Mall Concourse for the summer and his attitude and experience is welcome and appreciated. June will definitely be a busy month downtown!

WEST PARKS & FOREST HILL CEMETERY – LAURA BAUER, SUPERVISOR**Forest Hill Cemetery:**

We always expect May to be an extremely busy month at Forest Hill, and this year was certainly no exception. The rainy, cold weather of early spring ended abruptly, temperatures warmed quickly into the 80s and 90s, and grass growth exploded. As always, cemetery staff received lots of string trimming help from general parks seasonals. We really couldn't do it without them, and we appreciate all the help.

Storm drain and irrigation work is still ongoing throughout the cemetery, and is definitely wearing on staff morale. Aside from the general messiness of dealing with constant excavations, complaints from cemetery visitors are a daily occurrence. Despite posted signs and website updates, many people are not getting the message and some comments actually border on hostile.

As of the first week in June, we finally have all our cemetery seasonals hired. We have 3 returnees with significant experience, and 1 new but promising person. We're looking forward to a productive summer.

In regular cemetery business, during the month of April there were seven full-size burials and eleven cremains burials.

Summit Maintenance:

Odana Dog Park is now open again. The grass filled in beautifully (probably better than when it was originally seeded), and we're hoping that new grass, coupled with the larger graveled entrance, will cut down on the muddiness. Walnut Grove Dog park is also open, with a larger gravel pad as well, and overseeded lawn.

We continue to struggle with our seasonal staffing. As mentioned above, the grass really took off all of a sudden, and we got all the seasonals in that we could. Unfortunately, we have had a large turnover this year and new people take a while to get up to speed. Staff was training new seasonals and staying late to mow on overtime all in the same day, but our new people are coming along and we expect that trend to continue. We also have two high school teachers yet to join us, and at that point will be fully staffed with seasonals.

As we move into June, I expect that we'll continue to work to catch up with our mowing and trimming, as well as add beach and volleyball court raking to our duties list. We also always have miscellaneous projects such as a kiosk installation at Merrill Springs. And, as always, we have daily shelter and restroom cleaning and trash collection.

CONSERVATION – PAUL QUINLAN, SUPERVISOR

Prescribed burns continued into May this year, with burns conducted at Owen, Stricker's Pond and Turville Point on May 7 and 8. Then the crew turned full-force to garlic mustard control at all actively managed conservation parks. Their efforts were supplemented by volunteers at Cherokee Marsh, Heritage Sanctuary, Meadow Ridge and Turville Point, as well as by the Operation Fresh Start Crew at Knollwood and Cherokee Marsh. Volunteers continued to work on buckthorn at Prairie Ridge. Staff also began mowing trails this month system-wide, and seeded a few new sections of trail at North Cherokee Marsh with turf grass. Contracted invasive control work began at Cherokee Marsh, Owen, Prairie Ridge and Turville as well.

Jay Walters and I led the second annual Pond Exploration Day at Owen for students from John Muir Elementary School. Much thanks to Paul Noeldner, Lance Green and Bethney Gundersen, who volunteered their naturalist skills and also helped lead this event. Brandon Mann and I led tours at Owen and Heritage Sanctuary, and I worked with an afterschool club at Sandburg Elementary to pull garlic mustard in the park. I worked with Parks Planning, Kay and Lisa to build and finalize the 5-year CIP projection for Conservation. Proposed projects will implement management plans as they are drafted and adopted for the Conservation parks. I drafted the management plan for the North Unit of Cherokee Marsh this month, and it will be presented to the Habitat Stewardship Committee at their meeting in June.

The spring 2018 planting season ended towards the end of May. 1,787 street trees were planted across the City. The Emerald Ash Borer treatments began May 21st. During the planting season, we were able to keep crews on ash pre-emptive removals and other non-EAB removals and tree pruning or respond to tree emergencies. After planting both east and west units began following up on work orders that came in during the planting season. We celebrated Arbor Week at Elvehjem park and Muir Elementary. The Dane County Tree Board partnered with us at the Muir Elementary event.

Forestry specialists continued to monitor engineering reconstruction projects while work is being performed near street trees and respond to sidewalk repair issues near city trees in Alder District 16. Also, the forestry specialists re-inspected ash street trees for treatment in 2018 for the western third of the city in advance of treatment crews. Two-thirds of the ash street trees were re-inspected last year (2017) and 945 ash street trees were put into the treatment designation and treated.

Canoe/Kayak Storage

Parks is excited to share that all 353 available canoe/kayak spaces are now filled. This year, canoe/kayak storage racks were added at the following parks: Burrows, Cherokee Marsh South Unit, Olin, Olbrich, and Paunack, This provided Madison Parks the opportunity to offer 53 additional watercraft spaces. Sixteen (16) of these spaces are under fee modification with the Goodman Community Center and Friends of Starkweather Creek to support youth access to nature. All of this was able to happen due to the fantastic efforts of a few of our parks team members. Rangers acquired additional racks, the team provided suggestions on the best park locations to place them and our website was updated to let watercraft users know rack spaces were available. Two front desk staff members diligently reached out to customers on our waitlist, spoke with many patrons looking for rack spaces and filled each rack space. Kudos go out to these team members for their efforts.
